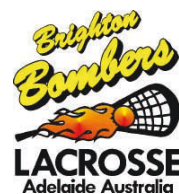

Executive Officer's Report

On the field, the highlights of 2012 were undoubtedly the recent victory of the Red Men at the ALA National Championship in Perth, and the victory of the Under 15 Girl's Storm team at the National Tournament in Melbourne.

Our Senior Men last won the National Championship in 2003, so it's a big congratulations to Coach Tony Hill and his Coaching, Management and Support Group and to all the Players. By all accounts they were, to a person, a very determined and committed group who were rewarded with the Garland McHarg Trophy. Great work by all.

The Under 15 Girls – either team, (Storm or Lightning) had not won this event since its inception in 2003, and while it is a Tournament (rather than a Championship) where the emphasis is on development and opportunity, it's always great to win. Well done to Coach Tiffany Smith, Assistant Coach Bec Larecki, Team Manager Jane Disotto and all the players who worked so hard, for such a great reward.

The Senior Women played off in the Grand Final of the National Championship, and the Under 18 Girls played off in the Grand Final of their Championship. All in all a pretty successful year on the National stage.

Selecting, training and all the preparations to send representative teams away is almost a constant process these days. We congratulate and thank all the Coaches, Selectors, Managers and Players who have represented SA at any level this past 12 months – and generally paid their own way for the honour and privilege of doing so. There is a complete list of all officially appointed personnel included in this report. Congratulations and thank you to you all.

Also on the national stage, Brighton Lacrosse Club hosted and won the Men's and Women's Australian Club Championship in June. Well done to all concerned at Bomber land. The club is certainly enjoying a fantastic streak. Thank you to Graham Hobbs and the Eureka Group for their generous support of this event, which is enjoyed by participants and spectators alike.

It was Brighton to the fore on the field locally too, taking out the Copyworld State League Women and State League Men premierships. Congratulations Brighton, and to the Clubs and teams who took out the Premierships in all the other grades – Senior Men and Women, and Junior Boys and Girls. A full list of all premiers is included towards the end of this report.

Off the field, much of the Association's focus was on the proposed restructure of the Board, although this project was put on hold from the middle of the year, when the Under 18 Championships which were held at Adelaide Shores and run by the Association rather than a club, required the attention of many. After much consideration by the Facilitation Group (Bob Hewitson, Phil Elson, Andrew Harris, consultant Hans van Bavel, myself, and latterly John Corell) and the Board, and consultation with Club Leaders and the lacrosse community, we are now at a point where it is planned to trial the new smaller Board for a 12 month period. The intent is for the Competition and other Committees to have more input into the planning and day to day running of their competitions and portfolios, while the Board concentrates on the more strategic aspects of running the Association and developing the game.

Most other activities will be covered by the Director's reports in this report, but some perhaps additional ones to note include :

t-lax. Always popular and coordinated last year by Trish Adams.

Japanese Lacrosse Camps. Several camps were held for visiting Japanese teams at the beginning of the year. It's great to work with our sponsor Bunnik Travel on these. Thank you to Trish Adams who largely manages the camps.

The **Adelaide Box Lacrosse Club** was formed to managed that form of the game. Well done to Anthony Munro and crew.

Channel 44. We branched into television with a 15 minute weekly program on Community TV Channel 44. Those who saw it and provided feedback seemed to appreciate and enjoy it, but it is time consuming to produce. We will continue with our contract pre and early 2013 season after which its resource to value ratio must be carefully assessed. Thanks to Sharni Wilson-Smith who was the regular host, Luke Keesing and Simon Kretschmer who shared co-hosting duties, newsreader Kirrilee Hay, Lachlan Eggars (around the Clubs segment), to all the guests and to Christian LeRay, Alex Helmis, Peter Keane and Michael Hood who provided video of games to use.

Office for Recreation and Support . The process and assessment of applying for Grants from the Office for Recreation and Sport was altered this year, and we were fortunate to receive a 3 (notional) year allocation of \$40,000 per year to provide "Leadership, Policies and Services". We also secured a \$5,000 grant for a project "Keeping Young Women in Sport." This grant – largely for research, is being managed by the Development Committee, under Luke Oswald. Coaching Director Lynton Arscott and Officiating Director managed another grant we received for training of Coaches and Officials. This is great support from the Government of SA and we thank the staff at Recreation and Sport for their support and assistance.

