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# The 2006 Logo

THE PROCESS OF selecting a logo was a long-term process that involved public consultation and review.

The official logo for the 2006 World Lacrosse Championships was designed by London, Ontario commerçial artist Brett Mason.

The symbolism Mason portrays in this image is that of the maple leaf and the lacrosse stick, and the process of selecting the right colours and imagery was very comprehensive.

"Primitive styled brush stokes depict a maple leaf altered to form a lacrosse stick," Mason said. "An elongated stem serves as the handle of the stick, while the leaf forms the pocket. Lines are added to simulate mesh.

"One colour is used to preserve the unity of the design," Mason adds. "Red is chosen to represent the host country, Canada"

The logo was one of many developed for the games. Tournament Chair Tim Hobbs narrowed the field to six logos and showed the various interpretations to a very diverse cross-section of people. Upon completing this market analysis of 400 people from

all walks of life, it was concluded that Mason's logo was the most popular.

"It is very marketable and has consumer appeal," Hobbs said. "But more importantly, it represents the true spirit of Canada in its endeavor of hosting of the World Championships in 2006."



# **Frankly Speaking**

### One on one with Team Canada Head Coach Frank Nielsen

AS HEAD COACH of Canada's national men's field lacrosse program since 1995, Vancouver resident Frank Nielsen hopes that good things come in threes.

In his third effort to lead Team Canada's men's squad to victory, Nielsen believes his chances are the best they've ever been this July, when Canada hosts the world championships in London, Ontario.

A sea of loyal Canucks will be present at TD Waterhouse Stadium on July 22 when the 2006 Warrior World Lacrosse Championships come to an end; Nielsen just hopes they're cheering for a Canadian gold-medal victory, the first one since in 1978.

Time warp back to the '78 games in Manchester, England, when International Lacrosse Federation Executive Director Stan Cockerton and Assistant Coach David Huntley were players on the national team.

Canada won the championship in dramatic fashion, edging the Americans 17-16 in overtime. It's the last time the Americans have lost in this tournament, and it's the only time Canada has won the world field championship. Nielsen believes the Canadians not only have home-field advantage on their

side this time around, but increased field lacrosse talent to help them out.

"In the past we've had a group of Canadian box lacrosse players who came out to make Team Canada's men's lacrosse team. The knowledge base for field wasn't always there," Nielsen admitted. "But right from the start of our camps for this team, we knew there was an increased skill and knowledge base. We feel very confident that we are bringing a great lacrosse team to London."

Nielsen, who was also the head coach and GM of the New Westminster Salmonbellies WLA team and is currently the GM of the Maple Ridge Burrards, has a great supporting cast of coaches in Ed Comeau, Randy Mearns, David Huntley and Jeff Gombar. He knows the added NCAA experience with newcomers to the senior men's program including Brodie Merrill, Matt Vinc, Ryan Ward and Jeff Zywicki will be instrumental in the team's success. Drawman Geoff Snider will also be a key player in helping

the Canadians to establish a possession game.

"Overall, the team now has better athletes," Nielsen said. "The talent pool is so much wider now. Before you could probably pick the top half of your team before the camp even began. But you cannot do that now. Now you only know the top four or five guys going in.


"The knowledge base for the field game is way up, there's a higher number of Canadian players going to the NCAA and it is significant in our development. The NCAA game has really helped Canadians to learn how to play field (lacrosse)."

Also of significance is the improving Canadian university field lacrosse league based in Ontario and Quebec. Midfielder Stephen Hoar who played with the University of Toronto Varsity Blues, is a significant contributor who can act as a drawman and adds speed at both ends of the field.

"You look at the OLA and WLA and how guys used to show up out of shape to camp and make the team. You cannot afford to do that anymore," said Nielsen, a member of the 1986 Canadian team which won silver. "Now with the NLL and MLL around, you have athletes showing up in better shape. If you're not an athlete, you're not going to be the best at this game. There were great lacrosse players who did not make this Team Canada because they were not great athletes during the time of the camps."

Part of that conditioning will be a series of exhibition games set up for Team Canada prior to the games. Nielsen says this is key to getting those Team Canada players in the summer boxla leagues back into the field lacrosse system.

"It takes a box player four to six games to get into a field lacrosse mindset, it's important to get those players into the right mindset. We cannot afford to miss a beat."







### Completing Your Lacrosse Travel Experience

The 2006 edition of the World Lacrosse Championships offers fans in Ontario an excellent chance to see their favourite Major Series Lacrosse players in a different setting than they are accustomed to.

