

Federation of International Lacrosse

The Federation of International Lacrosse (FIL) was set up in August 2008 with the unification of the International Federation of Women's Lacrosse Associations (IFWLA) and International Lacrosse Federation.

Both Federations had recognised the need to bring the men's and women's international governing bodies together and the initial General Assembly (GA) meeting on August 7th was the culmination of two years hard work by initially the Unification Committee and then the Transition Board. Their work enabled all the necessary documentation (Board structure, Organisational framework, Constitution, Bylaws, Policies, Budget, etc.) to be presented to both the IFWLA and ILF membership, and to the GA to enable the new organisation to come into place.

The incoming Board was elected at the GA as follows:

Men's and Women's Directors are game based positions, as is the President and Vice-President in the initial period, with 4 year terms of office on a staggered basis.

The immediate effect of this, under the agreed transitional arrangements, is that two positions (Men's Director and Finance) are subject to membership election this year. Also Feffie Barnhill steps down from the President role (to Vice-President) and Stan Cockerton assumes this position from the end of these Championships.

Welcome world



The 2010 FIL Men's World Lacrosse Championships will be the third time that England has hosted the event since its inception in 1967. A comparison of the three events graphically illustrates how the game of Lacrosse has grown

internationally over the years. In 1978 the four founding nations of the ILF, Australia, Canada, England and the USA were the participants. In an epic final, one of the best games of international Lacrosse ever seen, Canada defeated the USA 17-16 in overtime with FIL President elect Stan Cockerton scoring the winning goal and earning immortality! In the qualifying games Canada had lost to the USA by a then world record margin, 28-4.

By 1994 the number of competing nations had grown to six with the Iroquois Nationals and for the first time, Japan competing. The USA won the Championship but perhaps just as significantly the English Lacrosse Union initiated the process of real international expansion by organising an Emerging Nations Tournament for developing Lacrosse countries. This event featured international debuts for the Czech Republic, Germany, Scotland, Sweden and Wales.

Since then every World Championship has seen a significant increase in the number of competing nations.

In 1994 the Championship Games were held at Gigg Lane the home of Bury FC but the thing that Lacrosse people remember most is the Festival of Lacrosse which England staged at the Armitage Centre, the Manchester University sports facility. Every World Championships since then has featured a Festival which has allowed all levels of Lacrosse player to be a part of a World Championships.

The 2010 Championships and Festival will be the biggest international Lacrosse event ever –probably until the 2014 Championship takes place in Denver. There are 30 nations taking part with World stage debuts for Argentina, Austria, France, Mexico, Norway, Poland, Slovakia and Switzerland. In the first ever FIL International Festival we have 47 teams competing in seven different competitions; U16, U19, Open, Masters, Grand Masters, Super Grandmasters and Women. Over the last couple of years English Lacrosse has worked hard to create a grass roots legacy from the World Championships, so almost as important is the Community Festival which will have over 1,500 young people playing Lacrosses.

In Manchester this July we will see over 4,000 players, coaches and officials showing why Lacrosse is the great game it is.

To run an event of this size, particularly in the current difficult economic climate, is certainly challenging and would have been impossible without our

funders, who have supported both the tournament and the Legacy Programme. Our thanks go out to Sport England, the North West Development Agency, Manchester City Council and the Foundation for Sport and the Arts. Without their generosity there would be no World Championships.

Running such an event has seen an unbelievable contribution from volunteers from all parts of the Lacrosse community. The organising committees led by English Lacrosse President David Marsden have worked tirelessly for four years to bring this event to fruition. Ron Balls, Alan Holdsworth, Ian Ashcroft, Peter Nugent, Peter McGinnety, Neil Roe, Clive Perrin, David Gordon, Mike and Sue Nicholls and Jon Harrop have all given freely of their time and expertise. The overall response from the Lacrosse community has also been impressive and there will be over 300 volunteers making sure that the event runs smoothly and the 106 games in the Championships and the 116 in the Festival all take place.

The work put in by the English Lacrosse staff has been stupendous and without Caroline Royle, Sarah Oglesby, Tim Holdsworth and Abigail Merrill we would not have an event. The challenge has been immense and their response incredible.

