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Gentlemen,

This is the 77th Annual Report, Statement of Income and Expenditure and Balance Sheet which is submitted for your consideration at the end of 1955.

Whilst there has been a decline in the number of senior players since 1953 and 1954, there has been a marked increase in the number of juniors (under 16) and this augurs well for the future.

Full details of the membership, numbers of Clubs and players, and the results of matches are contained in the Honorary Record Secretary's Report which is attached.

With the introduction of a new method of management of the Association's affairs, whereby any action may be taken by the Executive Committee subject only to veto by the General Committee, it has been evident that there is a smoother functioning in most of the Association's activities. It is felt that this was reflected in a decided note of enthusiasm with individual Clubs which appeared to be lacking in previous seasons. Your Commitrecommends that the present method of administration should be Your Committee continued.

Best and Fairest Player

It fell to another Malvern player to take the coveted Vince Healey Memorial Cup for 1955 season. John Heathcote, who scored 22 points, thoroughly deserved this honour and in being chosen as captain of the Victorian Senior side he had a most successful season. Congratulations to you, John. Max Kinderman, captain of Caulfield, was a very close second with 20 points, after being unable to play in two of the later home and home games because of injuries. Hard luck, Max.

Interstate Visits

Seniors The Victorian team visited Adelaide this season and after a very thrilling match of lacrosse of a very high standard, South Australia won by 14 goals to 13.

Both teams are to be congratulated on their very excellent showing.

The marked improvement in the standard of play of our juniors is very evident and can be attributed in part to the Sunday morning coaching classes held at Caulfield. It is to be hoped that Clubs will arrange for their juniors to regularly attend these sessions as it has been proved beyond doubt that the better players graduate from these classes.

We note with extreme regret the intended retirement of Mr. Phil. Shappere who has been team manager for the juniors for many years. It is hoped he can be prevailed upon to reconsider his decision.

Finance:

With a year of heavy expenditure because of the purchase of 150 hickory sticks and assistance to the Colts and Junior interstate teams, the finances have been severely strained.

In order to finance the purchase of sticks, an appeal for donations or a loan repayable in three equal yearly instalments was sent to old lacrosseurs.

The response was disappointing and it is intended to extend the appeal. It is intended to purchase a further supply of sticks for 1956 season, and if the new appeal for funds is not successful, other means of raising revenue will have to be adopted.

Sticks:

The hickory sticks from the Adelaide manufacturer, P. J. Brady, which were used this season were reasonably satisfactory. It is expected that the quality will improve further still and, although these sticks are expensive, we are now at least assured of a source of supply. It remains now only to find a steady means to pay for them as some £196 was spent by the Association in providing sticks at half price to Clubs and schools for their juniors.

There is no doubt that the future success of our game depends on a satisfactory supply of sticks. It is felt that everything possible should be done to sponsor the present source of supply. Brady has now been encouraged to develop a junior stick, the frame of which will cost approx. 50/-. Clubs are therefore urged to indicate at the earliest date what their requirements will be, and, if possible, to place an order accompanied by a substantial deposit.

Social:

An innovation this year was the introduction of a Smoke and Presentation Night which was held at "The Gables" East Malvern. The affair was a most successful one, held one week after the Grand-finals, and enabled the presentation of Medallions and Trophies to be carried out at the close of the season. All present indicated their pleasure at the innovation and it is intended to make this an annual event, at which it is hoped all old lacrosse players will be able to renew past friendships.

A successful Special Effort with attractive prizes, netted £43, whilst a very pleasant theatre night was organised by members of the Senior Interstate team and this also proved a profitable venture.

Investigation Committee:

This all-important body met on three occasions and performed its difficult tasks with general satisfaction. The members of the Committee are to be sincerely thanked for their efforts.

Committee Meetings:

Only three General Committee meetings were held at which 25, 20 and 20 members respectively were present.

Referees:

The problem of referees is still with us. It is intended next year to arrange for a school of referees at which any individual may be instructed now to conduct a game to the satisfaction of all players. The support of Clubs will ensure more satisfactory results, especially in the lower grades.

Meanwhile, our thanks are due to those members who officiated last season, in particular Mr. Alec Donald who in his first year as a referee, acquitted himself with distinction. We look forward to their continued assistance.

Resignations:

It is with regret that we record the resignations of both Assistant Honorary Secretaries. Mr. G. W. West gained an important research fellowship which took him •verseas and as well as wishing him every success in the future, we desire to record our appreciation of his past endeavours. Mr. P. Cocks held this important post for five months after Mr. West's resignation, until he also was posted overseas. Our thanks are also due to him.

