WHY THEY'RE HERE

The World Championship Shield was donated to the International Federation of Lacrosse (fore-runner of the Federation of International Lacrosse) by Laurie Turnbull in 1974, to be awarded to the winner of each championship. As president of the ILF at that time, he presented it to the USA after the Americans won the 1974 championship in Melbourne.

Laurie Turnbull was an outstanding lacrosse figure and well known throughout the world. He dedicated himself to the growth of lacrosse and climbed through the club and state administrative structure in Australia. He managed the first Australian squad to tour England and in 1962 became president of the Australian Lacrosse Council. He served as president of the organization that evolved into the ILF from 1967-74.

Men). F.I.L. is responsible for the Men's World Championship, World Indoor Championship, Women's World Cup and both Men's & Women's U-19 World Championships. These events are run every four years.

Other key areas of responsibility of the Federation are the establishment of international rules of play and the promotion and development of all forms of lacrosse internationally.

F.I.L. has 50 member nations and is a member of SportAccord, the International World Games Association (IWGA) and is WADA compliant.

The next General Assembly of F.I.L. will be held in 2014 in Denver, USA.



THE NATIONAL CAMPAIGN FOR LACROSSE

'TIME IS NOW' FOR \$15 MILLION CAMPAIGN TO FUEL SPORT'S GROWTH

With more than \$8 million raised toward a \$15 million goal, The National Campaign for Lacrosse officially gets underway here at the 2014 FIL World Championship. The campaign seeks to build a new headquarters for US Lacrosse, the sport's national governing body, by 2016 while providing more opportunities for young people to play the sport and more support for research to make the sport safer.

"The time is now," said Richard Morgan, a Denver resident who begins a two-year term as chair of the US Lacrosse Board of Directors on Aug. 1. "US Lacrosse has been an incredible catalyst for the responsible growth of the sport."

US Lacrosse counted 20,000 members at its founding in 1998. Since then, it has invested more than \$125 million into the growth and development of the sport. US Lacrosse now serves more than 425,000 members in 68 chapters across 45 states.

The National Campaign for Lacrosse is organized around three key objectives: Leadership (\$13 million), Opportunity (\$1 million), and Safety (\$1 million). Campaign co-chairs are Ed Calkins of Naples, Fla., Kristen Garlinghouse of Atherton, Calif., Barclay Kass of Vero Beach, Fla., and Frank Kelly III of Lutherville, Md.


At the heart of the Leadership objective is a facility that allows the entire US Lacrosse staff to operate under one roof. Presently, offices are divided among four separate work spaces in two buildings a block apart.

"It's an incredibly inefficient arrangement, made necessary by the need to expand quickly to serve our rapidly growing sport," said Steve Stenersen, president and CEO of US Lacrosse.

Unable to expand or rebuild on its current site on the Homewood campus of Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, US Lacrosse purchased a 12-acre property in Sparks, Md. Plans call for construction of a three-level, 45,000-square-foot National Lacrosse Center, an exhibition and training field, and a 500-seat grandstand. The field — a permanent training facility for the men's and women's national teams that will also be open to visiting teams from around the country — will be constructed to permit direct access through the seating area to locker rooms and training spaces on the first level of the center.

A broad promenade will run between the center and the stadium, creating an informal space for visitors to gather and watch a game on the field or step inside to visit an expanded Lacrosse Museum and National Hall of Fame. The Creator's Game statue in front of the current headquarters building will be relocated to the promenade and surrounded by the names of those who made the original building possible. Nearby, a 9/11 memorial with the names of members of the lacrosse family who perished in the 2001 terrorist attacks is planned.

"The whole campus will be a showcase of the sport from its origins among Native Americans, through its development in the 18th, 19th and 20th centuries, to the explosive growth all corners of our country and the globe are experiencing today," Kelly, also a member of the US Lacrosse Foundation Board of Directors, said.

MAKING THE SPORT SAFER

Since its founding in 1998, US Lacrosse has been a leader among sports national governing bodies in pursuing health and safety advocacy, research and education.

Focus areas have included commotio cordis research and the promotion of automated external defibrillators (AEDs) at every field, as well as studies leading to a greater understanding of the nature, frequency, and mechanism of lacrosse-specific injuries at any level of play.

Recently, Dr. Margot Putukian, director of athletic medicine at Princeton University and chair of US Lacrosse's Sports Science and Safety Committee, used the school's men's and women's teams to learn more about head injuries.

"We decided to do the study because we think there's lots of missing information, in terms of what are the impacts that occur

in the sport," Putukian said of the study funded by US Lacrosse.