The team most stocked with MSL talent, for obvious reasons, is the host nation Canada, featuring Colin Doyle and Brodie Merrill of the Brampton Excelsiors, Tom Phair and John Grant Jr. of the Peterbrough Lakers, Billy Dee Smith of the Six Nations Chiefs, and AJ Shannon, Gavin Prout, Stephen Hoar, Steven Toll, Jeff Zywicki and Shawn Williams of the Brooklin Redmen.

As of mid-June, the various members of Team Canada also playing Major Series Lacrosse in 2006 were performing exceptionally well. In his first eight games with the Excelsiors, Colin Doyle registered 53 points (18G-35A), good for first place in the league in scoring as of June 16. Brooklin's Shawn Williams registered 51 points (18G-33A) in his first 8 games, a total that placed him second behind Doyle in league scoring and in first place on the Redmen. Williams' Team Canada teammates Gavin Prout and Steven Toll were tied for second on Brooklin in scoring with 31 points each.

In addition to having several stars from the Ontario Lacrosse Association, Team Canada also possesses a bevy of players from the Western Lacrosse Association, including Ryan Ward and Andy Turner, who were both members of the 2005 Mann Cup Champion Victoria Shamrocks. Also representing the WLA on Team Canada are Chris Seller (New Westminster), Geoff Snider (Coquitlam) and Taylor Wray (Coquitlam). In addition to Ward and Turner, both Gary Gait and Tom Marechek won Minto Cups (in 1987) and Mann Cups in Victoria (in the late 1990s). In total, no fewer than 10 members of Team Canada have won a Mann Cup during their career, an excellent sign for Canada's hopes at this tournament.

The Iroquois Nationals' line-up also contains some faces familiar for fans of Major Series Lacrosee. Delby Powless and Cal Smith both play for the Six Nations Chiefs while Brett Bucktooth plays forward for the St. Regis Indians. In his first three games for the Indians, Bucktooth scored six goals and dished out seven assists for a total of 13 points.

As of June 16, Delby Powless led Six Nations in scoring, having registered 30 points on four goals and 26 assists through nine games.

In addition to the powerful Canadian and Iroquois squads, other countries with Canadian box lacrosse stars on their roster include Team Netherlands (Jonas Derks - St. Regis Indians) and Scotland (Jordan McBride - New Westminster Salmonbellies, British Columbia Junior 'A' Division). Jordan's brother Andrew plays senior ball for the Coquitlam Adanacs.

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
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

The International Lacrosse Federation is the international governing body of men's lacrosse for the world.

The mission of the ILF as governing body of men's lacrosse is to promote and develop the sport throughout the world, maintain rules and regulations for international competition and conduct events and World Championships.

The Federation, whilst only formed in 1974, internationally administers a sport which has been played for many, many centuries. The Federation is the organization, the sport is the religion.



### International Lacrosse Federation

In 1974, the Federation included only four members, now it encompasses 19 full members and eight affiliate members. The growth in the last decade has been astounding, and with that growth comes the requirement for resources of money and people. With that growth also comes requirements for planning and organization, and the ILF has recognized that.

At the men's World Championship held in Melbourne, Australia in 1974, plans were established for regular World Championships. Since then, the ILF has introduced a field lacrosse Under-19 World Championship and a senior men's indoor lacrosse World Championship. All championships are conducted every four years, and the International Lacrosse Federation accepts bids from members before granting the hosting rights for these events.

The Federation's focus for a number of years has been to ensure that maximum effort and resources are invested into the development of the sport internationally. One of the results of this has been the significant increase in membership and this has been a real success story. New players continue to be attracted to the game and we now have lacrosse players on all continents including Africa. We look forward to new members joining the Federation. The International Lacrosse Development Committee is a joint organization with the International Federation of Women's Lacrosse Associations and it has provided support for most of our membership and support for new lacrosse programs in other nations including Namibia in Africa.

Strategic planning has been undertaken in recent years, leading to the appointment of a committee

> which has the task of examining the question of unification with the IFWLA and this task is well advanced. Members will decide on this program in the immediate foreseeable future.

It is an aim of the ILF for lacrosse to be represented in premier sports events such as the Olympics; however, we must recognize that we are still a long way from IOC qualification. It will continue to be pursued.

The ILF is an international governing body with huge responsibilities, but the reality is that it is a small organization which depends very largely on the efforts of a few people.

The thanks of all involved in lacrosse are given to all who have provided outstanding efforts as officials, players, coaches, administrators, donors and supporters. We also recognize the efforts of World Championship hosts and particularly the hosts of our next three events:

2007 Senior Indoor World Championship

### **Home Field Advantage?**

On home soil, Canada hopes to end American domination. A former national team player turned ILF Vice President says unity and chemistry are the keys to success

LOOKING TO END the Americans' dominance at the World Lacrosse Championships, Team Canada has been re-tooled to unite a blend of youth and veteran leadership in their quest to win on home soil in London, Ontario.

