LACROSSE.

Camberwell's Continued Success.

Camberwell played their best game of the season against Williamstown. They struck off with great dash, and clever exchanges between Webb, Lilburn and Kerrigan resulted in an early goal. At quarter-time they led 2-0. Williamstown opened the second quarter with a series of hot attacks. James from Lilburn's stick enabled Kerrigan, Grant and Webb to score in a brilliant free minute, and at half-time Camberwell led 5-0. After half-time Williamstown's forwards led the visiting defenders standing. Read was outstanding, and Monchore was also prominent. At three-quarter time the score was—Camberwell, 5; Williamstown, 4. The last quarter provided the best play for the day. Camberwell's defence proved impenetrable, and neither side scored. Camberwell's best were McCorkell, Berthou, Bird, Dickinson, Smith and Lilburn, and the goals were scored by Kerrigan (2), Webster, Grant and Webb. For Williamstown, Fowler, Monchore, McNeillage, and the goal throwers, Read (2), Jones and Hickey, were outstanding.

The third term was productive of the highest standard of play in the history of the quarter. Cauffield drew away to register their second win with a tally of 7 goals to 3. The winners' best were N. Colong generally put up a good game against Malvern. The teams scored goal 4-1 at quarter-time, the sectional score, 2 all, 6 all, 12-11 and 15 to 11 indicate. Introduced to the game by the retiring secretary, with whom he was associated in a legal firm while doing articles, the newly-elected secretary has worked his way up in the game from the lower grades of the Williamstown club to the senior ranks. The assistant secretary (Mr. C. H. Gibbs), who resigned last night after the election, agreed to carry on at the request of the Association until another assistant secretary could be appointed.

The general committee, after a protracted meeting, arrived at several important decisions. The financing of the forthcoming carnival occupied a considerable part of the evening. Owing to the lack of support given by followers in general it was decided to make a levy on all players above D section, and the formation of a schedule was referred to the executive committee. An election was held to fill the office of hon. secretary, following the resignation of Mr. Balmer, and Mr. A. Fowler, a former Williamstown delegate, was successful. M.C.C. Defeat Camberwell.

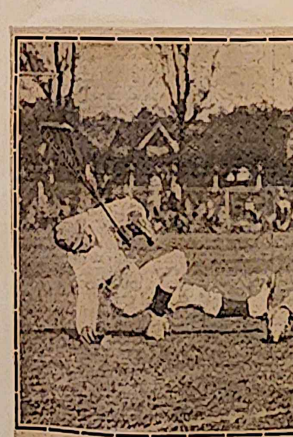

Kerrigan, with fine anticipation, placed Lilburn in possession for Camberwell's first goal. M.C.C. led 3-1 at quarter time. Faulty passing caused many chances to be lost. Half time, M.C.C. 5, Camberwell 2. M.C.C. were exploiting the odd man system to advantage. They were still ahead 8-6 at the final change. Camberwell defence became very ragged in the closing stages. M.C.C. 11 goals to 7. The winners' best were Wilson, McIndoe, Gillies, Hough and Robson, and their goals were scored by Gillies (1), Robson (3), Redmond, Kerrigan, Grant and Smith were outstandingly effective, and the goals were thrown by Kerrigan (3), Grant (2), Lilburn and Webster.

LACROSSE.

By Iroquois.

There will be some interesting discussions at the next meeting of delegates of Victorian clubs, which will be held at the Amateur Sports Club's rooms on June 27. Among other important matters to come before the meeting are proposals and amendments to the laws of lacrosse and rules of the game. These proposals, if agreed to, will become recommendations to the Australian Lacrosse Council, which meets in Melbourne in August next. This will be in compliance with the request of the Australian council to all the States to submit suggestions that will promote uniformity in the rules and interpretations.

It is stated that a majority of the delegates favour the suggestion to decrease the distance between the nets to 30 yards. While it is probable that this will be made a definite recommendation to the Victorian association, it most likely will be one of the proposals.