Spectator Facility at Finsbury Reserve. A temporary facility was in place for this season pending approvals on the construction of the new one, which we are pleased to advise is about to start and should be ready for next season. This project is another very practical demonstration of Graham Hobb's support for our game - thank you once again to Graham and the Eureka Group.

Many thanks to all those who continue to support and assist me in my role. In particular to President Bob Hewitson, with whom I enjoy so many lively discussions, the Board, Club Secretaries, office volunteer Trevor Brown, Marilyn Fuss and off course my right hand and game advisor Tiffany Smith.

To all, enjoy your summer activities, lacrosse or otherwise. Season 2013 is just around the corner.

President's Report

I again have the pleasure to welcome everyone to a Lacrosse SA Annual General Meeting.

As is the case every year there are many highs and lows that lacrosse has to face and overcome. As we are a club based association, what is seen as a low for one club is inevitably a high for another so for me to comment on them all would be inappropriate.

As a very outspoken advocate of the junior compliancy policy I am pleased to report that again we have increased our junior numbers, which is what the policy is all about. The LSA Board has agreed to the JCC recommendation that compliancy will be applied in season 2013 in the same format as it was for this year. It was very pleasing and indeed rewarding for me that the JCC were obliged to add a second division to our U13 and U15 girls competitions to accommodate an increase in numbers of these two very important age groups. A reminder here is that it is the club's responsibility for recruitment of all junior players.

Again in 2012 the disappointing trend of having significant portfolio holders resign during the year forced the board to make changes to its structure and ask the remaining board members to take on extra duties, and I take this opportunity to again thank them all for their untiring efforts they put in to keep the board working to the standard clubs demand of the association.

As was reported at last year's AGM the Board has continued with the programme of restructuring the LSA board, by establishing a "Facilitation Group". This group has held meetings with as many stakeholders as were prepared to listen to them, held leaders meetings, did surveys and visited some club committee meetings. The response has been overwhelmingly positive, and tonight we are hoping it will progress to the next stage and be formally implemented. You will hear more of this later in this meeting. If anyone has any questions regarding this new structure please ask tonight, the Facilitation group are only too pleased to answer any questions or misgivings that people or clubs may have. The new restructure will however rely heavily upon clubs choosing the right person to represent them on the competition committees.

The representative teams had mixed results. We saw the inclusion of an U18 State Team concept, replacing the U17 Tournament and U19 State Teams in boys, and the U17/U21 girls, reducing the number of games being played each year. Again this proved to be most successful and all indications are that this concept will continue.

The U18 Championships were held here in SA at Barratt Reserve and were organised and run by LSA staff and board members, my special thanks and congratulations to all those who were involved on an excellent job well done.

Congratulations to the U15 girls "Storm" team for winning the tournament—the first time any SA team has won an U15 Tournament; this is also a good indicator of the improvement that is currently taking place at the girl's junior level. Also congratulations to the Senior Mens State team on winning the 2012 National Championships in Perth—their first since 2003—a great team effort by the players, and the coaching/management staff.

A special thank you to all the members of the LSA Board. They truly have the game of Lacrosse at heart and have worked exceptionally hard to keep our game progressing to the standard and expectations of all the SA lacrosse people.

Also a special thanks to the LSA staff of Helen Lewis, Tiffany Smith and Marilyn Fuss, who all work far above what is asked of them, all of lacrosse owe a debt of gratitude to them.

Best Wishes to you all for the coming festive season and I hope to see you all in the New Year.

Deputy President's Report

This was the first year I have been on the Board and I have enjoyed being involved at the highest level of lacrosse administration in South Australia. The diversity of other Board members and their diversity of positions on certain issues has certainly led to robust constructive debate about some issues, which I believe bodes well for healthy governance.