Running a World Championships would have been a valid reason for other English Lacrosse objectives to be put on the backburner. However, the remainder of the ELA staff under the leadership of Mark Coups have truly stepped upto the mark and arguably delivered the most successful year, both financially and from the standpoint of the growth and development of the game in England we have ever seen. The English Lacrosse membership has grown to 20,000. The number of Universities playing men's Lacrosse has grown from the 7 or 8 it was 6 years ago to over 60. The South League continues to expand and is now 5 divisions with 5 new clubs joining for the 2010/11 season.

The base for the future growth of the game in England has been created and the 2010 FIL Men's World Championships and Festival will, I am sure, give us the impetus to take us forward.





FIL development

So much has happened in the development realm of international lacrosse globally since the last men's World Championships held in Canada in 2006.

Under the watchful eye of the FIL Development Chairman and members of the FIL development committee the numbers are staggering. As you will see below the FIL development committee's main activity has been concentrated in primarily three areas: a) development of new programs b) equipment grants c) international player, coach, referee and umpire clinics.

On the surface there were a total of 21 International teams that competed in Canada just 4 short years ago. Now at these 2010 FIL World Championships the largest field of teams ever assembled in the history of the sport (30) are gathered in Manchester to compete for the ultimate international men's lacrosse championship trophy.

However in the lacrosse development world it is the small incremental pieces and people that provide the hope and highlights on a day to day basis – with the goal of lacrosse ultimately becoming an Olympic sport once again.

The most significant development in the last 4 years has been the merger of the ILF and the IFWLA into the Federation of International Lacrosse (FIL). Without this new structure the sport of lacrosse could not possibly have a "seat at the table" internationally in the eyes of the IOC.

In 2006 ILF/IFWLA membership stood at 27 countries. In 2010 the FIL membership ranks have grown to 36 countries and counting!

The development budget has grown from \$21,000 in 2006 to \$61,000 for 2010.

In 2006 a total of 8 grants were awarded to countries that included Austria, Guatemala, Ireland, Korea, Netherlands, Norway, Russia and Slovenia. Since then over 20 grants have been sent globally to countries such as Bermuda, Bulgaria, Cambodia, Costa Rica, Chile, France, Guatemala, Hungary, India, Poland, Portugal, Scotland, South Africa, Spain, Uganda and Wales.

In 2006 we conducted 2 clinics – one in the Netherlands and one in South Africa. Since then we have funded and conducted international clinics in the following countries; Bulgaria, Czech Republic, France, Germany, Hong Kong, the Netherlands, Poland and Scotland.

Additional development highlights include the following

The development committee established the first Development recognition awards – which have been awarded for the past 4 years to key individuals/ organizations globally who have made great contributions to the growth of the sport.

In 2006 a part-time salaried International Development Officer position was created and is currently operated from Baltimore, Maryland.

We have helped shepherd the development of establishing organisational structures in Austria, Bermuda, Bulgaria, Costa Rica, Denmark, Finland, France, Ireland, India, Italy, Latvia, Mexico, New Zealand, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Slovakia, Slovenia and Spain.

We have also communicated with individuals interested in starting lacrosse in at least 37 additional countries in what we call our prospective country development program. They include Afghanistan, Armenia, Belize, Brazil, China, Croatia, Estonia, Ethiopia, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Indonesia, Iran, Iraq, Israel, Jamaica, Jordan, Kuwait, Lithuania, Malaysia, Mongolia, Morocco, Namibia, Nepal, Nicaragua, Pakistan, Peru, Philippines, Puerto Rico, Qatar, Romania, Rwanda, Serbia, Singapore, Thaliand, Tibet, Turkey and Ukraine.

On the topic of Olympic participation the development chairman has formulated the following plan which the development committee, FIL leadership and the FIL membership consider to be a truly viable plan.

Target dates

2011 - Attend SportAccord Conference - London, England April 2011.

- 2011 Apply for SportAccord membership (FIL must have 40 recognized member countries to apply)
- 2013 Apply to International World Games Organization for membership
- 2014 Attend, as observers, the 2013 World Games Championships, Cali, Columbia
- 2014 Apply for Olympic Consideration
- 2016 Attend, as observers, the 2016 Summer Olympics - Rio de Janeiro, Brazil
- 2020 Earliest opportunity for Olympic participation
- 2024 Realistic opportunity for Olympic participation

The world of international lacrosse has entered a new era of growth throughout the world rarely seen in previous decades. The FiL web site has brought lacrosse to countries of the world never before thought of as lacrosse playing candidates. The leadership of the previous and current federations has had the foresight to place development as their top priority and the results are now evident with lacrosse playing nations at its highest number ever. Each year new nations are on the threshold of becoming a part of the international lacrosse community.

