SOME EXTRACTS FORM THE OFFICIAL REPORT OF AUSTRALIA'S FIRST INTERNATIONAL LACROSSE VISIT:—

TOUR OF AMERICA-8th March to 20th April.

University of Virginia, Charlottsville, Virginia, 16/3/62:

Saturday, March 17th—Toured University of Virginia in morning and played U.V.A. in afternoon before a crowd of approx. 1,000 in very cold weather. An official dinner for players, officials and hosts was arranged and also a party by John Spillman and Booty Nice.

Sunday, 18th March—Tour of home of Thomas Jefferson at Monticello, followed by a dinner at Dean of U.V.A., Dean Rusk's residence.

Maryland University-College Park, Maryland, Thurs. 23/3/62:

The match was played on Saturday, 24th March, before a large crowd (approx. 3,000) including Cheer Leaders for opposition, etc.

Baltimore-Maryland:

Two matches were played at Baltimore where the team was billeted for seven days. The match for the Australian-American Brady Cup was played against last year's national champion, Baltimore Lacrosse Club, on Sunday, 1st April before a small crowd in wet and muddy conditions. We played John Hopkins University on Tuesday, 3rd April.

The hospitality at Baltimore was overwhelming and arrangements and tours organised by Tommy Swindell and Butch McCleary were excellent and included a tour of Bethlehem Steel Works, a boat trip and lunch on Baltimore Harbour, tour by bus of Washington, D.C., and official dinner after Baltimore Lacrosse Club match, dances and numerous cocktail parties, including a reception after Hopkins match, where pennants and beer mugs were presented to players.

West Point Military Academy, West Point, New York:

Arrived West Point, Sunday, 16th April, from Philadelphia, where we were met by Lacrosse Coaches and three cadets delegated to look after our needs.

The match was played on Monday 17th in very cold weather.

During our short stay we toured the Academy and watched a film on Cadet life.

On Tuesday, the 17th April, we left West Point for New York where we stayed at the Y.M.C.A. for four days before departing for London.

An official dinner was arranged for us on the Tuesday night on top of the Time Life Building, New York, given by Colonel Egan, President of the People to People Sports Committee who organise American Olympic fund raising campaign, etc.

A tour of the United Nations was also organised for Thursday, April 20th, which included meeting the Australian Delegate, Mr. Hood, and drinks in the Delegates Lounge.

The remainder of our time in New York was spent touring places of interest and we finally departed from Idlewild Airport, New York, on Good Friday, 21st April, at 8.00 p.m., for London.

Lacrosse in America is centred at Baltimore, which is recognised as the home of Lacrosse and is also the only place where junior lacrosse of any description is played. Reports indicate that Lacrosse is growing rapidly in America and is starting to penetrate inland from the east coast.