It was clear to me even before taking on this position that some form of change was required to refocus the Board's strategic direction. I felt that the strategic review being undertaken offered the ideal opportunity to be involved in assisting that change.

The new strategic plan developed through club consultation has set four key platforms for the future of lacrosse in South Australia. These platforms of Leadership, Management, Growth and Performance shall help direct the Board's strategic direction. I encourage all members of the lacrosse community to familiarize themselves with the plan and when opportunities arise become involved in its implementation.

As part of the future direction of Lacrosse SA the Board has also been working on a new Board structure that is hoped will facilitate better the implementation of the strategic plan and lead to better governance of lacrosse in the state. The new Board structure has been based on best practice management principles for amateur sport along with feedback gained through the consultation phase of development.

To test the new structure it is planned to trial the new structure over the coming season. This will allow for the change to occur without making changes to the constitution and bylaws as well as allowing for it to be easier to make modifications if required.

This development of the new Board structure has been one of the main tasks I have been involved in during the last year.

Other tasks undertaken during the year include organizing the Australian Club Championships. This year saw a change of venue for the championships where it was decided to have the championships hosted by a club. After some initial issues the championships were awarded to Brighton Lacrosse Club to host. I would like to thank Brighton for their efforts in hosting a successfully run championship as well as congratulating them on winning both the women's and men's championships for 2012.

As part of my role I started working on updating the Child Protection Policy which had progressed to the draft stage before the ALA released their policy which has meant that the draft now requires some additional work before being ready for adoption. It is planned to have the policy released prior to the next playing season as there are state government requirements that clubs will need to comply with by mid-season.

One of the key areas that need review is the by-laws and I would like to acknowledge the initial work done by the President and Executive Officer in progressing the review. Unfortunately, except for some isolated issues, work on the review did not progress as planned and this review should remain a priority for next year. The by-laws form an important tool to ensure fair and equitable governance of the sport and their updating to ensure that they are structurally simplified, remain current and relevant is overdue.

As the Deputy President position will not be part of the trial Board next year I have been encouraged to nominate for the Director Administration role which is part of the trial board. I therefore will be resigning from the Deputy President position to enable me to take on this new role.

I am committed to remaining involved in lacrosse administration for the next year and hope the trial next year is a success and invigorates lacrosse in SA.

Administration Report

No report—Position Vacant. Many of the duties of the Director, Administration were undertaken by the Deputy President.

Finance Report

The following 2 pages are details of the financial statements (subject to audit) for the 12 months concluded on 30th September 2012 - prepared on an accruals basis. Accruals basis means income still to be received after 30th September, but relating to the 2011/12 financial year is included (and is shown in debtors in the balance sheet) - and conversely expenses paid after 30th September but relating to the 2011/12 financial year are included (and shown in the balance sheet as creditors).

The "bottom line" shows a \$6576 deficit for the year with expenses exceeding income. You can analyse from the statement which income or expense items have gone up or down from the previous year, and the obvious major one is championships and overseas visiting teams income (which is mainly Japanese visiting teams) has decreased markedly. In regards to championships at senior state level, we generally only have them here every 3 years so that is no surprise. However we had budgeted for more than \$3819 overall "profit" from teams touring here but that did not eventuate.

A State association usually only budgets to try to make a small surplus each year, because ultimately we endeavour to keep the team nomination fees (and other costs passed on to the Clubs) to the minimum amount possible. Lacrosse SA will obviously have to carefully scrutinise and carefully review all of the income and expense items for next year, as obviously ongoing deficits cannot be sustained.

The Club debtor amounts shown in the balance sheet were the amounts outstanding as at 30th September, and since that time a total of \$13960 has been paid by 4 of those Clubs (Burnside, ETP, North Adelaide and Sturt).