Our sport is now on its way to becoming part of the worldwide community of Olympic sports. For a sport that has been in existence for unnamed years our place in international sport has been solidified for the future.

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History of the game

Lacrosse is a minority sport in Australia. It has a long and proud history dating back to 1876, with a small but dedicated community of participants and volunteers. Australia has a domestic lacrosse competition that is club based; the three main centres for the game are in Melbourne, Victoria; Perth, Western Australia and Adelaide, South Australia. In these cities there are organised field lacrosse competitions for men and women at senior and junior levels, played over the winter months (April until September).

Lacrosse is also played in Sydney, New South Wales; Brisbane, Queensland and Hobart, Tasmania although it is very much at the developmental level. The number of clubs, grades and teams varies per state. All clubs have development programs with specific emphasis on school based competitions as a means of recruiting junior players to their clubs. In the off-season, there are a number of box lacrosse competitions, though the majority of players in Australia play field lacrosse.

Lacrosse in Australia is now governed by a single governing body, following the merger of Lacrosse Australia and Women's Lacrosse Australia, who had until 2008 governed the men's and women's versions of the games independently. The Australian Lacrosse Association comprises of the six Member Associations (states) and an eight person Board.

International record

In 1907 Australia's first international lacrosse match against Canada was played at the MCG before a crowd of 30,000. Australia has an important presence in the international scene, consistently finishing in the top three of the men's World Championships. Although they have never won the trophy, they won Silver Medals in 1982 and 1994. They have finished with the Bronze Medal in the last three World Championships including most recently in 2006.

At the Men's U19s level they won Silver Medals at the first three Under-19 Men's World Lacrosse Championships, in Adelaide 1988, Long Island 1992, and Japan 1995.

Star players

Adam Sear: (Midfield) - The 6' 2" 205lbs powerful midfielder played for the NCAA Div I Maryland Terrapins. Adam competed for Western Australia in the Australian Lacrosse League (ALL) and led Western Australia to the 2006 ALL championship. He was named to the inaugural ALL All-Star team. Adam has had his shot clocked at 104mph so Goalies will need to keep their eyes wide open when he has the ball and he should be a threat on the Aussie EMO unit.

John Tokarua: (Long Stick Midfield) - The 6' 2" 215lbs defender hails from Melbourne, Victoria and plays for Caulfield Lacrosse Club. This will be John's third World Championships, he made the All-World Team in defence in 2006. He was drafted briefly by the San Francisco Dragons of the MLL. His main strength is being a fierce competitor for groundballs on the wings at face-off and for creating transition for the Aussie Sharks with aggressive takeaway stick checks.

Ryan Garnsworthy: (Midfield) - Ryan spent two years as a Local Development Officer (LDO) at Timperley LC and led them to their most successful season ever. The do it all middle is also entering his third consecutive World Championships. Ryan is from the very successful Williamstown Lacrosse Club in Victoria and is one of a long line of Garnsworthys to represent Australia; he is joined on the 2010 Sharks team by his brother Matt Garnsworthy.

Preparation

The Aussie Team will be one of the fittest at the World Championships the team having been selected after a number of intensive training camps. The team is a blend of youth and experience having lost their Top Five point scorers and the whole of the attack unit from 2006. Fortunately they return a powerful, experienced midfield unit as Garnsworthy & Sear are joined by Darren Nicholas and Robert Stark who both recorded double figure points in the WC2006.

One thing for certain as with all representative sides from Australia, something special happens when they put on the Green & Gold and they will be in the hunt for a medal in 2010 -the only thing to decide is what colour. They should be the biggest draw on Super Saturday 17th July when they meet England at 4:30pm which usually brings out the best from the boys Down Under.

Development news

In 2009 Australia had its first ever taste of professional lacrosse when Hisense Arena in Melbourne (the Home of the Australian Open Tennis) played host to the Leaseplan NLL All-Star Series which saw the best of the best from the NLL compete in an East v West battle with both sides being reinforced by some of Australia's most talented players including Stephen Mortimer, Ryan Garnsworthy, Darren Nicholas, Keith Nyberg and Jake Egan from the 2010 Aussie Sharks roster. This event was an overall success for the recognition and future growth of the sport in Australia.