The \$1 million Safety objective of The National Campaign for Lacrosse will expand these kinds of initiatives, providing additional support for injury research, equipment review and certification, rule development, educational conferences, and health-related publications targeted to the national lacrosse community.

"The National Lacrosse Center will be a focal point for information and education that will effectively balance game integrity and player safety," incoming chair Rich Morgan said.




PROVIDING KIDS THE OPPORTUNITY TO PLAY

With social media carrying images of lacrosse to millions of mobile devices, many kids don't need an introduction to the sport. They've seen it and they want to play.

Five years ago, a group of students at Cristo Rey High School in inner city Baltimore approached a teacher about starting a team. They faced the same challenge many new teams face: getting equipment and training. The team turned to US Lacrosse, becoming one of more than 600 programs in 49 states and the District of Columbia since 2000 to receive equipment grants, valued at more than \$3 million. Since 2012, the US Lacrosse First Stick Program has awarded 228 grants providing comprehensive start-up assistance, impacting thousands of players.

The \$1 million Opportunity objective of The National Campaign for Lacrosse seeks to build on that success by expanding core initiatives, such as the First Stick Program, the US Lacrosse Coaching Education Program, and the US Lacrosse Officials Education Program.

"For every kid playing the sport today, many more would like to, particularly in non-traditional communities," said Laura Hebert, a Richmond, Va., educator and outgoing chair of the US Lacrosse Board of Directors. "We want to inspire them to play hard and dream big, and give them the resources to do so."

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP HISTORY

By Ron Balls and Brian Logue

International lacrosse championships are governed by the Federation of International Lacrosse (FIL), which was formed in August 2008 after the merger of the International Lacrosse Federation (ILF) and the International Federation of Women's Lacrosse Associations (IFWLA). The FIL is responsible for the Men's World Lacrosse Championship, World Indoor Lacrosse Championship, Women's Lacrosse World Cup, and both the Men's and Women's Under-19 World Lacrosse Championship. These events are held every four years.

International competition has been a tradition in lacrosse since

1860, when the Montreal Lacrosse Club competed against a team of Caughnawaga and St. Regis Native Americans before the Prince of Wales, who went on to become King Edward VII.

Lacrosse was an Olympic exhibition sport at the 1904 games in St. Louis, the 1908 games in London, the 1928 games in Amsterdam, the 1932 games in Los Angeles and the 1948 games in London. The quadrennial men's lacrosse world championship began in 1974 following a successful international tournament in Toronto in 1967.

Enjoy a look back at each FIL World Championship.

1967

TORONTO, ONTARIO, CANADA

The Canadian Lacrosse Association invited Australia, England and the United States to participate in a tournament to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the CLA's drafting of official rules of lacrosse and the Canadian Centennial of Confederation. The Mount Washington Lacrosse Club from Baltimore represented the U.S., going 3-0 to win the round-robin tournament.

MELBOURNE, AUSTRALIA

This time, the Australian Lacrosse Council wanted to celebrate a centennial, inviting the other three countries to help mark the 100th anniversary of lacrosse in Australia. This event helped to establish the ILF, and the nations agreed to rotate hosting of this World Championship every four years.



With the European teams now members of the ILF, Homewood Field hosted 11 teams, which were split into pools of competitively similar squads for the first time. Full-member nations retain the ability to play their way into the championship bracket. More than 10,000 fans watched the gold-medal game, which many still rank as one of the greatest games of all time.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP PREVIEW

The 2014 FIL World Championship, presented by Trusted Choice, marks more than a bit of history in the modern-era development of lacrosse. A record 38 nations have sent teams to compete for the Turnbull Shield, and they're joined at Dick's Sporting Goods Park by 21+ boys' and men's teams for the World Lacrosse Festivals. Combined, it's the largest international lacrosse event ever.

A brief look at some team highlights, players to watch, and other notes of interest as the world lacrosse community enjoys 10 days in Denver.

UGANDA'S DREAM

The Dream 2014 campaign worked for Fields of Growth International and Uganda, which is the first team from Africa to play in an FIL event. The country has been wounded by years of civil unrest. Not only has Fields of Growth, a volunteer corps, established a lacrosse compound in Kampala, but it also has built a school for impoverished children. Andrew Boston, a former Delaware player who spent two years in northeastern Uganda with the Peace Corps, is the head coach. Tom Schreiber, the Tewaaron Award finalist from Princeton, Virginia sophomore defenseman Tanner Scales and recent high school graduate Casey Lavallee round out seemingly the youngest coaching staff in FIL history.