It will take more than just talent though to end the undefeated streak of Team USA stretching across six world championships.

Stan Cockerton was a member of last team to defeat the USA, the 1978 edition of Team Canada. He said team unity is an important factor in winning a world championship.

"We got spanked 28-4 in the opening game that year by the U.S.," he explains. "But we had a very unique group of guys, some of the best lacrosse players of that era together on one team.

"Most importantly, we gelled through the tournament. It was more about our positive outlook and unity on the team that helped us to win the gold-medal game."

Canada edged the U.S. 17-16 in overtime at the 1978 Games in Manchester, England, to win gold. It was a watershed moment not only for Canadian lacrosse, but for the international lacrosse community in general.

Cockerton, currently a Vice President with the International Lacrosse Federation and the Executive Director of the Ontario Lacrosse Association, said retribution in the final started with the opening goal by John Grant Sr. His son John Grant Jr. is an attackman on the 2006 edition of Team Canada.

"We went into the game with our heads up. I remember, the bus was just rocking going up to the game. The feeling was very positive," Cockerton recalls. "From my perspective, that first goal was key. We felt then we could win, it got us off to a great start."

Now in his fourth year as the ILF's Vice President, Cockerton feels privileged to be able to give back to the game. He knows the Canadian team upending the Americans was important for the global development of the sport and the Canadian interest of field lacrosse.

"Us winning the gold in '78 helped to spur the international growth of lacrosse and secured the ILF championships," he said. "In 1982, it was a big event. The U.S. really wanted to beat us after losing in 1978... and they did. But it raised the competitiveness of the sport. It helped with the overall development of lacrosse."

The Canada-USA rivalry is rich in lacrosse, as it is in many other sports.

"We've had some great games with the U.S., in particular in 1998 when Canada was down by nine goals and nearly won," Cockerton said. "It was one of the greatest lacrosse games I've ever experienced."

Cockerton predicts the Canada vs. USA game on July 16 at 4 p.m. will be another epic match up.

"America's 28-year winning streak gives added incentive to win against them. It would be great for the championships once again to see another winner. It would help with worldwide lacrosse development."

But Cockerton also points out that with other development in the top division—with Japan, Australia, Iroquois and England always improving—there is no easy game. Canada can't look past any of the 19 international teams to focus soley on the USA game.

"We know Canada can score, and our defence looks really good. But when it's all said and done, technically it comes down to faceoffs, ground balls and key saves, and of course the intangible element of team unity."







# **Blue Division Preview**

U.S.A.

Powerhouse Americans enter tournament as favourites once again. U.S. only defeated once in international play, in 1978 to Canada

THE ROSTER FOR TEAM U.S.A. in the 2006 World Lacrosse Championships reads like a who's-who of lacrosse in the United States of the past decade.

Casey, Ryan, Michael Powell from Syracuse University are all at attack, possibly the greatest three Americans to play the game, with fellow Orange alumni Roy Colsey playing midfield.

University of Virginia alum Jay Jalbert is also playing up the middle, coming off of a National Lacrosse League championship with the Colorado Mammoth, along with Johns Hopkins product Kyle Harrison, who helped lead the Blue Jays to their first national title in 18 years in 2005.

Trevor Tierney, the Princeton University stalwart will be standing between the pipes again for the stars and stripes, while fellow Tiger Christian Cook, who won three consecutive NCAA titles for Old Nassau anchors the defence.

One player that opponents will certainly key on is Johns Hopkins product Kyle Harrison, who helped lead the Blue Jays to their first national title in 18 years in 2005. Harrison won both the Tewaaraton Trophy and the Lt. Ray Enners Award in 2005 as the top player in NCAA lacrosse, while scoring 44 points (24 G, 20 A) in his senior season. The native of Baltimore, Maryland, earned his spot on the team through a tryout that came in a two-week span that saw Harrison the Blue Jays win the National Championship, as well as participating in the Warrior Major League Lacrosse Challenge and being selected by the New Jersey Pride as the first overall pick in the NLL Draft.

While Canada and the Iroquois Nation may be recognized as the other top teams in the Blue Division, Team U.S.A.'s strength is tied to the simple facts that its' players have been reared in the field game and have had their mettle tested in big games previously.

Between them, the Americans have 16 NCAA

Championships, as well as multiple players who have contributed to Major League Lacrosse championships.

