## **EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT**



The 2018 season proved to be one full of opportunity, new ideas, great lacrosse, a lot of hard work and full of fun and enjoyment. It was a challenging season for our Clubs, volunteers, officials, referees and players, they all lived up to the spirit of Lacrosse, produced some outstanding contributions and strengthened our game. On behalf of the Board I thank them all and congratulate them on continuing to build SA into a strong and vibrant Lacrosse Community. Along with Club Committee members, I am extremely grateful to everyone who contributes at our Clubs week after week, including the coaches, managers, trainers, line markers, canteen and bar staff — the entire Club team. You are the essence of our sport.

Our Strategic Plan states our clear vision 'To achieve significant growth in all areas of Lacrosse in South Australia'. South Australia has proven that Lacrosse can continue to grow and that our community displays solid values and support for the game. In addition, the community is

endlessly improving its skills and experience, introducing new ideas and better ways of producing some wonderful games and exciting Club activities. Success in South Australian Lacrosse comes as a result of a lot of hard work and I extend sincere thanks to our hardworking Board, who donate their time to our sport. Lacrosse SA is continually changing our strategy and approach to keep aligned with new demands from a governance perspective and to ensure we can compete with other sports.

Given our staggered rotation system for Board members, the composition and manner in which the board operates fundamentally impacts the operations of Lacrosse SA. Only a board operating under sound principles will be effective and facilitate the success of the organisation. It is important to continually set a higher standard of governance and work with stakeholders to adopt best practice across the sport. These standards provide a benchmark for our sport, where Director's are guided by Lacrosse SA's induction policy, conflict of interest register and process that governs a Director's involvement in any decisions in which they have a conflict of interest.

Further to the Club Handbook that has been distributed for the past two seasons, we recognise the demands on club volunteers and administrators are increasing along with the need for Clubs to operate in a professional manner. To kick off the 2019 season, I will be working with Club administrators to examine their current operations and identify areas for improvement by holding a Club Secretary and SportsTG session to ensure we are using our systems to maximise performance. The session will include governance principles, general administration, policies and procedures and record keeping for Clubs.

Lacrosse SA employed a full time Sport Administration Assistant - Jarrod Brimble who commenced in February. Jarrod settled in well, began communicating with Clubs and members in his first week and has been pivotal in maintaining the SportsTG system, providing effective and efficient administration and high-quality support services. Jarrod has been assisting Marilyn with clinics throughout the year and assisted with officiating school carnivals.

Once again, I would like to thank everyone who assisted in the development of lacrosse this year.

GIULIA MARION, EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Firstly, I want to convey my sincerest thanks to the Lacrosse SA board and Lacrosse SA staff for their ongoing work and support. Our sport is better off due to their involvement and love for lacrosse.

As with most other years, 2018 was a combination of successes and difficulties. A heartening point of difference between this year and the past is that I firmly believe that we are becoming more aware of our present situations and as a result have an increasing capacity to learn from our successes and alternatively our challenges. Much of this change in awareness can be attributed to our Lacrosse SA Board of 2018. With all positions filled bar one plus with board being further enhance by a high percentage of first-time directors, the discussion took on a positive vibe and a renewed energy. Board activities were very much in a state of learning for the first part of the sitting year with much time spent on "Good Governance"



and adhering to correct board behaviours. It is my hope that all Directors new to the board in 2018 are much wiser in the art of good directorial behaviours from their experiences.

Club Visitation program- SA Lacrosse clubs were asked to partake in a Club visitation program whereby myself and Lacrosse SA directors would attend a club committee meeting. Objective of the program was to bridge any divides between Lacrosse SA and affiliates, share ideas, better enhance communication and observe club governance principles. For those clubs that participated I pass on my thanks and hope it provided some benefit and Lacrosse SA hope to expand on the program in 2019.

National Planning Forum — The Australian Lacrosse Association held a National Planning Forum in Feb of 2018, both Giulia Marion and I attended. Held in lieu of the National Lacrosse Conference, the objective of the forum was to inform member associations as to the national direction of lacrosse and to workshop some of our common problems. The major outcome was the agreed position to form a national strategic plan which would adopt unified behaviours to better utilize the best components of lacrosse for national adoption while continuing to embrace state-based autonomy. We are working very hard on the National stage to improve all aspects of lacrosse for the SA community

Joint Club/Board meeting- Succession and sustainability form a very large component of the role of President and spans all facets of lacrosse in SA. One of the ongoing and primary concerns is the sustainability of Senior competition. Challenges in Men's state league prompted the need for a joint club board meeting. After much discussion across a wide spread of topics it was agreed the absolute need for urgent action. It is the aim for these meeting to continue so that we may see tangible outcomes.