An area we have spent a considerable amount of time on this year is in relation to insurance. The current insurance cover was reviewed and improved. We have also looked carefully at player insurance covering serious injury to players and possible loss of income, and look like we can get this cover for \$7.50 per senior player and \$3.75 per junior player. The Australian Lacrosse Association do have an umbrella policy which includes this type of cover, but we believe we can get similar cover with much lower premiums via a local insurance broker. In the interests of a "duty of care" for player welfare (particularly in the light of recent publicity about players in other sports suffering serious injuries) I believe Lacrosse SA will actively pursue having this cover. The ultimate impact for Clubs will mean team nomination fees will need to increase around \$120 per senior team (\$60 per junior team) purely to cover this additional cost. There may of course have to be additional increases in team nomination fees so Lacrosse SA can get the finances back to at least a breakeven situation for the coming year. If any Clubs are of the opinion that we should not pursue the player insurance cover then we would be interested in hearing your feedback sooner rather than later (and obviously before we commit to the cover).

Women's Competition Report

The 2012 season in the Women's Competitions was full of the highs and lows one has come to expect from women's lacrosse in SA, with a fair dollop of the unexpected on top for good measure.

I am indebted to having a wonderful group of dedicated, thoughtful and passionate lacrosse people on the Women's Committee where our debates were always very interesting and productive. Some of the decisions made were not supported by the LSA Board, but on the other hand, I believe the WCC will flourish under the proposed new LSA structure.

Congratulations to Women's State League Premiers Brighton who again remain undefeated for the season, even though Wilderness were a worthy opponent in a very memorable and exciting Grand Final. As the competition entered the Finals, it was so tight that Burnside and Glenelg were also legitimate title contenders. Woodville won their first WSL game since their return to the top flight, and they and Sturt showed glimpses of top class lacrosse with their junior laden sides.

Congratulations also to Brighton and Glenelg Seahawks as Premiers in Division I and Division II respectively, I think it fair to say all three Premiers were the outstanding teams in their competitions during the season.

From the women's competition perspective, positives for the season included the increase in the number of senior women registered playing, which I believe was a direct result of the increase in juniors 'coming of age' thanks to the junior compliance policy; the high quality of play in all three divisions; the stand at Finsbury Reserve (albeit temporary—construction of the permanent facility is about to commence), thanks to the generosity of Graham Hobbs; and, the increase in women's games at club's home grounds which included for the first time ever, games at Wilderness' training ground at Park 6.

In the weird category: in 2012, we discovered that pregnant players were allowed to wear helmets, but not nose studs.

There were negatives of course, but let's perhaps focus on the challenges for change we face: Will we still be able to use Park 25 as the new RAH swallows up the car parks? Do we want to keep most games centralised? How can we improve the number of umpires and the overall quality? Will anyone but Brighton ever win a WSL Premiership again? Should we standardise rules for the competitions or introduce more differences? How do we ensure teams continue playing for the entire season and don't forfeit? How do we encourage more juniors to watch senior games to encourage them to keep playing? How do we improve the By Laws for the Women's Game?

There are other issues than these of course, but I am sure that if we can keep the quality of the people on the WCC in 2012 and with good will, considered expert opinions and the thought always of 'how can we improve lacrosse for all?', we will solve these and more.

I am proud of the 2012 competition draws which delivered more games played at home grounds than since the first move to a centralised location, which I know from feedback was welcomed by all clubs.

I also took on the role of Women's Registrar full time which was the first time anyone else had tried this since the late Margaret Pallant started in the role many years ago – which also proved how indebted LSA is to this magnificent lady, as I found it almost a full time job in itself.

My thanks go to Helen Lewis and Tiffany Smith in the LSA office for their continued invaluable assistance to my role this season, to Bob Hewitson for his support and advice, and to Judy Evans, my predecessor, who was always available for help when required.

My belief is that a woman is preferable in the role as Women's Director for obvious reasons, but I am willing to stand again in this role otherwise.

Junior Competition

Junior Competition Director John Fuss resigned part way through the season, and President Bob Hewitson acted in the role for the latter half of the season.

It was pleasing to see the continuation of the U13 Girl's Division 2 competition, and the introduction of a Division 2 in the U15 Girls. Disappointing though to only have 4 teams in the Under 17 Boys, with one of those teams being a combined club team.

While the Under 8/11 North Zone was not great in terms of numbers this year, the Board is of the belief that the zoning of these competitions should continue, with the zones being adjusted according to team nominations, to make them as even as possible, in terms of numbers. The problem with parking at Park25 would be worse if we returned the U8/11 competitions to that venue, and we would struggle to find enough fields there. All clubs need to strive to form U8 and U11 teams, which can be entered into the competitions pretty much any time during the year.