Coached by legendary Syracuse University bench-boss John Desko, who has nine NCAA titles to his credit (three as head coach and six as an assistant), Team U.S.A. will have just three games to prepare for the World Championships, facing Ireland, the Syracuse University Alumni, and their most formidable test, the MLL All-Stars in the three weeks leading up to the teams' arrival in London.

### **Australia**

Men At Work: Team Australia is looking to capture its first World Championship after coming up short on home soil in 2002

BOASTING A PROUD HISTORY of four silver and five bronze medals, these "Aussie Sharks" are committed to winning Australia's first gold medal at the

2006 World Lacrosse Championships.

Australia has high expectations of this team. It boasts a fine combination of experience and youth, and provides a powerful line-up for first-time Australian coaches. Peter Brown (Head Coach) and Murray Keen (Assistant Coach), who was named to the 1990 World All-Stars Team as a goalkeeper.

The Aussie Sharks have finished runner-up to Team U.S.A. three times at this tournament. An eclectic mix of wily veterans and eager youngsters should make the team from Down Under both competitive and exciting to watch here in London.

Peter Inge, who plays for the San Francisco Dragons of the MLL, will be counted on to provide veteran leadership on the young Australian team. A dependable face-off man, Inge is the centrepiece of a rugged Australian defensive core.

Australia's Captain from the 2003 U-19 World Championships, Josh Ardossi (Maryland recruit, coming off a recent ankle injury), leads Australia's young guns along with Kim Delfs (Adelphi) and Brendan Mundorf (UMBC), all of whom will be expected to produce.

Mundorf was recently selected to the STX/USILA All-America squad as a member of the Third Team attack unit. Wes Green (Adelphi), a 2006 Tewaaratwon Trophy nominee, Nathan Stiglich and Mark Mangan (Adelphi) will add very capable offensive depth.

Darren Nicholas, a 6' 1", 209-lb. member of the MLL's Long Island Lizards, will be counted on heavily at the midfield position. In net, Scott Garnsworthy will be relied on heavily to confound opposing shooters.

"We've got an additional eight newcomers who are quietly going about their business preparing to make an impact on the lacrosse world," said Head Coach Peter Brown. "We're happy for the focus to be on host country Canada & current champions the U.S.A. We have the utmost respect for every nation in the blue division.

"I believe that this is the best conditioned team ever to leave Australian shores and that this team has laid some very important stones in the foundation of cultural change for Australian lacrosse teams."

In preparation for the World Championships, Team Australia recently played three exhibition games against NCAA Div. III team Haverford. Coach Brown felt that the outstanding sense of togetherness that these preliminary matches instilled in his team will be of benefit as Australia goes after the IILF's top prize in London.

"Haverford provided us with the ideal opportunity to commence our journey as a playing group," said Brown. "The players were, without exception, totally unselfish in their implementation of the game plan, and although it wasn't all smooth sailing, there wasn't a hint of disunity."

Overall, Team Australia appears to be extremely well balanced and will definitely be in the running for an appearance in this year's title match for a fourth time.

### Japan

Land of the rising sport: Japanese lacrosse has evolved with tremendous rapidity since its mid-1980's inception

QUICKLY APPROACHING its twentieth anniversary of existence, the Japan Lacrosse Association has come a long way since it was founded in 1987,

after Johns Hopkins University donated some equipment to Keio University in hopes of spreading the sport of lacrosse in Asia.

The Japan Lacrosse Club Team Association was subsequently founded in 1990 and many of the players appearing for their country at the 2006 World Lacrosse Championships are products of this extremely well-run organization.

Japan first appeared at an international event in 1992, when the Under-19 Men's team competed at the World Cup; the Senior Men's National Team first competed at the World Cup in 1994. Then in 1998, Japan took part in the World Lacrosse Championships in Baltimore and earned a respectable eighth-place finish at the tournament after dropping their final match to Scotland in overtime.

The 1998 tournament proved to be an invaluable learning experience for the Japanese lacrosse community, and four years later they made the world take note that the sport was growing at a rapid rate throughout the country.

At the World Championships in 2002, Japan dominated the second division, finishing with a record of 5-0 while outscoring their opponents 77-30 in the round robin. Japan followed this success up with a 13-12 upset of England to finish in fifth place overall in the tournament. They could be the most feared team in the Blue Division simply because other coaches find difficulty scouting the relatively unfamiliar opponent.

Japan will rely on its veteran leaders, specifically captains Mitsuhito Okabe and Motoki Hirata to help take their squad to the next level on the international stage. Okabe will be a force to be reckoned with at midfield while Hirata will anchor a strong defensive unit that includes, amongst others, Kensuke Kimura, Takaaki Yoshioka, Takero Kobayashi and Masahiro Maeda.