The council will probably be asked for a definite ruling on the interpretation of the law regarding the offence of a player during a match. This is usually done by the referee standing down the injured player's place man; but section 6 of law 11, which directs the referee's action in this case, also provides that if either captain thinks that such "standing down" of the injured player's place man causes injustice to his team, he may place the man available before the referee, and should the referee consider he may equalise the sides by standing down any other opponent he may think fit. The exercise of an objection by a captain has sometimes caused unpleasantness and disagreement, and it is felt that a definite and concise ruling is needed.

Another subject that will be discussed at the delegates' meeting relates to differing practices of some of the States. Should a goalkeeper be out of his crease when the referee blows his whistle for play to start, or is he allowed by the rules to move from his position and to resume play? The goal, excepting when he has caused the foul, in the State the goalkeeper's place on the field when the whistle sounds, and he goes back into his crease, is allowed to be taken by another player. The council will be asked to rule definitely on this.

At the end of the first round of home-and-home matches in the Victorian premiership, Malvern heads the list in the senior section with an undisturbed record and with 31 points gained. M.C.C. coming next with 22. Caulfield and University are equal for third place with 18 points, and Williamstown and Coburg have 12 points each, and Melbourne High School Old Boys are at the bottom of the list with 8 points.

Malvern's A section team equals the performance of the club's senior team, being also undefeated and having gained 25 points. Caulfield (23 points), Ivanhoe (25), Williamstown and Adult Deaf and Dumb (each 24) come next.

Hawthorn is leading in the B section (32 points), with Glen Iris (25), University and Melbourne High School Old Boys (each 26) next in order of success.

Caulfield and Hartwell are equal for the lead in C section, with 22 points, followed by Williamstown (23), Junior Legacy (21), and Royal Australian Naval Reserve (19).

Williamstown led in the first division of D section, with the maximum number of points, Brunswick gained 22 points, Sunshine and University High School 22 each. In the second division Melbourne High School Old Boys (undefeated, 26 points), Caulfield (23), Power House (22), Glen Iris and Malvern (each 16), are the leading teams.

A section of lacrosse matches in Adelaide last Saturday was Jack Lee's feat in throwing 14 goals for North Adelaide, which defeated East Torrens by 17 to 10. (H. D. LACROSSE TEAM FROM U.S.A.

Yankee Club Coming

BOX GAME OUTDOORS FAVORED

TO play a series of outdoor as well as box lacrosse games, an American team has planned a visit to Australia this year.

The advice was received today in a letter from the Yankee Lacrosse Club, New York, to the president of the Australian Lacrosse Association (Mr. Phillip Sharpe). The secretary of the Yankee Club (Mr. James A. Macdonald) states that, if his club wins the pennant in the American championship series, as it seems likely to do, a party of 15, including a team of six and four substitutes, will leave San Francisco about October 15. They will return to New York by May 15, 1933.

Australia has no organized series of club games at present, but tonight at the Wattle Path Palais, St. Kilda, two trial games will be played. If they are a success an extended series of games will be arranged.

The game follows the lacrosse rules, but is played on an indoor area about half the size of an ordinary playing field. A softer ball is used and there are six men on each side. Play in the confined space is fast and spectacular. The ordinary goal nets are used, and in America, a time limit of 40 minutes is fixed.

AUSTRALIAN GAME

Since Australia is credited with having invented box lacrosse there is an interesting history behind the new sport. News that the game was being taken up in Australia was received in New York about two years ago. The Ice Hockey League there adopted the game. A publicity campaign was set in operation to forward "the great Australian game of indoor lacrosse." The Americans engaged professional teams and the game boomed.

Recent cables stated that as many as 10,000 witnessed some of the more important games in America during the last season. From New York box lacrosse spread to Toronto, Chicago, Detroit, Montreal, Cleveland, Buffalo, and Washington, besides having a growing following in Canada. Now Ireland, England, and Germany are reputed to have taken up the sport. Only Australia, the inventor of box lacrosse, lags behind.

The Yankee Lacrosse Club is evidently fielding a formidable team to meet us. The secretary states that the owners of the club are himself, and Mr. Burns. "The Burns referred to," his letter adds "is none other than the popular former world's heavyweight champion, Tommy Burns. Box lacrosse is going over very well in this country. The old-time haphazard open field game played in daylight with twelve men a-side is a thing of the past.