Junior compliance this past season included the need to have a minimum of five correct age players when nominating a team at the beginning of the year, and then to play in the finals. The intent of this was to prevent an Under 15 team (for example) being made up of mainly under 13 players playing two games in a day. Also, players were only permitted to play one age level above their playing age group eg an Under 13 player could play Under 15s, but not Under 18s.

There has been some discussion re adjusting the age groups to Under 10, 12, 14 and 16. This is hypothetical at this stage, and should there be any changes they would not come in until 2014.

At the time of writing this, we have no nominations for Director, Junior Competition, which does not bode well for the planning and organisation of Season 2013. Hopefully someone will take on this role very soon. It's a Casual Vacancy for one year.

Development Report

This was my second year in the Development portfolio, and the game continues to grow in South Australia but not without its challenges. The addition of more school teams into the girl's competition, and the growth of the U15 girl's grade into two divisions, were some of the highlights and very encouraging developments for lacrosse in 2012. Below are reports on the main development projects for this year.

High School Competition

This year's High School Competition evolved to introduce two divisions each for the boys' and girls' competitions (Years 7-9 and 10-12). This was introduced to make for a more even competition, and allow new and young players an environment in which they could compete with players at a similar level.

We secured a central venue for the boy's competition, at Park 21W in the city (corner of South Terrace and Goodwood Road, incidentally the former central grounds of the old SALA). This made it much easier for competing teams to arrive at their matches on time. Unfortunately, Marryatville High did not play this year, and the number of participating schools dropped to three (Immanuel, Rostrevor and St Michael's), which is a concern for the future of the boy's competition. With two divisions, teams were reduced to 6 per side with a smaller field (70m x 35m) which made for exciting lacrosse and high levels of active involvement from all players on the field. Once again ALRA referees made themselves available to officiate these matches, making for a smoothly run and good-spirited competition. Congratulations to Rostrevor College who won both the junior and senior divisions of the boy's competition. A much improved effort by Immanuel College this year should see them threaten Rostrevor's dominance next year.

The girl's competition was again played out of Walford School's grounds on the corner of Cross and Belair Roads in Hawthorn. This year Cabra and Marymount joined the competition, while St Peter's Girls entered three teams. Westminster once again were too strong and won the senior division, while St Michael's won the junior division of the competition. The success of the lacrosse programme at St Peter's Girls is such that they want to make a full-time transition into the club winter competition. Last year they entered a team in the newly-created second division of the U13 competition. This year they entered both U13 and U15 teams into the club competition, with the U13 girls winning the Division 2 premiership, and the U15 girls making the Division 2 grand final. The school is now hooked on lacrosse, plans to enter teams in the U11 grade next year, and is aiming for lacrosse to eventually be offered throughout the system. I would like to congratulate Tim Dickson for his excellent work at St Peter's Girls School, and I look forward to Saints Girls vying with Wilderness in the future for dominance in the girl's competition.

Such success for the girl's high school competition, seeing St Peter's Girls and Cabra, as well as St Aloysius and Loreto competing in the winter competition, makes for a problem, albeit a good one to have. If we are able to get school teams relatively easily into the girl's winter competition, should we now only be offering girl' school teams the opportunity to participate in winter, or is the Term 1 competition still necessary to win over some schools in the first instance? Given lacrosse's limited resources to cater for extra competitions, a decision might need to be made in the near future!

In total the High School Competition had 138 participants (55 boys and 83 girls), with 6 teams from 3 schools in 2 divisions of the boy's competition, and 8 teams from 6 schools in 2 divisions of the girl's competition.

It is also worth noting that players recruited from the High School Competition included two members of this year's Under 18 state boy's team and three members of the Under 15 girl's zone teams.

I would like to make a renewed call to clubs who do not have schools participating in the competition, particularly boys teams, to make efforts to start lacrosse programmes at a school with the aim of bringing them into the High School Competition.