FAMILIAR FACES

Native Australia defenseman Callum Robinson was an All-American as sophomore at Stevenson this year. ... England's Colin Clive recently graduated from Siena as one its best attackmen ever, while defenseman Jak Wawrzyniak has experience playing at Providence and Stony Brook. ... Former Stony Brook All-American attackman Jordan McBride will play with his brother, Jimmy, for Scotland. ... Brothers Nick (Notre Dame) and Will (Penn) Koshansky play for Russia, which is coached by Cornell assistant Peter Milliman and National Hall of Famer Joe Cuzzo.

SCOTLAND HONORS FALLEN CAPTAIN

Bobby Hetherington wore number 4 while serving as captain for Scotland. His more important uniform, however, came as a member of the British Army. Hetherington was killed in action in Afghanistan last year. "As a memorial to him, we select one player, who best represents what he stood for on and off the pitch, per tournament to wear his number," said Keith Robertson, men's director of Lacrosse Scotland.



NOTES AND NUGGETS

Belgium, China, Colombia, Costa Rica, Israel, Russia, Thailand, Turkey and Uganda make their first appearance in the FIL World Championship. ... US Lacrosse last hosted this event in 1998 in Baltimore. It featured 11 teams. This year's championship will include more than 60 games broadcast by ESPN's family of networks. ... In the densely-populated city of Hong Kong, playing fields are often located beneath skyscrapers. Last names are preferred when addressing residents, until an invitation is extended to use first names. ... Lacrosse passion runs deep for Thailand Lacrosse Associated president Payu Nerngchamnong, who bid for the 2018 world championship (England won the bid). ... Lacrosse is relatively new in France, despite the fact that French explorers in the New World gave the sport its common name in 1638, using the generic term for any game played with a curved stick (crosse) and a ball. ... Israel Lacrosse Association executive director Scott Neiss founded the group four years ago after visiting Israel on a Birthright trip. ... Keep an eye on native Belgians Emile Drijvers and Diego Spillebeen.

IROQUOIS RETURN WITH TEWAARATON WINNERS

The Iroquois Nationals, who missed the 2010 world championship in England, return to the competition with perhaps their best team ever. Lyle (below) and Miles Thompson, who shared the Tewaaron Award as the nation's best collegiate players in 2014, represent an explosive duo that nearly led the Albany to its first NCAA semifinal. Joining them are older brothers Jeremy and Jerome and cousin Ty. Two years ago at the FIL U19 World Championship in Finland, the Iroquois Nationals earned their first win over the U.S. during pool play en route to capturing the bronze medal.

REMEMBERING GRAHAM LESTER

OFFICIATING LEGEND PASSED AWAY DEC. 31

As we gather for the largest international lacrosse event ever, we pause to remember an official who earned a similar stature in the lacrosse community.

Graham Lester died suddenly of a heart attack on Dec. 31, 2013. Born in 1944, he was first a wonderful family man. He adored his wife Linda and loved his children and grandchildren.

His other passions were lacrosse, the Manchester United and the English language. Graham was an extraordinary person. Even at an early age, he made friends wherever he went and, if he became your friend, he was your friend for life. His wit and knowledge of lacrosse were acknowledged throughout the lacrosse world.

Graham came to lacrosse as a 13-year-old in 1957. As a goalkeeper he played every season, spanning 24 years, for his one and only club — South Manchester and Wythenshawe. As a senior he represented England in the World Championship in Melbourne,

Australia, in 1974 — the only time, he would often tell us, that England defeated Canada, 19-11.

In 1981 he became a referee and soon became one of the best. His first international assignment came in 1984 at the Jim Thorpe memorial games in Los Angeles. He officiated numerous ILF World Championships, always sharing what he learned with aspiring officials.

Graham retired from international officiating in 1992. He served as an observer, Deputy Referee in Chief (RIC), and RIC at several subsequent world championships, ultimately participating in 13 such events as a player or official.

A large part of these early world championships revolved around good spirits, singing and generally having a good time after the games — elements in which Graham excelled. He brought referees from all countries together to sing and bond over a few drinks whilst at the same time forging this disparate group of individuals into a strong, self-supportive third team through his lacrosse knowledge and gift for storytelling.

By now the referees anthem, "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot," had been firmly established by Graham, who insisted on the assembled referees performing it as often as possible. Indeed, prior to a later championship, the Japanese officials contacted Graham to ask for the words so that they could practice before the tournament. Lester even added this to his lacrosse CV: "co-chairman, ILF (FIL) Referees Committee including: Choirmaster and Actions coach, 1994 to 2008."