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Canada

History

Lacrosse is the National Sport of Canada. When lacrosse is mentioned in Canada it refers to Box Lacrosse (Indoor) that is played with 5 outfield players and a Goalie. The rules are different as well, it is much more physical and aggressive than Field Lacrosse with cross-checks being legal along with moving picks and screens on offence.

Lacrosse is based around two main areas in Canada, Ontario (East) and British Columbia (West) and the two main national competitions (Mann & Minto Cups) reflect this, where the Champions of the West play the Champions of the East in a Best of Seven Game Series. In recent years the Minto Cup format has been changed to include Alberta and a four team tourney now takes place with the three Regional Champions alongside the host Team.

International record

The current World Champions at Field Lacrosse and Indoor Lacrosse have won the Field World Championships on one other occasion in 1978. Canada has faced the USA in the Final at the last three World Championships.

2006 London, Ontario (Canada) - Canada 15 - 10 USA

2002 Perth (Australia) - Canada 15 - 18 USA

1998 Baltimore (USA) - Canada 14 -15 (OT) USA

The 1998 World Championship Final is recognised as one of the greatest games of lacrosse ever. In the third quarter USA were dominating the game 11-1 but Canada fought their way back into the game and eventually scoring two goals in the last minute to tie the game 13 all before missing out in overtime.

Star players

Brodie Merrill: (Defence/LSM)

The 6' 4" 205ibs defender has redefined the position of Long Stick Midfielder (LSM) since his days at Georgetown University to turning Professional at Field and Indoor lacrosse Brodie seems to get better and better. He won Rookie of the Year in both MLL & NLL and Defensive Player of the Year in both in 2006. He has been named Best Defender in the MLL for the last four seasons. He combines tremendous athleticism and stick skills with an unmatched ability to read the game and be in the right place at the right time.

Geoff Snider: (Midfield/Face-off)

Geoff was voted Most Valuable Player of the 2008 World Championships where he won 143/195 (73 %) of his face-offs overall 19/28 (68 %) in the Final. The numbers themselves are exceptional but it was the way that Geoff dominated possession that was most

impressive, the vast majority of his face-off wins were won cleanly going forward for fast breaks. Lacrosse is a game of runs where teams score goals in bunches, you can't score if you don't have the ball. Geoff Snider will be vital if Canada hope to win Gold in 2010.

John Grant Jr: (Attack)

John Grant Junior won Gold in 2006 but is coming off a very difficult 2009 season where he suffered from a serious infection of his elbow and needed reconstructive surgery for the second time on his knee. Junior is pretty much universally accepted as the best stick handler in the world, and his willingness to take shots at unorthodox angles whether Behind-the-Back, Around-the-World or Between-the-Legs have embarrassed many a goaltender. He was the Top Point scorer in WC2006 with 42 points (216, 21A).

Preparation

Team chemistry and spirit is very important to Canada teams where there is tremendous rivalry between players from the West and the East of Canada. A lot of these players are sworn enemies during the Summer Indoor season where fighting in games is common place similar to Ice-Hockey and an accepted part of the game. Players have a full schedule at this time of year playing in the MLL (Pro Field Lacrosse) and in either Major Series Lacrosse (MSL) or Western Lacrosse Association (WLA) Senior A Box Lacrosse in the build up to the Mann Cup Final.

The 2009 season saw the first Canadian franchise in the MLL, the Toronto Nationals, who were crowned Champions after beating Denver in the Final, but the 2010 season isn't going as well as currently they are Won 0 Lost 5.

The 2006 Team entered the Vall Shootout as Team Colorado in the build up to the World Championships which proved vital for Team Building and healing the wounds from Summer BoxLa rivalries.

Canada had two scrimmage games vs NCAA 2010 Finalists Notre Dame back in October 2009 and won both games 12-9 & 11-7 respectively.

And finally...

It is to be hoped that the Canadians 6 foot long defence sticks arrive on time for the games in Manchester 2010. Back in Australia 2002 they were delayed by 2 days; it didn't deter team practice though as All the Canadian players played with short Midfield/Attack sticks and you couldn't tell who were the attackers and who were the defenders. It definitely helps having a roster made up of Professional NLL players.