Many thanks to everyone who helped run the Lacrosse SA High School Competition this year, including coaches, referees, umpires and other helpers.

University Competition

The University programme continues to grow. In its second year, the lacrosse event within the local university games, the "SA Challenge", proved very successful. From 3 teams and 12 participants last year, the event this year had 5 teams and 28 participants, and was won by Adelaide University.

Many thanks again to Oliver Lovat from AULC for his assistance with the SA Challenge and other university lacrosse programmes. We should also see some university teams entered into the iLax competition, which will help continue to build and strengthen the programme by being able to offer more activities for university lacrosse teams.

Under 15 Boy's Development Squad

At various times over the years there have been development squads coordinated by Lacrosse SA and other groups, and last year I proposed that a squad be re-established, although not much progress was made this year, so this project is admittedly behind schedule. I believe it should be a priority for Lacrosse SA to have a Development Squad, and would particularly like to

start with an Under 15 boy's squad for the following reasons:

- Poor retention rate of boys from Under 15 to Under 17 and senior grades
- Perceived low standard and unevenness of Under 15 boy's competition
- Poor numbers trying out for Under 15 zone teams in the national tournament
- Poor results of SA Under 15 zone teams in the national tournament (not won by an SA team since the inception of the zone format 20 years ago!)

I believe a development squad will address these issues by:

- Demonstrating pathways and opportunities for young players as senior and elite lacrosse players
- Providing quality and specialist coaching for players from all clubs, not just those with the best resources
- Offering an appealing training programme that will inspire players to improve their lacrosse
- Improving the standard of players and thus the competition in general as well as that of representative teams

Many thanks to Bob Carter who earlier in the year provided some valuable input into how the squad could be structured. I am currently in the process of bringing together quality people who can help formulate the programme for an Under 15 Boy's Development Squad, and will also be monitoring the progress of Burnside LC's junior development squad in the off-season for note. If the squad is a success, this formula will be copied for future squads for Under 15 Girls as well as older age groups.

National Growth

In October I attended a National Growth Workshop in Melbourne coordinated by the Australian Lacrosse Association, at which I was asked to present on the progress made by Lacrosse SA. It is a good indication of how we are progressing in SA that the other member states have a keen interest in our activities, particularly our school programmes, which they would like to emulate. The ALA is forming a national Growth Advisory Council which will include representatives from every member state. This council will help all states pool their resources and share knowledge for the benefit of all to help grow lacrosse in Australia.

Finally I would like to once again give a big thank you to Marilyn Fuss, the Lacrosse SA Development Coordinator, who goes above and beyond the call of duty in conducting lacrosse clinics at schools, programmes for teachers, and even coaching on Saturdays, among many other roles! Without her efforts we would not see nearly as much growth in lacrosse at the junior and school level that we have been experiencing these last few years.

Two of the main achievements this year were the running of two SAPSASA events. One at the North Adelaide Lacrosse Club late 2011 where we had 35 teams from 6 schools competing. The Southern SAPSASA event was held at the Sturt Lacrosse club and attracted a huge 456 players/61 teams from 12 schools. Was great to have the ABC TV program "Behind the News" at the Sturt event. These events are paramount in introducing lacrosse to our schools as this is where our future lacrosse players will come from.

Along with the U13 Girl's Division 2, which was introduced last year, we had enough players/teams to create an U15 Girl's Division 2 comp. These comps are designed to encourage our new girls to play our sport in an environment where they are able to compete and succeed whilst they are gaining the necessary skills to allow them to compete with seasoned lacrosse players.

It is very rewarding when you go into a school to introduce lacrosse and manage to recruit one or more children into our sport. This year my greatest success story comes from St Aloysius where we managed to recruit 16 girls into our U13 Div 2 comp. It appears that recruiting a (school) into lacrosse is the easiest way of recruiting large sustainable numbers into our sport. St Aloysius girls enjoyed their lacrosse so much that some of them played U15s as well as U13s and I have recently seen some of them playing in the i-Lax comp. The School is so excited about Lacrosse that they have invited us back to recruit from their Years 4 and 5 giving us the opportunity to have SAC U11 teams for 2013.