Shinya Maruyama, who had 25 goals and four assists in 2002, is expected to lead a potent offence. Head coach and GM Tetsuo Fukasawa is exceedingly familiar with his roster. Goal-scoring threats Maruyama and Tetsuhiro Muranatsu played for Fukasawa on the Valentia Lacrosse Club in Japan, as did goaltender Takahiko Shinohara. Shinohara will be backed up in goal up by Kazuhiko Udagawa, who starred for his club team the Raggamuffins last year, as well as newcomer Tomohide Sasaki, who most recently tended goal for the Nippon College of Health and Physical Education.

Along with Okabe at midfield, Japan will be looking to Valentia stars Nobutake Sueki and Atsushi Yamanaka to utilize their tremendous speed and stick work to move the ball effectively up the field. Speed will definitely be a strength for the Japanese.

Japan gained the respect of the lacrosse world after their performance at the 2002 World Championships. In 2006, they'll be looking to build upon that success and earn a berth in the semi-finals. While this seems like a tall order for a country that only first began playing the sport 19 years ago, the Japanese are looking forward to proving that they truly belong in the upper echelon of international lacrosse powers.

### **Iroquois Nationals**

Looking for redemption in London, star-studded squad will look for creativity and fast-break style to excel

ENTERING THE TOURNEY, the Iroquois Nationals are ranked fourth after a less-than-perfect performance in Perth Australia in 2002. Many on this team

still remember the heartbreaking one goal loss to the host Australians.

Since that tournament, Iroquois teams finished third in the U-19 tournament and second at the World Indoor Lacrosse Championship. Building on these successful tournaments this team is determined to finish in the medals.

They know the United States are the team to beat. The U.S.A. has the best field lacrosse league in the world in the NCAA men's divisions to train their players and develop the talent. And while more and more Iroquois players are playing in the NCAA, they are still outnumbered by a large margin.

It is not only the number of players available that puts the Iroquois team at a disadvantage, the game is played differently as well. The U.S.A. utilizes set plays, controls the ball and slows the game down. Delby Powless who played at Rutgers compares the USA game to a chess match between the coaches while the Iroquois Nationals use more of a free flowing, run-and-gun game where the players are allowed to be more creative and develop scoring opportunities on the fly.

The Iroquois team relies more on their natural talents and abilities to generate offense from any situation.

Coach Ron Doctor knows the box lacrosse players have great skills in close. These guys are playing all year long and the skill development is tremendous. He will be depending on the play-making skill of his players and in close scoring to keep his team in the game.

Cory Bomberry agrees that the Nationals will need to utilize their skills.

"We all know the game and will play with more of a school yard mentality," Powless said. "We will need all of our natural talent to succeed."

Doctor has the challenge of piecing together a team that mixes Canadian and American players as well as box lacrosse players with field lacrosse players. While most of the box players have some field lacrosse experience, they are still box lacrosse players playing field lacrosse. He will have to do this with limited practice time.

"We hope to get the team together for a couple of weekends but the players have other commitments and responsibilities," Doctor explains.

Doctor has been able to blend youth into his core group of experienced players that could improve this team. Including young players like Delby Powless and Roger Vyse only makes this team stronger.

The defence is anchored by former NCAA division 1 defensive player of the year Marshall Abrams, Cal Smith and Darryl Seymour. Backing up the defence will be top goaltenders Ross Bucktooth and Joe Solomon. At the midfield position is the former number one pick of the National Lacrosse League Delby Powless, and Syracuse stars Brett Bucktooth and Matt Alexander. Up front it will be Neal Powless, Scott Burnam, Cory Bomberry and Roger Vyse leading the charge.

### **England**

#### Side improves with added preparation entering tourney

WITH THE RETURN OF Paul Flowers at midfield and the addition of Peter LeSueur (Johns Hopkins) on

attack, the 2006 edition of England's lacrosse team will compete and could even upset favourites like U.S.A. and Canada.

Like the Canadian, Australian and Iroquois entries, England has added valuable NCAA experience to their roster to help them compete with the powerhouse American squad.

Head coach Dave Elwood has the majority of his squad picked, but decided to delay naming his full team and his goalkeepers by leaving the last few roster spots to keep players competing and on their toes.

"I've picked a young, athletic and quick team," Elwood told British lacrosse publication Lacrossetalk Mag. "Fitness and speed is going to be very important in Canada. But we've also got a nice core of players returning from the 2002 World Cup team."