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England

Lacrosse is a minority sport in England. The amateur men's game has a long and proud history dating back to 1875. England has a domestic lacrosse competition that is club based, the two main areas centres for the game are greater Manchester and London. The league Championships (Towson, USA), being selected as a structure for men is split North and South, all Northern starter at the age of 17. At the age of 22 Tom was teams play in the North of England Lacrosse Association leagues (NEMLA) and all Southern teams compete in the South of England Lacrosse Association leagues (SEMLA). The northern leagues host teams from; Manchester, Birmingham, Liverpool, Sheffield, Hull, Newcastle, Nottingham, Leeds, and York. The southern leagues are made up of clubs from; London and surrounding areas, Bath, Bristol, Canterburry, Exeter, Maidstone, Reading, and Warwick,

Outside of the traditional hot beds of Manchester and London lacrosse is rapidly expanding with clubs popping up in previously untouched areas. Many clubs run junior programmes which emphasises on development through organising coaching in local primary schools as a means of recruiting Junior players to their club. In the off-season there are numerous field lacrosse tournaments which cater for both elite teams and social teams.

Lacrosse in England is governed by a single governing body, this is following the amalgamation of the men's and women's bodies in 1996 to create the English Lacrosse Association.

International record

At the 1908 Olympics in London, England (Great Britain) played their first international lacrosse game. England faced Canada, with the Canadians winning 14-10. England has participated in every World Championships since the inaugural championship in 1967. England's best finish so far is fourth (1967, 1974, 1978, 1982, 1986, 1990, 1994). With the expansion of the game they have been overtaken by Iroquois, finishing fifth in 1998 and 2006. England U19 team came close to winning the nation's first bronze medal at the 2003 U19s World Championships in Towson, USA, narrowly losing 12-11 to Australia in the 3rd/4th Place Play-off game.

England have been consistent champions of Europe, most recently winning the 2008 European Championships in Lahti, Finland, Team England will be targeting 2010 for their first medal at a World Championships.

Star players

Tom Williamson (co-captain) - The 6'1" 84 kg defender halls from Disley, Cheshire and plays for

Stockport Lacrosse club. This will be Tom's second World Championships having played in London (Ontario, Canada) in 2006, where he was a key member of England's defensive unit. Tom also represented England in the 2003 World appointed co-captain of the team, a position which he has carried through to the 2010 championships.

Mark Reynolds (co-captain) - The 6'2 95 kg attackman brings a wealth of experience to the England team, having previously competed in the 2006 Championships and the 1999 U19 World Championships in Adelaide, Australia, In 1999 Mark was one of the key components of England's most successful U19 team, which beat Australia and also ran the USA very close, losing 14-13 in the semi finals. Mark is the leading returning points scorer from 2006 and will be looking to lead the team from the front.

Ben McAllister - The 5'11" 108 kg goalle is a true veteran of international lacrosse, competing in his third World Championships. Ben has been the mainstay goalie of the team since being selected for the 2002 Championships in Perth, Australia. Ben was a integral member of Stockport Lacrosse Club's 2009-2010 team, a team which went unbeaten to win the North League title and cup competition.

Preparation

England preparation started back in before the 2008 European championships. The 2008 Euro team went undefeated in the championships scoring 179 goals and conceding 23 goals in 8 games, Sixteen members of the 2008 team are involved with the 2010 team. The England team have been working hard over the last two years, putting in many hours in the gym and on the field.

England's recent tour of the USA showed promising results, especially with the close loss to MLL team Denver Outlaws. The team will be looking to impress in front of a home crowd and gain the country's first medal in Men's international lacrosse.

Development news

Lacrosse in England is currently going through a high growth stage especially within Universities. The number of English Lacrosse members has risen from 12,000 in 2004 to 19,000 in 2010.

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Iroquois Nationals

History

The Iroquois or Haudenosaunee as they refer to themselves as, means People of the Long House. The Iroquois Nation is a Confederation of Six Nations or tribes (Seneca, Cayuga, Oneida, Onondaga, Tuscarora and Mohawk), and are the creators of game of lacrosse and lacrosse is the only sport that the Iroquois compete at internationally as their own Nation.

The name lacrosse itself has a number of different theories to its origin, the most common being that it was named by a French missionary as the stick resembles a Bishop's Crosier but the word "Crosse" also meant crooked stick and so "la jeu de la crosse" means the game of the crooked stick. Whatever the true origins of the sport, it is lost in the annals of history but one thing is for certain is that it is much more than a stick and ball game to the Native American peoples. The young people are told by the elders that the game is to be respected and to respect your opponent as they also have been given the gift to play the game.

The game is played for the spiritual benefit of the Nation and for all those who play the game.

