# COLLEEN (McVEIGH) HUNTER - AUSTRALIAN LACROSSE CHAMPION

Colleen McVeigh started her lacrosse career in 1974 as a 14-year-old where a friend and her sisters (The Barnaby girls) introduced her to lacrosse at the Williamstown Women's Lacrosse Club, with WWLC dominating A grade and winning their 10<sup>th</sup> straight grand final that year. Colleen, still a junior, played seniors in Williamstown's B grade team in 1974.

The following year (1975) Colleen played in Williamstown's A grade team, which again won the state senior grand final. Colleen played in 8 State league / A grade winning grand final teams for Williamstown Women's Lacrosse Club.

Colleen played 385 senior games for Williamstown from 1974 to 2022, winning the **Club's best and fairest award 11 times** and the "Best Clubman" award 9 times.

Colleen won the Victorian state league best & fairest award (Jean Matthews Perpetual Trophy) a record 8 times (1977,81, 82, 83, 86, 90, 91, 98).

#### STATE REPRESENTATION

Colleen first represented Victoria in 1974 in the Under 16 team against South Australia and again in 1975 played in the U16 national carnival. Colleen went on to play in 17 senior Victorian teams (1977- 85, 88 - 90, 92,95 - 96, 1998 -1999), captain or vice-captain11 times, (1979 - 85, 1988 & 90 - 92), over a 24 year period.

#### **AUSTRALIAN REPRESENTATION**

Colleen played in **10 Australian teams** from 1978 to 1997, including **4 World Cup teams** (1982, 1986, 1989, 1997) and **6 touring teams** (1978,1981,1983, 85, 88 & 92), missing the 1993 World Cup following the birth of her daughter. Colleen was captain twice (1988 & 1989) and vice-captain 3 times (1981, 82 & 86 world cup gold medal team).

Coupled with Colleen's outstanding playing achievements she has been continuously involved in women's lacrosse for 50 years, giving back to the sport of lacrosse as a coach, manager, and administrator at all levels, from grass roots development to club and state coaching, to club and state administration and managing teams at club, state, and national level.