It is proven that when you have success you want more. St Peters won our U13 Girl's Div 2 comp this year and were runners up in the U15 Div 2 comp. They are already preparing for the 2013 season which means they will do the recruiting for us. At this point in time we have Cabra, St Peters and now SAC all adding lacrosse to their curriculum which means not only do they offer Lacrosse as a school sport but the infrastructure is already there. If every club had one or two colleges that they called their own their recruitment would almost take care of its self.

I believe that the backbone of our sport is our juniors and I am passionate about recruiting them – which is why we have decided to help our clubs to run mini school competitions in term 1 leading into our Annual SAPSASA carnival which will be run 2013 as a true SAPSASA event.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my role this past year and look forward to the challenges in the year to come.

Coaching Report

Since I was elected back on the Board in 2012 as the Coaching Director, I have found it challenging and very rewarding to see coaches progressing and getting rewarded with success.

We held a Coaching Course for Junior and aspiring coaches in September that was held at the Office of Rec. & Sport which provided a grant to assist with this, and training for Officials. It was free and in response to Clubs asking for assistance for their

coaches. We had 15 people attend the course, which was very well received. All participants received a certificate.

We will be holding another one of these free courses in early March 2013, so we are asking all clubs to send all their junior coaches along to help lift the standard of our game.

State and Zone Teams

With changes in processes for 2013 season, we will be advertising for coaches in early December 2012 and making the appointments in January 2013, allowing them as much lead time to prepare their team as they deem necessary.

I would also like to thank all the coaches, managers and all other support staff, who put their hands up to coach the State & Tournament teams in 2012. We had some great success this season with the Senior Men's State Team winning the 2012 National Championships for the first time in 8 years, also the U/15 Girls Storm team for winning 2012 Tournament and the Senior Women's & U/18 Girls State Teams for playing off in the Grand Final of their respective Championships. To all the other teams who represented the State with pride, "Well Done."

Processes

As I said earlier in my report we will be putting new processes in place to appoint coaches & managers etc for future State & Tournament teams. We are also looking at putting a tool (matrix) together for all coaches to help them select their teams. This matrix will consist of skill level, fitness, game sense etc. These protocols will help coaches select their teams and will also give valuable feedback to their players to improve their game. Hopefully these changes will continue to be implemented, modified and added to, as a part of the continuing development of our coaches in SA.

Moving Forward

We need all clubs to place an expectation on their coaches to undertake the accreditation coaching courses that Lacrosse SA offers, or any other lacrosse accreditation courses available, to help them gain more experience and help lift the standard of the game of lacrosse we all love.

Better coaches lead to better athletes. As coaches we expect our players to perform at their best, so we as coaches should do the same, to give our players the best chance to reach their goals.

In closing I'd like to thank Helen & Tiff for all their administrative work that helps support me with my role on the Board and also like to thank all the other directors on the board for their support as well.

Officiating Report

Again my involvement on the board of Lacrosse SA this season has been less effective than I would like. Due to work and family commitments and health reasons I was unable to attend many Board meetings.

My main achievement during the season has been to focus Lacrosse SA on the application of its existing bylaws into the provision of match officials by the clubs. Unfortunately the commitment to the provision of match officials has not been applied by all the clubs. This will result in some clubs being fined heavily for not nominating, not providing, or providing un-nominated or incorrectly attired and/or equipped match officials.

A common criticism that has been directed at me and Lacrosse SA is that we have not done enough to recruit officials. Also that ALRA SA and SAWLUA should be responsible for the recruitment of new officials. The bylaws of Lacrosse SA have for decades placed this responsibility with the clubs as it is in their interest that adequate numbers of trained match officials are available to officiate games. ALRA SA and SAWLUA do not have the resources (people or \$\$\$) to do this on behalf of Lacrosse SA and the clubs. From Lacrosse SA's view the provision of nominated match officials is just part of the annual process of successfully nominating a team to participate in its competitions.