Later parts of 2018 was spent mapping out Lacrosse SA Board succession. Information was sent out in to the wider community regarding Lacrosse SA elections to drum up interest in serving on the Lacrosse SA Board. Unfortunately, a nil result further highlights an ongoing problem of LSA board succession. This is a huge concern and hugely frustrating. I see "#grow the game" bandied about on social media like it will make a difference, but unfortunately, they will remain just words until more people get involved, to turn words into actions. Lacrosse CAN reach the high heights, but it will take committed people to lift it there. It is my hope that we can turn the tide of apathy and see lacrosse prosper as a result.

Lacrosse as a sport must evolve if we want to remain a valid sporting option in South Australia. There are 2 things that everyone can practice, to help drive lacrosse forward. The first is .........Positivity! Word of mouth advocacy is our greatest tool to market our sport, the more people that talk up lacrosse in the wider community the better chance we have of success in all areas. The second is acceptance of new ideas and strategies. We must constantly think on our feet to stay relevant and keep people engaged. This sometimes means changes to the "norm" and while these changes may not suit all people all the time they are sometimes necessary when looking at the bigger picture.

In closing I like to thank our lacrosse community for their commitment to the game and look forward to a bright and positive 2019.

The board is looking at adding a levy to the price of player registrations for next year to help offset the cost for State Team representatives and the possibility of a CPI increase on fees moving forward after 2020, these are the only fee increases that I can foresee at the moment. In 2018 the Women's Competition Committee have been active in their pursuit to improve Women's Lacrosse in SA. We have met monthly with the main topics including:

  - Sundays
  - GALA Days and Home/Away
- Playing rules for Women's Lacrosse in SA
- Junior to play Senior (new process)
- Potential Draft League and Master's style competition in early 2019
- State Team Representation



- Fixtures and learnings from 2018 Season
- State Team Representation
- Women's Playing Rules in Lacrosse SA
- Recruitment and retention of players
- Umpire support and mentoring



Attendance was encouraging and showed there are many women invested in contributing to the growth of Women's Lacrosse in SA. Many of the recommendations will continue to be looked at and supported by the Women's Competition Committee.

Season 2018 provided lots of great learnings for the Women's Competition Committee. We have a strong vision for fixturing in Season 2019. Communication between the Junior Competition Committee and Men's Competition Committee will be required to build a fixture with a focus on easing travel requirements for both players and officials on Saturdays. Friday night games will provide a showcase opportunity while also easing load on officials and allowing for streaming opportunities. The WCC have also spent a large portion of the season looking at women's playing rules in SA and discussing the relevance of our variations, the impact (both + and -) they have on our enjoyment, safety and performance.

## JUNIOR COMPETITION COMMITTEE REPORT

Thank you to all Club representatives who served on the Junior Competition Committee during the year for their effort, thoughtful focused discussions and collaborative endeavour. Your hard work, willingness to consider alternate views and adopt a broader picture around development in junior lacrosse is appreciated.

Summary Report based on Strategic direction and operational plan for 2018.

Ensure all Junior events are presented and promoted positively to project the philosophy of Junior Lacrosse.

- Implemented a cluster fixture structure to increase efficiencies, reduce travel and project a stronger presence and promotion of junior lacrosse.
- Ensure competition events are aligned with key principles supporting developmental, progression, engagement, enjoyment maximum participation and learning.
  - Implemented relative field dimensions to match the 8/side U13 competition events.
  - Girls: U13 girls 2 div, U15 (
  - Boys: UI3 boys (9), UI5 (5) UI7 (4) teams
  - UII North (girls 9, boys 5) South (girls 6, boys 8, U8 6)
- Encouraged school participation in Saturday and other events
  - Promotion of Quick Stix programs, support for school carnivals,
  - Developmental direction to increase school participation in ull lacrosse.
- Equipment improvements: goals are in good repair and ample number.
- Provided vests for coordinators with key philosophy message on back.
- Promotional banners distributed projecting the philosophy of junior lacrosse.
- Connect coaches and officials to promote a consistent message with philosophy, expected behaviours and collaboration on events.
  - Applied rapid feedback link using Facebook page and other communications between Junior Competition Committee coaches and officials.
  - Future: return to orientation evenings -2019.
  - Continue to refine systems for umpire and coach education using a decentralised model and mentoring.
- Check and post documentation for all events philosophy, rule guidelines and member protection.
  - Additional refinements implemented. Future: continue for early prep 2019.
  - Future: Project a more active presence on the Lacrosse SA webpage to promote all things junior lacrosse.
- Communication improvements:

  - On-going 'review' of sub sections of season in a progressive manner at meetings.