He went on to chair the ILF Officiating Committee from 2004-08, although his involvement with the ILF Rule Committee preceded that, as in 1986 he proved instrumental in producing an international rules re-write. Two years later, he produced the first Refereeing Manual. The written language was only changed to American English in FIL publications following Graham's retirement from the post.

Graham pushed for more formal assessment of referees

and, given his lecturing background, he could not see any value in referees receiving written assessments following their return home. In 1999 he convinced the ILF of the need for assessors at World Championships, European Championships and Asian Pacific Tournaments. The Adelaide U19 championship in 1999 was the first to be attended by assessors from Canada, England, the USA and Australia. REMEMBERING GRAHAM LESTER

OFFICIATING LEGEND PASSED AWAY DEC. 31

As we gather for the largest international lacrosse event ever, we pause to remember an official who earned a similar stature in the lacrosse community.

Graham Lester died suddenly of a heart attack on Dec. 31, 2013. Born in 1944, he was first a wonderful family man. He adored his wife Linda and loved his children and grandchildren.

His other passions were lacrosse, the Manchester United and the English language. Graham was an extraordinary person. Even at an early age, he made friends wherever he went and, if he became your friend, he was your friend for life. His wit and knowledge of lacrosse were acknowledged throughout the lacrosse world.

Graham came to lacrosse as a 13-year-old in 1957. As a goalkeeper he played every season, spanning 24 years, for his one and only club — South Manchester and Wythenshawe. As a senior he represented England in the World Championship in Melbourne,

Australia, in 1974 — the only time, he would often tell us, that England defeated Canada, 19-11.

In 1981 he became a referee and soon became one of the best. His first international assignment came in 1984 at the Jim Thorpe memorial games in Los Angeles. He officiated numerous ILF World Championships, always sharing what he learned with aspiring officials.

Graham retired from international officiating in 1992. He served as an observer, Deputy Referee in Chief (RIC), and RIC at several subsequent world championships, ultimately participating in 13 such events as a player or official.

A large part of these early world championships revolved around good spirits, singing and generally having a good time after the games — elements in which Graham excelled. He brought referees from all countries together to sing and bond over a few drinks whilst at the same time forging this disparate group of individuals into a strong, self-supportive third team through his lacrosse knowledge and gift for storytelling.

By now the referees anthem, "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot," had been firmly established by Graham, who insisted on the assembled referees performing it as often as possible. Indeed, prior to a later championship, the Japanese officials contacted Graham to ask for the words so that they could practice before the tournament. Lester even added this to his lacrosse CV: "co-chairman, ILF (FIL) Referees Committee including: Choirmaster and Actions coach, 1994 to 2008."

He went on to chair the ILF Officiating Committee from 2004-08, although his involvement with the ILF Rule Committee preceded that, as in 1986 he proved instrumental in producing an international rules re-write. Two years later, he produced the first Refereeing Manual. The written language was only changed to American English in FIL publications following Graham's retirement from the post.

Graham pushed for more formal assessment of referees

and, given his lecturing background, he could not see any value in referees receiving written assessments following their return home. In 1999 he convinced the ILF of the need for assessors at World Championships, European Championships and Asian Pacific Tournaments. The Adelaide U19 championship in 1999 was the first to be attended by assessors from Canada, England, the USA and Australia. THE OLYMPIC DREAM

At the time of the last FIL Men's World Championship in Manchester, England, in 2010, the newly formed FIL — fresh from the 2008 merger of the ILF and IFWLA — had 36 members and had completed the first step towards Olympic recognition. That first step was the creation of a single international governing body to cover both the men's and women's games.

Since that time, under the careful direction of director of development Tom Hayes (the former longtime Rutgers University coach and the 2012 *Lacrosse Magazine* Person of the Year), further key steps have been completed:

- » FIL being recognized as World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) compliant.
- » Accepted as a member of SportAccord (the association of international federations), achieved in 2012.
- » Accepted as a member of the International World Games Association (IWGA), achieved in 2013.
- » Accepted as a participant sport in the IWGA World Games in Wroclaw, Poland, in 2017. We achieved this in April of this year.

The next steps are to discuss with IWGA the format of our inclusion in the World Games in 2017 and to submit our application for Olympic recognition to the International Olympic Committee (IOC) through SportAccord. These matters were on the agenda for the FIL General Assembly meeting, July 7-8 in Denver.

The FIL currently has 50 members, however not all of these are recognized by the IOC (England, Scotland and Wales are counted as Great Britain). The submission can commence in advance of achieving 50 members, as we have to fulfill on a staged basis 54 IOC requirements (membership being one). Much of the documentation to meet this was on the agenda for our General Assembly.