If we were to rely on a third party to recruit match officials, the voluntary component of the officials' contribution to the game would disappear. And the clubs, via their team affiliation fees, would be paying full market rate for the services of all current and future officials. This is because the initial motivation of a person to officiate games for their club/team will be replaced by financial incentives. This will result in many clubs unable to afford to put teams on the ground because their player membership fees would escalate to a point where it would be financially prohibitive to play lacrosse.

SAWLUA does not have enough people (4 active) to continue for much longer to administer, train and allocate umpires to women's games. They were able to hold one training night this season which was poorly attended by club umpires. The allocation of suitable umpires to games has been hampered by the continued provision of non-nominated, untrained, and unaccredited players by their clubs. While it is preferable to have someone rather than no-one, often these people are placed in a position to officiate a game where they are untrained, ill-equipped, inexperienced and easily intimidated by the participants. Fines are pending on these infractions of the bylaws.

I would like to congratulate Jaimi Dinning on winning the Most Improved Women's Umpire award and Tammy Varga on winning the Best Senior Women's Umpire award. I would also like to congratulate Tammy, and Rochelle Cox, on their excellent umpiring at the Australian Senior Women's Lacrosse Championships in Perth in October.

ALRA SA is in a healthier position but lost a number of experienced officials through retirement, work relocation, and family commitments. I know of at least 4 more retirements/unavailability's next season which will put further pressure on the clubs to find replacement nominated referees.

Apart from the previously mentioned problem which is ongoing, two senior men's clubs failed to make any attempt to fill their

nominated referee provision requirement this season. I am assured that the accumulated fines will be applied to those clubs which will be a significant financial burden for them coming into the 2013 Season.

Ben Robinson of Glenelg's League team, and the successful state team, refereed very well in his first season this year. Shane Abbott, this year's Most Improved Referee, continues to officiate at a very high level locally and nationally and plays for Woodville's State League Team. Brian Bartlett is now a highly respected league referee, now that he has retired from playing. Iggy Marchesan and Nathan Aston have both lifted their commitment to refereeing this season. There are many more players, past and present, who potentially could officiate for your club. You just have to ask them or they will never know that you need them to help your club and lacrosse in this way.

Congratulations to Shane Abbott, mentioned before for his Most Improved Referee award and also to David Campbell on winning the 'Golden Whistle' Don Hobbs Award for Best Senior Men's Lacrosse Referee. Well done also to Harrie Thyssen and PJ McConachy on their refereeing performances at the Senior Men's Lacrosse Championships in Perth WA. Harrie Thyssen also successfully officiated at the FIL World Under 19 Lacrosse Championships in Turku, Finland, in July this Year.

I have fully supported the process of reviewing the structure of the Board of Lacrosse SA. However, I am not convinced that it is necessary to change. From my observations of how the meetings have been conducted over the last three seasons, I suggest that a better meeting structure and greater discipline on behalf of the President, directors and staff would facilitate an ability to separate Operational and Strategic discussions and determinations, the main reason for seeking this change.

As a result of the proposed new structure, the position of Director Officiating will no longer have a role in contributing to the strategic direction of Lacrosse SA or have an avenue to debate the operational decisions of the other directors as they may affect lacrosse match officials. The position therefore no longer offers me any incentives or motivations to continue in the role, (existing or modified).

I therefore, hereby tender my resignation from the position of Director Officiating of Lacrosse SA.

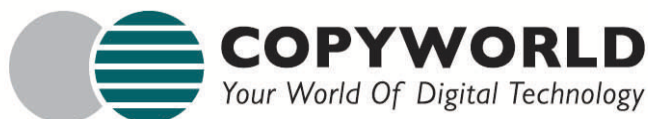
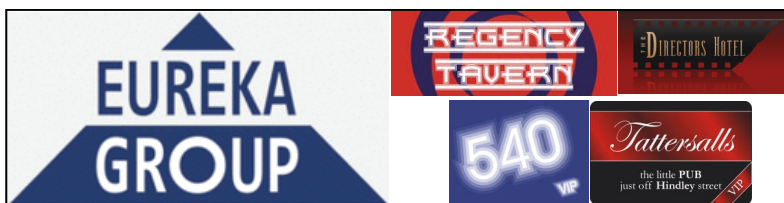