### **DEVELOPMENT REPORT**



Development essentially embraces anything and everything that we don't generally provide as our core product, which most of us would see as our winter field lacrosse season, although development opportunities can still exist there. An obvious example of that is programming, which together with the loss of Park 25 (SACA grounds) in the city last year for junior girls and moving WSL away from Wednesday nights at Finsbury back to club grounds on Saturdays this season, creates both challenges and opportunities. Scheduling is more than just the draw and we need to maximize the return to clubs when hosting games, by creating events that can be financially beneficial and project a vibrant image and positive environment for lacrosse. Beyond that any other development is done with the best intentions of growing the game and the number of people involved in it, from players and officials, to administrators and supporters alike, plus creating a greater awareness for people outside our sport and making it a better game for those who are already involved.

This year the annual Mad March Tournament was again hosted at Sturt Lacrosse and despite not involving all teams or clubs, it was an enjoyable and successful event. It provides clubs an opportunity to play some preseason games about a month out from the home and away season, which is a good wake-up call for clubs to get serious. The "fast lax" style of game, which is really enjoyable to watch and fun to play, with reduced numbers on a smaller field, along with some variations designed to speed up play, provides an opportunity to trial rules that could possibly be considered for inclusion in both our junior or senior competitions at some stage. Such changes might be very beneficial to our game, particularly if we are able change our traditional mindset to look at the game more objectively. These rules are perfect for more social forms of lacrosse like masters or novice and short seasons of both could boost our playing numbers by reengaging past players, or attracting new ones. A masters day was help in July and while there was only I game, it would be great to see more games played next year, so we can retain and grow our numbers and hopefully these competitions can be catered for and offered in our programming next year.

In the "off" season clubs are (or should be) busy running school clinics, then hosting carnivals in an attempt to recruit junior players and this year was no exception, with several carnivals held at our clubs in term I that lead to new players taking up the game. The ALA Quick Stix programme through the federal government's Sporting Schools programme was launched this year and has proved to be extremely successful, with great exposure for lacrosse across Australian primary schools. The number of sessions delivered and kids involved has seen lacrosse rate very highly against other sports, with South Australia leading the way in the early stages of the year. Next year there will be a pilot programme for secondary schools, which provides greater opportunities and clubs are encouraged to make the most of these opportunities while they exist and when there is money available for both deliverers and the schools for equipment. Additionally an opportunity to expand the Catholic Schools Carnival, that has been held at Brighton in term I for many years, saw extra carnivals held in term 2 at ETP and term 3 at Woodville, while there is a possibility of further expanding this opportunity next year, which could be extremely rewarding for lacrosse in the long term. There hasn't been a better time to take advantage of these opportunities and grow our participation numbers.

Norwood Oval was once again the venue for our Grand Finals, but after the success of 2017, it was confirmed that this year we would also play the Preliminary Finals at Norwood and we saw an expanded format that included the junior Preliminary and Grand Finals being played on the same day as senior finals across all grades, from u/13 through to State League. Both days were very well supported and there was in excess of 2500 people in attendance on Grand Final day across the whole day, with some great lacrosse and close finishes, helping build the excitement and spectacle. To be able to hold our finals at such a well known, conveniently located and comfortable stadium, allows us to present our sport in a far more professional manner, gives us greater exposure, plus provides an ability to secure major sponsors such as Bank SA and Living Choice Australia and thus becomes a financially rewarding event for LSA. All of these factors, together with experience of playing at the venue and creating an awareness of our brand at Norwood Oval, are extremely important in the development of lacrosse here in SA.

Clubs have such important role to play in our development and at this time of the year they shouldn't be switching off and taking a well earned rest, as this is the time for planning and growing and thinking about how we can all make lacrosse bigger and better next year. Looking at opportunities to run local summer indoor or outdoor competitions, catering for not only existing players, but past players, new players, including family, friends or work colleagues etc., contacting schools to run clinics and locking in Quick Stick programmes for term I, with funding now open. It is more than just supporting LSA initiatives, expecting them to come up ideas and run them, as we all should be a part of that and are encouraged to do so with a responsibility to promote and grow the game in our area. If we all can improve the way we do that, by exploring new initiatives through creative thinking, then the hard work we do now that leads to growth in I area, will make it so much easier in the adjoining area, which ultimately benefits and develops lacrosse in South Australia.