Midfielders Tom Caplin and Daniel Green, England's current captains, return to the side having played in Perth, Australia, in 2002 when England finished sixth.

Also returning are midfielders Flowers, David Bryant and Nathan Singleton.

Elwood has also selected three of a possible four overseas players, with defender Joe Duncan (Rutgers), midfielder Phil Brauch (Butler) and LeSueur included. Americans Fred Lee (Towson) and Daniel Kallaugher (Yale) are British passport holders and played for England at the U-19 World Championships in Baltimore in 2003. They have clearance to play in Canada for their adopted country. Ben McAllister will be the squad's number-one keeper.

## **A Look Ahead**

### Players to Watch

**BLUE DIVISION** 



United States: #13 Trevor Tierney and #15 Chris Garrity are arguably the best two goalies in the world. Tierney excelled at Princeton while Garrity was a staple at Penn State; #7 Mike Powell (attack) is one of the world's best, a naturally talented athlete with a great scoring touch. He's also one of five Syracuse grads on the U.S. squad.

Canada: Syracuse grad #22 Gary Gait (Attack) will make his last appearance in international competition. His twin brother Paul was also one of the greatest players in the sport's history. Gary is regarded as the 'Wayne Gretzky' of lacrosse, and is the coach of the NLL's Colorado Mammoth and winner of countless lacrosse championships in box and field lacrosse; #16 Brodie Merrill (Defence) was the 2005 MLL and 2006 NLL rookie of the year. The graduate of Georgetown will anchor a young and improved Canadian defence.

Australia: In 2002, #3 David Whiteman (Midfield) had 14 goals and two assists; #22 Peter Inge (Midfield) is one of three players on the Aussie squad who play for the MLL's San Francisco Dragons, he's always a threat to score.

Iroquois Nationals: #26 Brett Bucktooth (Midfield), son of widely respected Onondaga coach Freeman Bucktooth, is a gifted athlete with a quick first step who is fearless going through the middle. He's a good bet as first overall pick in the upcoming NLL draft. Meanwhile, #9 Delby Powless (Attack) is a standout with the NLL's Buffalo Bandits and graduate of Rutgers. Powless, a prollific scorer in both box and field lacrosse, will be the goto guy on the Iroquois offence.

Japan: #9 Shinya Maruyama (Attack) and #10 Yoshiro Suzumura (Attack) are a dangerous duo up front for the Japanese. In the 2002 tourney, Maruyama finished with a team high 25 goals and four assists.

England: # 29 Peter LeSueur (Attack) – The Johns Hopkins grad had 47 goals and 50 assists in his NCAA years. He will be a great addition to this already offensively talented squad; # 15 Paul Flowers (Midfield)—The Cheadle product led the English squad in 2002 in points and will be a key component if England hopes to improve in the standings in 2006.

Italy: #10 Dan Chemotti (Midfield) is a graduate of Duke who has graduated to the New Jersey Pride. #4 Brett Coye, regarded as one of the world's best goalies, could steal a few games for the Italians in a highly competitive Red Division.

Scotland: #16 Matt Russell and #2 John Marr (Goalies)— Russell, a graduating senior this year out of Navy, will be the key component of a well-rounded Scottish team, while the 67-year-old Marr will provide tutelage to the young goaltending student and a good story or witty joke for those who meet him in and around town.

Wales: #9 James Gallagher (Attack) has a cannon of a shot that will draw attention from opposing teams. #7 Adam Ferguson (Midfield) is a product of the local London Masters league

Bormuda: #9 Ernie Theriault and #30 Andy Soucie are the offensive studs on a developing squad from the Caribbean filled with American and Canadian expatriaces.

## Stamped it!

ON JULY 6, 2006, Canada Post issued a 51-cent domesticrate commemorative stamp to mark the 2006 Warrior World Lacrosse Championships.

The 2006 Warrior World Lacrosse Championships stamp was designed by Tom Yakobina, while the illustration was provided by Yvan Meunier.

The most striking and immediate images on the stamp are the brightly coloured tickets that dominate the centre space. The colours were chosen to represent the original three divisions competing in the World Championships: red, blue and orange. At the time of commissioning the stamp design, the World Lacrosse Championships was organized into three divisions: red, blue and orange. The yellow division was later added by tournament officials to accommodate the high number of teams, after the initial stamp design was approved.

Small flags at the top of each coloured ticket denote what countries belong to each league. The tickets also contain other relevant information such as the date of the championships and the location. According to Yacobina, it was a simple but interesting means of representing a great deal of information about the tournament in a very graphic and compelling way.