An impression of the enthusiasm with which this game is played in America is given in a sporting newspaper under the heading of "Century's Most Thrilling Sporting Spectacle." In an interview before a big match, John Ringling, the famous Circus King, is reported to have said—

"I know lacrosse. This night game in large cities on summer nights will boom. Not since Ben Hur rode the chariot, and Thorne rent the Lion in the Coliseum has there been anything like Box Lacrosse. I am a God-fearing man of gentle peace, therefore I refuse to play, but I certainly will be looking on."

TOPICS OF THE GAME

Mr. Ron Gibbs, who was a member of the 1926 Victorian team at the Adelaide carnival, has been elected assistant hon. secretary of the V.L.A. to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Cyril Gibbs, who held the position for eight years. Mr. Ron Gibbs is still a playing member of the Caulfield Club.

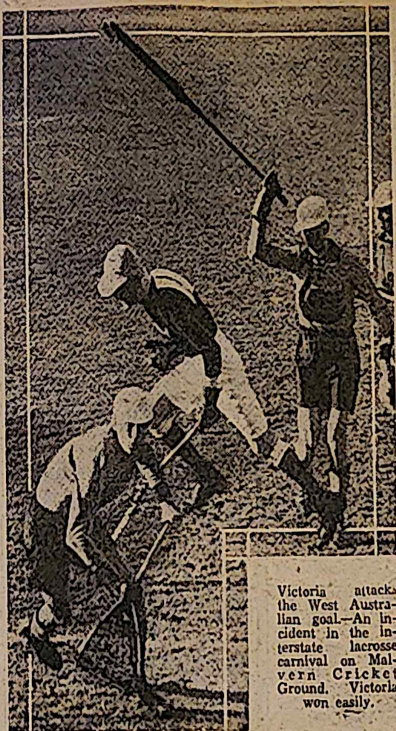

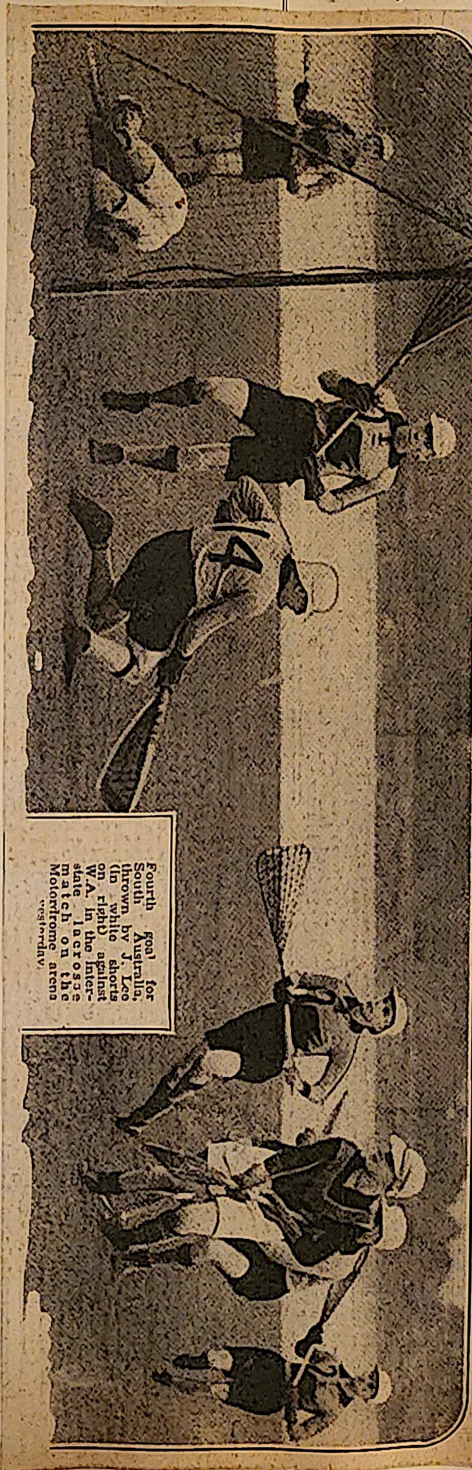

CHANCE OF TAKING CARNIVAL HONORS

By defeating South Australia in one of the most thrilling lacrosse games seen in interstate events in Melbourne for years, West Australia yesterday added intense interest to the concluding games of the carnival.