## DEVELOPMENT COORDINATORS REPORT

2018 was a strong year for development in Lacrosse. This includes:

Schools Clinics and Carnivals

- Western School CARNIVAL at Glenelg LC 240 students, 30 teams from 7 schools.
- Southern School Carnival at Sturt LC, 480 students, 60 teams from 11 schools.
- Northern School Carnival at ETP LC, 272 students, 34 teams from 4 schools.

These events are significant in promoting lacrosse to a broad school base building on clinic work and encouraging participation.

#### Catholic Schools Carnivals

- Catholic Carnival based at BLC
- New Catholic Carnival at Woodville Lacrosse club.
- New Catholic Carnival at East Torrens.



This has been a growth area particularly with the development of a strong relationship with SACPSSA Head - Darren Elliot. Lacrosse will be placed in a permanent position on the Catholic Sporting Calendar. This provides a regular competition event for all Catholic schools and ongoing development opportunities.

#### **Other**

- ACHPER PE week Carnivals to 10 schools and building relationships with PE teachers and follow up with clinics.
- Tea Tree Gully SAPSASA sporting carnival including clinics for 600 kids from 14 schools.

Overall: 19,075 children being introduced to Lacrosse over the last 12 months with the sport now being more widely recognised in schools sectors.

Sporting Schools - Quick Stix

Lacrosse is now in the top 10 out of 30 sports in its first pilot year and it has been accepted for the long term into the SS program. This program provides strong links to schools through sessions and carnivals.

Extension part of the sporting schools program - Invade Quick Stix are being planned and developed into 2019.

## DIRECTOR OF COACHING REPORT



A significant achievement in coaching for Lacrosse SA, is the introduction of Certificate III in Sports Coaching (Lacrosse), through the Thebarton Senior College, aimed at students currently undertaking their high school certificate where they can earn up to 50 Stage 2 SACE credits, commencing in 2019.

This certificate is endorsed by both the Australian Lacrosse Association and Lacrosse SA and is an introductory level course which teaches the fundamentals of coaching lacrosse (drills, skills and game play), behaviour management, communication, and First Aid.

To complete this qualification, students will be required to put the knowledge and skills they learn in the theory tasks into practise when they coach a team at their own club.

Students will plan, conduct and evaluate training sessions according to the player and team

needs. They may choose to coach alone, with another student or with a mentor coach who has more experience.

#### The benefit for the student:

- Nationally recognised qualification
- Year 12 subject recognition (school students only)
- More confidence and enjoyment in coaching
- Increased skills to deal with behaviour management
- Increased skills in communication
- First Aid Certificate
- Police Check

#### The benefits to Clubs:

- Accredited Coaches
- Coaches for the season with potential for longer term commitment
- Higher retention of coaches
- Coaches with Senior First Aid
- Coaches with Police Checks

#### The benefits to Lacrosse SA:

- Coaches accredited to a high level of coaching
- Potential for more qualified and greater number of club, state and Australia level coaches

#### COURTNEY HOBBS, DIRECTOR OF COACHING (ACTING)

The 2018 season has been yet again a busy year for officiating which presented some challenges across the board and I'm please to report we have come out the other end better for it.

The highlight for me came right at the end of the season at the U/15 National Tournament when the South Australian contingent of officials included Zeph Williams, Cassandra Robb and E.J. Tremlett all at their first National tournament. It was refreshing to see such young individuals at the beginning of their officiating careers and all three of them impressed the assessing panels to a very high standard which is a good sign for the future of South Australian Lacrosse Officials. I look forward to seeing you all progress further in 2019. In addition to this South Australia had good representation at all of the National events in 2018 and I congratulate all who participated and represented Lacrosse SA.



Staying on a National level, 2018 saw the ALA re-instate the Women's National Technical Committee (WNTC) and congratulations go to Tammy Varga who was appointed South Australian Umpire in Charge and also to Martin Kiploks who was appointed as the ALA Umpire in Charge of Australia. Kudos also go out to David Campbell who served as and has been re-elected to South Australian Referee in Chief and also Dennis Mulroney who was the ALA Referee in Chief of Australia. It is a credit to these individuals and an asset to our local community that we have the leadership, experience and skills of them in such positions in order to assist our progression in South Australia.

Moving to an International level, this year saw the FIL Men's World Championships in Netanya Israel, South Australia had a large contingent of representatives including Shane Abbott, David Campbell, Bradley Edwards, Dennis Mulroney, Mark Polden and Myself. Special congratulations to Shane and Bradley who attained their International Accreditation for the first time as the entire group represented not only themselves and the state but the country impeccably. In addition to our representation at the World Championships, South Australian officials have led the way in assisting developing countries by sharing our knowledge and skills with Tammy Varga travelling to Poland for the Women's Lacrosse European Championships where she gave instruction and assistance to developing European umpires and I personally travelled to Hong Kong for the Hong Kong Open where I mentored and assessed referees from the Asia Pacific Region and also European and North American rookies.