The illustration of the lacrosse player, particularly his dynamic stance, was inspired by the cover art of a book on lacrosse from the 1970s. Illustrator Yvan Meunier copied the positioning of the player and the sense of movement, but modernized the image with contemporary gear. The original image that inspired the illustration contained three players in scrimmage; this in-play grouping will be used on the cover of the Official First Day stamp booklet (10 stamps). On the booklet, the players will be found in full colour. Meunier also provided the illustration of the nets, placed behind the tickets to offer a sense of dimensionality to the stamp. According to Yacobina, the sense of motion is also supported by choosing a full colour (white) background rather than a coloured background framed in white, which is a technical necessity for tagging. Other details include strong, simple type fonts that serve their necessary function and blend easily into the overall design.

The stamps are available for purchase through July 5, 2007 at Canada Post postal outlets and through authorized stamp sales agents across Canada.



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
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# A box lacrosse fan's Guide to Field Lacrosse

#### Learning the intricacies of the field game is easy

OUTDOOR OR FIELD LACROSSE is really the way the game was originally meant to be played. Native lore tells how it was originally a gift from The Creator to help settle disputes between tribes, without bloodshed. Played on huge fields, attended by all the members of participating villages, lasting often for days, it was as much social as it was a form of conflict resolution.

Up until a very chilly weekend last fall, my personal experience was only with the "other" version; different but, in reality, very similar—except for the timing, size of the field, number of players, equipment... Well! Maybe it was different enough that I had better do some research if I wanted to be able to watch these games and actually understand what was going on. So, armed with a rule book, some game

tapes and e-mail addresses of some very good outdoor players, I set out to figure out this version.


In a nutshell, here's how to watch men's field lacrosse, according to the most recent International Lacrosse Federation rules.

The game is contested between two teams, each with a total of 23 players dressed. On the playing field, at any time, are one goalkeeper, 3 defenders, 3 midfielders and 3 attackers.

Equipment consists of a "crosse" or stick—40 to 42 inches in length, made of either wood or acceptable synthetic materials. The head is a 4-inch by 10-inch "basket." In addition to the basic stick, any team can have up four long crosses or "long-poles", 52 to 72-inch sticks, in play at any time. The goalie stick differs in the size of its head. The ball is

Attack Goal Area: The area defined by a line drawn sideline to sideline, 20 yards from the face of the goal. Once the offensive team crosses the midfield line, it has ten seconds to move the ball into its attack goal area.

BOX: An area on the sideline used to hold players who have been served with penalties, and through which substitutions "on the fly" are permitted directly from the sideline onto the field.


Crease: A circle around the goal, nine feet in radius, into which only defensive players may enter.

Defensive Clearing Area: The area defined by a line drawn sideline to sideline, 20 yards from the face of the goal.

Midfield Line: The line bisecting the field of play.

white or orange and between 7.75 and 8 inches in circumference, weighing between 5 and 5.25 ounces.

Protective equipment consists of an approved helmet, gloves and shoes. In addition, the goalie is required to wear a throat guard, a chest protector and a box/cup.

The playing field itself is 110 yards long by 60 yards wide, and is divided into attack and defensive zones. Each team is required, at all times, to have three players in the attack end of the field, four in their defensive end. It is divided into various zones to provide for safe and legal substitutions, protection of the goalie and simplify enforcement of possession and positioning rules.

A head referee, two assistants, a chief bench official and a bench manager plus a timekeeper, a scorekeeper and two penalty timers make sure the game runs as smoothly as possible. Referees are responsible for enforcing all the rules of the game and ensuring that the game is played in a safe manner. The Chief Bench Official is in charge of any player substitutions, numbers of players on the field and, the way I read the rules, ensures that there is no activity between the benches and the on-field personnel that would violate any of the rules. He communicates, not only with a whistle, but with a flag as well. The Bench Manager is the guy who comes in if anything happens to any of the others charged with smooth game operations.

The game begins with a face-off between the two opponents and then, for four, 20-minute periods the teams try to score at least one goal more than the others. If that is not accomplished in regulation time, two, four-minute overtime periods are played. After that, the format is sudden death.

Each team is permitted two timeouts per half, one per overtime period and none in sudden death. For the referees, as many as are necessary for the safety of the game.

Now to one of the most contentious parts of any sporting events: penalties. In lacrosse, there are two kinds, the technical sort and the personal kind, both called at the discretion of the officials. Technical fouls are usually pretty minor in nature and result in either a change in possession, if committed by the ball-carrying team, or a free play if committed against them. Minor interference, pushing, holding, illegal picks, handling the ball, withholding the ball from play-all examples of technical calls. If you commit one of these infractions while the other team has the ball, it's a 30-second penalty.