Conclusion:

Your Committee believes that, despite the drop in the number of senior players, the decline of recent years has been halted and provided some of the older members can retain an interest in all phases of the game for at least another three years, by which time many promising juniors will have sufficiently matured, the future of our game must be assured.

Your Committee feels that great emphasis should be laid on the sponsorship of the younger players and after the deepest consideration, recommends that for 1956 season there should be two senior grades and three under-age grades, under 19, under 16, and under 14.

The Association will continue to support to the fullest extent any moves by existing Clubs to increase their membership or any moves by new Clubs to launch themselves. In this regard, mention must be made of the very successful venture by M.C.C. which sponsored an under 14 team from the boys at South Melbourne Police Boys Club with marked success. Other Clubs could well follow this example and assure themselves of a continuous source of juniors.

It is with pleasure that we can report the improved health of our President, Mr. H. R. Balmer after a serious illness. We all wish Howard continued good health and keenly look forward to his guidance and encouraging advice.

The total number of 513 registered players, which is a decrease of 23 on the previous year does not give a correct view of the strength of the game in the State. Of those registered 35 did not play at all during the season and only 232 open age and 136 under age players could be considered to have taken the field regularly, 40% and 50% respectively belonging either to the Malvern or Caulfield Clubs. This section was formed from the last three teams of "A" Grade at the end of the 1954 season together with the three teams left in "B" Grade. Competition was even throughout the section in the first half of the season and the final placings of the first three teams at the end of the home-and-home round was decided on goal percentage. The Grand Final was an anticlimax and Coburg ran out easy winners to earn their promotion to Major "A" Section. Malvern were the relegated team.

In a season of heavy scoring (University were the only defence with an average of less than 10 goals per match) J. Worrall (University) performed the noteworthy feat of scoring 123 goals whilst B. Tolliday (M.C.C.) was unfortunate enough to miss his century by two.

Twenty-goal Margin Rule - In the final game of the home-and-home round in Minor "A" Section University beat Camberwell-Glen Iris 29 to 6. This result would have given University second place on percentage. Under the Twenty-goal Margin Rule the score was reduced 26 to 6 giving the team only third place and robbing it of the right of challenge. The difference in placing might conceivably have had a direct bearing on the final result in the section on which rested not only a premiership but promotion to a higher grade.

This rule was originally instituted to deter high scoring and prevent publication of results which would indicate a great disparity in the standard of teams and be a bad advertisement for the game. The rule does not appear to have had the desired effect.

It is recommended that the incoming Committee should seriously consider whether the rule should be rescinded.

Records Secretary's Duties - Full value can be gained from Association records only if, at all times, they have been kept up-to-date. This does not refer only to results but also to movement of players between sections, substitutes, etc.

It is recommended that:-

- 1. The closing date for team entries be arranged in order that the fixture lists can be published at least a fortnight before the season commences and that Clubs be warned either that late entries will not be accepted or that entries will be accepted only if they do not materially upset the draw.
- 2. The Association Rules be altered to require Club Registration Lists to be lodged at least one week before the commencement of the season.

Clubs must have a fairly accurate idea when they make their team entries of which players they have available and there seems little reason why the original lists cannot be lodged at that time in order that the Committee can judge with some accuracy whether teams are likely to meet their commitments. The Rules allow for any additions and amendments to these lists that may be necessary.

Finally, I wish to thank the Hon. Secretary, members of the Permit Committee and those people among the Clubs who have helped to make my task more pleasant.

In these notes I wish to show members of the Association that your Executive has stretched the resources of the Association to their limit in order to sponsor Lacrosse both in this State and also in Australia during 1955.

Extraordinary costs have been as follows -

These costs have only been met through four ways.

(1) Raising of a Stick Loan A/c.

(2) Donations from old players to The Stick Appeal.

(3) Revenue from Referee fees.

(4) Special Effort at the end of the year.

Your association could not possibly have met these commitments out of ordinary revenue such as affiliation fees etc.

Also from the Revenue A/c you will see we have an excess of expenditure over income of £233. Thus reducing our Accumulated Funds in the General A/c to £120. This is after allowing for our Stick Loan A/c of £162 and Carnival Fund A/c of £151.

Thus gentlemen, I trust from these figures you will see that your Association cannot be expected to subsidize sticks in the future unless our income is increased by means apart from general income (such as Affiliation Fees) which would have to be raised to prohibitive figures in order to provide sufficient income.