If the Victorians are beaten on Saturday, the championship title and threat to hold the Garland-McFarquhar cup will be decided on averages.

The West Australians have proved the surprise of the carnival. Their dramatic victory over South Australia demonstrates the rapid improvement in the standard of lacrosse in the West. Nothing finer has ever been seen in Melbourne than West Australia's great first quarter and their heroic rally in the last few seconds for victory.

CENTENARY PLANS

The venue of the next carnival in 1933 is Sydney, but if N.S.W. do not desire to conduct the carnival, Victoria is to have the right to hold it in Melbourne in connection with the centenary celebrations.

The programme for Saturday's matches at the Malvern C.G. is—At 1 o'clock, W.A. v. Queensland; at 3 o'clock, Victoria v. South Australia.

If ground conditions are suitable, a game between two school teams, Worthington's College and Essendon High School, is to be played at the half-time interval on Saturday.

INTERSTATE BOX GAME

Tonight, at Wattle Path Palais, St. Kilda, the first interstate box lacrosse match ever played in Australia will be the big attraction. In addition to two club games, Victoria will play a team from the West of Australia—the Australian team is being selected from the visiting teams.

The Victorian team is—Dentry, Brooks, Kerrigan, Foster, Cutts, Corbett, Reserves: Knowles and Stillington.

The first full meeting of the Australian Lacrosse Council was held on Monday night, when several important alterations were made to the laws of the game. The new laws will come into operation in all States, except South Australia, next season. South Australia has not yet made a definite decision as to whether it intends to join the council.

The office-bearers of the Australian Council for the ensuing year are:—President: Mr. R. O. Moore (Vic.), vice-presidents, Messrs C. Hickey (W.A.), H. W. Kilgour (Qland); honorary secretary, Mr. A. E. G. Webb (Vic.); Auditor, Mr. D. R. Marshall.

At the Williamstown Club's hall to the interstate visitors on Tuesday, Captain Pearson, president of the club, made a presentation of a silver coffee service to Mr. H. R. Balmer, ex honorary secretary of the V.L.A., in recognition of his services to the game. Mr. Balmer has been an office-bearer of the Williamstown Club for over 25 years.

The Carnival celebrations will be concluded on Saturday night, when a smoke night will be given to the visitors at Clota's Cafe, Flinders Street.

The Garland-McFarquhar cup will be presented to the winning team, and a trophy is to be given to the best and fairest player of the carnival. Other presentations are to be made to the late honorary secretary and assistant honorary secretary of the V.L.A.

After the great performances of Ron Cook, the S.A. forward in these games, Victorians are wondering why Cook was omitted from the S.A. side that played Victoria in Adelaide last season. Cook has few equals as a forward in Australia.

Roy Read, the Victorian, did not take long to regain his record for the goal throwing in Carnival matches. Cook, with 12 goals, beat Read's record of 10, gained in Perth in 1929, but on Monday Read came with 13 goals against New South Wales.

Ridings, a new man in the South Australian side, is one of the most promising men of the Carnival, being a defence man of more than ordinary ability.

Perkins, the reserve goalkeeper, of South Australia, is a keeper who should go far. So far Victoria's best men have been the two Coburg representatives, Marshall and Puddy. Robson has also done well, and so has Edwards, although suffering from a bad leg against West Australia.

S.A. IMPRESSIVE AT LACROSSE CARNIVAL

FAST, WELL-BALANCED SIDE Serious Rivals for Victoria

Victories by South Australia over New South Wales, and by Victoria over West Australia, marked the opening of the lacrosse carnival at Malvern C.G. on Saturday. Despite the wintry conditions, some fine-play was witnessed, Monday's games were played in drenching rain. Two individual goal records were broken.

AFTER the early match between New South Wales and South Australia, all the teams paraded before the Lieutenant-Governor, Sir William Irvine, who after being introduced to the managers, declared the carnival open.

Later West Australia met Victoria and provided a fine contest.

Altogether the first day was a great success, the bad weather being the only hindrance.