Illegal crosses and equipment fall into the technical section of calls made. And players really get one free call. If an official believes they are playing with equipment that doesn't meet the rule requirements, the player is required to change it. A second violation results in a foul.

A more serious violation is using an illegal stick, mainly aimed at keeping the ball from being dislodged, results in the stick being removed to the scorer's table and a three-minute penalty.

More serious, obviously, are the personal fouls. They consist of such things as illegal body checks, slashing, tripping, crosschecking, unnecessary roughness and unsportsmanlike conduct.

Depending on the severity and intention of any foul, it is up to the referees' discretion to assess a penalty of one to three minutes. These personal fouls are described, in the rules, as being of a more serious kind. Five of these and a player has "fouled out."

A couple of rules that stood out, for me at least, involved equipment. A coach can ask for an equipment check and, like the players, gets a free call, of sorts. If that first call finds the equipment in question legal, any further requests to check equipment could result in a technical penalty assessed against the coach.

And a goalie may be replaced, by substitution, by another goalie from the bench or he may hand his stick off to a player on the field and that player, by virtue of accepting that stick, now assumes the privileges awarded the goaltender by the rules. Of course, I am not at all sure why anyone would want to stand in front of a ball traveling at that speed.

**History of the World Lacrosse Championships** 

THE HISTORY OF international lacrosse dates back to the 19th century when a Canadian team played the Iroquois. In fact, lacrosse was contested as a full medal sport at the 1904 and 1908 Olympics. In 1904, two Canadian teams challenged a local team from St. Louis, with the Shamrock Lacrosse Team of Winnipeg winning the gold medal.

The Canadian victory in 1904 was the first ever medal for the country in Olympic competition. Lacrosse was also a demonstration sport at the Olympics in 1928, 1932 and 1948. The World Lacrosse Championships is organized in accordance with the guidelines of the International Lacrosse Federation. The mission of this organization is to promote and develop the game of lacrosse throughout the world, to establish rules and regulations for international competition, and conduct world championships. The competition traditionally takes place over nine days in July and is held every four years.

## A Short History of Lacrosse in Canada

LACROSSE, WHICH THE Native People of North America knew under many different names such as Baggataway or Tewaarathon, played a significant role in the community and religious life of tribes across the continent for untold years. Its origin lost in the antiquity of myth, lacrosse remains a notable contribution of the Native culture to modern Canadian society. Native lacrosse was characterized by a deeply spiritual involvement, and those who took part did so with dedicated spirit and with the highest ideals of bringing glory to themselves and their tribes, and honour to the participants and the tribes to which they belonged.

In the 1840s the first games of lacrosse were played between the townsfolk and the Native People. Though it was many years before any significant wins were logged against the Natives, the game of lacrosse was quickly winning the loyalty and interest of the newest North Americans.

Lacrosse was named Canada's National Game by Parliament in 1859. In 1867 the Montreal Lacrosse Club, headed by Dr.

George Beers, organized a conference in Kinaston in order to create a national body whose purpose would be to govern the sport throughout the newly country. The National Lacrosse Association became the first national sport governing body in North America dedicated to the governance of a sport, the standardization of rules and competition, and the running of national championships to promote good fellowship and unity across the country. The unforgettable motto of the organization was:

"Our Country - Our Game".

The advent of the 20th century saw lacrosse as the dominant sport in Canada. There were extensive amateur and professional leagues across the country and teams routinely travelled from Quebec and Ontario to B.C. and vice versa to challenge for supremacy in the game. In 1901 Lord Minto, the Governor General of Canada, donated a silver cup to become the symbol of the championship of Canada. The

Minto Cup, today the symbol of supremacy in the Junior ranks, remains one of the proudest prizes of lacrosse. In 1910 Sir Donald Mann, chief architect of the Canadian Northern Railway, donated a gold cup to be awarded to the national amateur senior champion. Today it is the championship prize of the best Senior team in box lacrosse in Canada.

The coming of the 1930s brought innovation once again to the sport. Promoters married the two most popular games, lacrosse and hockey, and created indoor lacrosse, also known as box lacrosse. The game was built upon speed and action and very quickly won massive support within the organization. By the mid 1930s the field game had been completely replaced by boxla and the box version became the official sport of the Canadian Lacrosse Association.

The Canadian Lacrosse Association today recognizes four separate disciplines in the game of lacrosse: box, men's field, women's field and inter-lacrosse. Lacrosse was re-confirmed by Parliament as the National Summer Sport of Canada in 1994. Warrior 2007




