Visit to Australia in July of the American lacrosse team and the ALC Carnival in Melbourne in July-August gives more than usual interest to the Victorian season opening on Saturday.

The Americans are due to arrive by air at Melbourne on July 2. Present plans are that they will go immediately to Perth for three matches, then to Adelaide for three games, and be in Melbourne to play in the Carnival to begin on July 30.

The last international lacrosse visit to Australia was by the redoubtable Canadians in 1907.

Those Australians still surviving, who played against the visitors 52 years ago, will be keen to study the changes that have taken place in America.

Big lift

This year's visit should give a tremendous fillip to the game in Australia, and there will be keen competition among leading players to gain a place in the Australian team to play the visitors during the Carnival.

A pleasing feature of this season is that nearly 100 more players than last year will take the field.

These will all be in the under-age sections, which indicates that the game has now turned the corner with a vengeance.

In the A Section pennant games on Saturday Malvern will play Williamstown at Malvern Cricket Ground. MHSOB are at home to Caulfield at High School Oval and at McDonald Reserve. Coburg will be at home to MCC.

Malvern, last year's premiers, are at full strength and should beat Williamstown.

Runners-up last season, Caulfield should beat MHSOB, but the match at McDonald Reserve should be close.

There is some doubt regarding Coburg's strength for the opening game but MCC are chock full of confidence and I think they can win.

Lacrosse Test in Melbourne

The M.C.G. may be the scene of another form of Test match on August 8—an international match between a visiting American universities' lacrosse team and an Australian side.

An application has gone to the Melbourne Cricket Club and the Victorian Football League for the use of the ground on that date.

The League has deferred consideration until its position in relation to grounds for this season is clarified.

At present the ground is booked for a V.F.L. third 18 match that day.

The lacrosse Test is planned as the culmination of the Australian lacrosse championship series to be played in Melbourne. The touring team will be drawn from the Washington-Lee and Virginia universities, and will consist of 22 players, two coaches and a manager.

U.S. lacrosse team to tour Australia

An American lacrosse team will tour Australia in July and August this year.

It will be the first overseas lacrosse team to come here since a Canadian team played here in 1907.

The American team will be made up of players from the Washington-Lee and Virginia Universities.

The Americans will visit three States—Victoria, South and Western Australia.

They are expected to reach Sydney on July 2 and will stay here until late August.

The Americans are paying their own fares to Australia, and the Australian association is paying their fares within Australia.

U.S. Lacrosse Team's Trip

A team of 22 American lacrosse players, with their coach and manager, will pay about £12,500 in air fares to visit Australia in July for a series of matches.

The Australian Lacrosse Council will meet the bill for the visitors' inter-State travel—estimated at between £1300 and £1600.

Accommodation and entertainment for the Americans will be the individual responsibility of each State.

The visit has been timed to coincide with the triennial Australian lacrosse carnival, for which Victoria will be the host State.

The tentative programme for the U.S. team provides for three matches in Perth and Adelaide before returning to Melbourne for the carnival.

Last match of the carnival will be Australia v. U.S.A., which the lacrosse council hopes to stage at the M.C.G. Midweek carnival matches will be played at Albert ground.

INJURIES IN LACROSSE

The injuries suffered by players nearly every Saturday should be cause for some alarm to club administrators. It is surprising they don't insist on players wearing protective caps.

In the first game this season Caulfield defence winger Don Miller needed five stitches in his head after being struck with an opponent's stick.

Lacrosse is a tough game and few players escape at least a few smacks every Saturday.

Miller is one of many who prefers to play without a padded cap but it is surely costing trouble to repeatedly take the field without head protection.

Many players say they prefer to risk injury rather than wear a cap and endure some discomfort.

From personal experience I can appreciate this viewpoint but I also found by bitter experience that it was foolhardy to continue playing without adequate protection.

In Perth in 1956 I was taken with the type of cap worn by the West Australians. It gave better protection than the local type and less discomfort from perspiration.

With the visit of the Americans fast approaching this matter of protection assumes greater importance than ever.

The Yanks have a reputation for playing the game hard and the fact that they wear shoulder pads and arm guards and padded caps and gloves shows they expect plenty of smacks.

Saturday's lacrosse game between Malvern and Caulfield, the undefeated leaders in A grade, is equally important to both clubs.

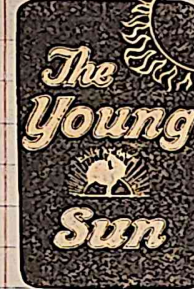
Malvern is striving to win its 10th successive premiership, while Caulfield is equally determined to celebrate its 50th year of lacrosse with a premiership pennant.

Lacrosse! It was deadly

NONE of the young "baggataway" players of Chief Pontiac's tribe would have raised a sweat at any of our League training nights.

Especially those keen bucks who were picked for a tribe versus tribe match.

"Baggataway" the ancestor of lacrosse, was the Red Indian's favorite sport, but the players usually ended up in worse shape than the 36 in the Melbourne-Collingwood grand final replay.

Sometimes between 600 and 1000 fully-painted warriors — of rival tribes — fought one another for goals.

"Baggataway" was between a sport and deadly combat (slightly more combat than sport).

During July and August some of the best "baggataway" teams still fighting it out will play in Melbourne.

Today this once blood-thirsty game has been modified and renamed lacrosse. We have 608 registered "baggataway" players who play every winter week-end in Melbourne.

In fact, boys in 10 schools are being coached in the old Indian racquet and ball game.

Rules and umpires have taken all the early savagery out of it, yet "baggataway" played on our local reserves is still a gruelling game.

In the coming carnival

a United States team will play an Australian team and selected sides from the three main lacrosse States, Victoria, South Australia and Western Australia.

Chief Pontiac and his fellows played the game this way: A ball was placed in a neutral spot of the field. The aim was for each team to get possession of the ball, then holding it in the loop of the stick, carry it across a specified goal line.

Didn't matter

How you got the ball away from an opponent, or how he managed to free it from you didn't matter.