The strong South Australian team proved too strong for N.S.W., and won easily. The Sydney players showed fine stick work and dash, lacking only a knowledge of the finer points of the game.

While South Australia always closely marked their forwards and never wasted a shot when in scoring position, the N.S.W. players made the mistake of looking for a man in front of goal to pass to instead of shooting or else the forward tried to force his way through a crowded back line.

The light blues gained many friends by their hard fight against such a formidable side. It is a much stronger team that is representing South Australia this year than we have seen for many seasons. They are smart all over the field, with the position play of the forwards outstanding. The hero of the

South Australian side was Ron Cook, who broke the record for Carnival games by scoring 12 goals. Read (Vic.) previously held the record by getting ten against N.S.W. at Perth in 1929.

Cook was at his best, but not far behind was Jack Lee, who with seven goals gave a finished display. Lee is a greatly improved player, and has a big future as a forward.

Muecke gave the best performance we have seen from this tall, dashing player. Kidd was impressive forward, and Ridings, a new man, was one of the best men on the ground. Although a defence player, he was often assisting the attack, and seldom failed to have his man well covered.

Kestel, the captain, is still a fine player, and did many great things while Shimmin, also a new man, showed that he is a player above the average. A couple of his goals were the result of well-judged and perfectly executed shots.

Of the Sydney men I liked Turnbull best of all. He is a great worker, and with more assistance from his club mates probably would have scored freely. He is fit for any good side.

Wood, the goal-keeper, although not properly right after breaking a rib in a club game, gave a capital exhibition. Carlisle, Booth and Cook were efficient players. Wallace, the veteran skipper, still has plenty of lacrosse in him, and McGhee was often prominent.

Although Victoria downed West Australia the honors were just as much with the losers as with the winners. The Westerners made Victoria fight every inch.

Fast, nippy, good stickmen, and in wonderful condition, the W.A. men had perhaps more of the play, and the manner in which they finished troubled the home players.

Victoria's form was not altogether pleasing, and they won because of a slightly superior knowledge of tactics.

Too many Victorians were below club form, and lacked the usual forceful dashing methods. Often the back line was confused, while from the centre there was not quite enough driving force. Our best players were Puddy and Marshall.

Edwards, although suffering from a bad leg, was in good form, and led all the attacks from the centre. Lilburn was a dashing forward, who never once let up. Reid and Robson were always in evidence, but on the whole Victoria were not nearly as convincing as usual, although Wilson set his side a great example by a most finished exhibition of goalkeeping.

Outstanding in W.A. was Don Harrison, the ex-Malvern player, who is a greatly improved forward and got four fine goals. Rudderham is a back whom Victoria could use. Fast and good with his stick he made his forward fight hard for possession. Feeceek also is a dasher.

Scott was a great fighter, and Driflin seemed always in the midst of the fray. Angus, the skipper, is a goal-keeper of more than ordinary ability. Although he does not take the ball as cleanly as Wilson or McCorkell, his slip never causes trouble, as it gets the ball well away.

The conditions on Monday could hardly have been worse, and the ground was soon under water. Still, the standard of play was by no means bad in either game.

Against Victoria the N.S.W. team again had to endure a terrific bombardment. Victoria won easily.

There were several changes in the home team, which was captained by Doug Marshall, who did splendidly. Smith, Wood, Deacon, A. Gibbs and Hore were the new men, and each justified his inclusion. Victoria were more impressive than on Saturday.

Read did not take long to regain the goal-throwing record. Playing great lacrosse, he scored 13 goals, and again has the record. For N.S.W. Wallace, Turnbull, Hale and Emerson (an ex-S.A. player) and Wood, in goal, did well.

South Australia again played most impressively in defeating Queensland comfortably. Take Lacrosse Honors

BY scoring an easy victory over South Australia on the final day, Victoria for the fourth time secured the honors of the Australian lacrosse carnival and will hold the Garland-McHaig Cup for three years. Victoria went through undefeated, while West Australia's only reverse was against Victoria.

THE carnival was a great success, the weather producing the only jarring note. The matches were well contested, and the fine sporting spirit of the players was an outstanding feature.

It was unfortunate that New South Wales and Queensland were hardly strong enough for the other States, but the plucky manner in which they faced strong opposition induced admiration.