This year we had record attendance at training and development opportunities and Lacrosse SA also invested more time and money into mentoring, assessing and development of our younger and newer officials. There was an unprecedented collaborative approach between our Competition Committees which resulted in a more cohesive working relationship between officials and players/coaches, something I wish to build upon with the competition committees moving forward.

This was coupled together with a greater emphasis on clubs adhering to their obligations under the bylaws and myself continuing to develop the bylaws to ensure fairness, transparency and a strategic approach will lead to some improvements into the 2019 season and beyond. The approach taken was necessary to ensure games were officiated sufficiently and with an adequate level of experience to ensure safety and enjoyment for all, at times decisions may have appeared illiberal however I can assure the community that they were considered, scrutinised and applied with the betterment of the game foremost.

To finalise, I urge all clubs to consider officiating and the undeniable need for officials in their strategic planning going forward. The best way for clubs and the community to improve standards and stocks is to encourage, approach and recruit non-playing officials who can be trained throughout the season. As you can read above, we have a world standard group of officials willing to train and mentor new officials and the few we had this year managed to achieve beyond their expectations when they officiated their first games.

I would like to personally thank all those who officiated this year, all the assessors and officiating committee volunteers for their tireless efforts in 2018 and look forward to seeing you all again and working together in 2019!

## DIRECTOR OF PROMOTIONS



Over the past 12 months the promotions of lacrosse in SA has taken big steps to bring lacrosse into the 21<sup>st</sup> century with live streaming and targeted content though LSA TV. we have also looked to expand lacrosse beyond the established community through multiple pieces in the Sunday mail and on radio. We also looked to provide clubs an opportunity to share their gala days and club successes through the Instagram takeovers which most clubs were able to take advantage of in 2018 and all clubs in 2019 and beyond.

LSA TV has expanded dramatically in 2018 with the introduction of live streaming capabilities thanks to the purchase of new camera equipment by LSA. We were able to broadcast 26 games live, 10 games throughout the finals season including all SL Prelim and Grand Finals, with almost every club being involved at least once throughout the season.

We now have over 1,000 followers of Facebook and just short of 500 followers on Instagram allowing us to become the home for on-field lacrosse action in SA. This has meant a shift away from the LSA home page and has allowed this fb page to become more of an admin page while LSA TV has taken the lead in delivering SA content to our community.

## STATE TEAMS REPRESENTATIVE

Throughout the 2018 season, emphasis has been placed on finalising coach and player selection policies, parent/player hand-books and the coach and team manager hand-book to ensure fair selection and clear guidelines for all. All players and coaches participating in u18 and senior state teams now complete ASADA level I courses and beyond. Moving forward significant emphasis is being placed on player code of conduct to ensure that Lacrosse South Australia representative players, coaches and managers experience a positive sporting culture that all are entitled to.

The 2018 U18 ALA National Lacrosse Championship was held in Adelaide and hosted by Glenelg Lacrosse Club who once again held a lacrosse tournament of a very high standard.



Lacrosse SA piloted an approach toward coaching that ensured growth and development for not only players but also our coaches. For the first time, the U18 women's coaches were appointed a coach mentor who provided guidance and theory behind training plans, game plays and player feedback and support. This resulted in significant growth in player development which was evident with all games being very closely contested. This is a model that we are very keen to continue to provide as one approach toward coach development.

It was with great disappointment that South Australia did not field a senior women's team to complete at the 2018 ALA National Championship in Perth. A number of factors contributed to this decision, including, minimal interest from players with suitable to mentor and support the next generation of lacrosse South Australian women representative players. Significant effort went into fielding a team which unfortunately came short of the necessary numbers. It is a priority to ensure that this does not happen again. Behind the scenes planning is already underway to create a model that is enticing and rewarding for both experienced and developing representative players.

The U15 National tournament is always well supported and once again Lacrosse South Australia fielded 5 teams (3 girls and 2 boys). All teams demonstrated significant developmental growth which was evident within the results. Lacrosse South Australia has now settled on a playing and walkout uniforms that in the future, can be used for consecutive years, significantly reducing the cost for returning players.

Coordinating state and zone teams involves significant effort and planning from a small but committed group. I would like to acknowledge and thank Giulia Marion for her support, advice, professionalism and time that she puts towards this.