FINE W.A. TEAM

West Australia, runners-up for the first time, had one of the finest teams that that State has ever had. The progress of the game in the West during the last three years has been remarkable. This year's team was an infinitely better side than that which represented W.A. at Perth in 1929.

In defeating South Australia, they produced one of the greatest interstate games ever seen in Melbourne. The fact that the Westerners withstood the pressure of South Australia's strong attack in those exciting last few minutes proved that the young W.A. side, besides being great players, also were a steady, cool, well trained band.

The Victorians quite deserved the championship. One cannot recall a more even, speedy or cleverer Victorian side. They were strong and relentless in defence, with Wilson excellent in goal, well supported in front by Reid, Unkenstein and Gibbs.

Marshall was the usual versatile, dashing player, and Robson and Read never played a poor game. Deacon, Smith, Murrowood and Hore proved that they were quite up to interstate standard. Edwards was in wonderful form, and Lilburn, Puddy, McCorkell, Beattie and Woods showed excellent form.

Against South Australia, the Victorians were seen at their best, and the manner in which they battered the defence and swept the Southerners off their feet in every part of the field demonstrated what a powerful side the Victorians really were.

South Australia proved disappointing, for although there were many great players in the side, there were some weak links, and when the strain was on, both against West Australia and Victoria, these proved the side's undoing.

The selection of Ron Cook, of South Australia, as the best and fairest player of the carnival was a popular choice,

and one well deserved. Cook played some capital games, and proved easily the best man for S.A., although close behind him was Ridings, whose dashes from the back line were always attractive and effective.

One of the best men in the carnival was Rudderham, the W.A. defence man, while Angus was next to Wilson and McCorkell as a goal-tender. Peacock and Scott displayed great ability, while Knight's performance against S.A. was that of a champion. Buchan and Berry were forwards equal to any of the Easterners.

N.S.W., still the Cinderella of lacrosse, had no victory. While individually they had many fine players a lack of cohesion and knowledge of tactics negated the good play of the best men. Turnbull was a good forward; Wood, in goal, did well, while the veteran captain, Wallace, worked like a Trojan.

The Garland-McHaig Cup was handed to the Victorian captain, Jack Beattie, at the smoke night on Saturday evening by Mr. R. O. Moore, president of the Australian Council, and Mr. Angus Mitchell presented to R. Cook, of S.A., the trophy for the best and fairest player. During the evening Mr. H. R. Balmer and Mr. C. H. Gibbs, the ex-hon. secretary and assistant hon. secretary of the V.L.A., received presentations from members of the V.L.A. in recognition of their services rendered.

CUP FOR PERTH

Captain Fearon, vice-president of the V.L.A., has handed to the manager of the West Australian team a cup for the W.A. Association for competition among the juniors of Perth. Captain Fearon made this presentation in recognition of the great form of the West Australians in the carnival.

To mark the appreciation of the visitors at the efforts made to enable them to enjoy themselves, they made presentations to Mr. A. J. Fowler, hon. secretary of the V.L.A., and Mr. R. Schmidt, the carnival secretary.

The Australian Lacrosse Council has elected Mr. R. O. Moore (Vic.) as president for the coming year, with Messrs C. Hickey (W.A.), and Mr. H. Kilgour (Q.) as vice-presidents, Mr. A. E. G. Webb (Vic.) hon. secretary and treasurer, and Mr. D. R. Marshall (Vic.) auditor.

The Council decided that next season substitutes will be allowed in all games up till half-time in the event of any injury to players.

The venue of the next carnival is Sydney, in 1933, but in the event of the N.S.W. Association not desiring to conduct the carnival Victoria is to have the event in connection with the centenary celebrations.

The Victorian lacrosse season, has now ended with the exception of a grand final in the E section, which is to be played on Saturday next between Workingmen's College and Essendon. Williamstown won the final, but were disqualified for playing a man over age.

The interstate visitors had their first experience of box lacrosse when a series of games were played last Thursday at Wattle Park Palace. The Australian Council has asked each of the State Associations to suggest rules for the control of the game. It is certain that box lacrosse will be played all over Australia next year.