International record

The Iroquois Team first took part in World Championship play in the 1990 World Games in Perth, Australia and has taken part in every World Championships since. Box Lacrosse is their first love and Iroquois Nationals have two World Indoor Lacrosse Championship (WILC) Silver Medals from 2003 & 2007. They also earned a Bronze Medal at the 2008 U19s World Championships in Coquitlam, BC.

The Iroquois Nationals best finish so far is fourth (1998, 2002, 2006) so they will be striving for their first Medal in 2010.

Star players

Cody Jamieson: (Attack) - The 5'9 215lb lefty attackman is a complete lacrosse player adept at Field & Box lacrosse, In Box Lacrosse he became the first player to be named the Major Series Lacrosse (MSL) MVP, Rookie of the Year and win the league's scoring title in the same season. In 2008 as a member of the Six Nations Arrows he led the Ontario Junior 'A' League with 101 points (59G,42A) in 21 games. In Field Lacrosse he scored the winning goal for Syracuse University in 2009 NCAA Div I Championship Final, and led Onondaga Community College (OCC) to back-to-back NJCAA National Championships and a combined record of 33-0 in his two seasons.

Gewas Schindler: (Attack) - This will be Gewas' fifth Senior Men's World Lacrosse Championship, he was the youngest player active in the 1994 World Lacrosse Championships in England. He also represented the Iroquois in the 1992 U19s World Games in USA and in the 2007 World Indoor Lacrosse Championships in Halifax, Nova Scotia. He played at NCAA Div I Lovola College and led his team in scoring, accumulating 180 points. Gewas was named an USILA All-American in

Sid Smith: (Defence) - the 6' 0" 225lb defender from Ohsweken, Ontario has the happy habit of winning lacrosse games. NJCAA Champions with OCC 2006 & 2007, Minto Cup winner with Six Nations Arrows 2007. He then transferred to Syracuse University where he won NCAA Div I Championships in 2008 & 2009, completing the set after graduation by winning the MLL Championship with Toronto Nationals in 2009. Whether you call it Lacrosse IQ or sixth sense. he always seems to be in the right place at the right time to make a check, scoop a groundball or make a key pass to start transition. Sid knows how to play the game of Lacrosse

Preparation

The Iroquois played two scrimmage games (Notre Dame and Hobart) as part of their selection process. The Iroquois Nationals have Professional players in the MLL and the NLL. Their Final roster also has a number of younger players, Ryan Burnham & James Cathers will both be attending Syracuse University in 2010, Ryan is a transfer from OCC, James scored 95 points (46G, 49A) in High School this season. Emmett Printup IV also makes the team who was the Top Goal scorer in U19s WC2008 with 33 Goals in 8 Games

Head coach

Cam Bomberry brings a wealth of lacrosse experience and knowledge to the table having played in the 2006 games and had 4 years at NCAA DIII Nazareth College from 1990-94 where he helped his team claim an NCAA championship title in 1992. He played professionally for eight seasons in the NLL and has three Mann Cup titles with Six Nations Chiefs. He was a four-time member of the Iroquois Nationals team.

In 2006, the Iroquois Nationals Lacrosse Program signed a partnership with Nike, Inc. in which Nike will provide the Nationals with Nike-brand uniforms, clothing, footwear, and other equipment, and team members will assist in the research and development of sustainable sportswear.



History of the game

Lacrosse started in Japan in April 1986, when students of Keio University visited the American Embassy. Ten sticks were donated by Mr Ross Jones (Vice President of Johns Hopkins University) and Mr Bob Scott (Director of Athletics of Johns Hopkins University) to Keio University. In July 1987, Mr. Don Zimmerman (Coach of Johns Hopkins University) held a lacrosse camp for the first time in Japan. The following December, Yokota 12 - 2 Keio University was recorded as the first game in Japan. In April 1988, the Japan Lacrosse Student League was founded and the following year the first International Lacrosse Friendship Games were held. The Japan Lacrosse Club Team Association was founded in 1990. Japan Men's Team first competed in the World Championships in 1994. JLA believes participation in World Championships had resulted in the recognition of Japanese Lacrosse throughout the world. The mission of Japan Lacrosse Association (JLA) is to promote lacrosse nationwide, improve the quality and techniques within the sport which will raise the attractiveness of the sport.

Domestic leagues

There are 7 Regional Collegiate Leagues (130 Men's Teams, 203 Women's teams), 2 Regional Club Leagues (46 Men's, 45 Women's Teams) and 2 Regional Girl's High Leagues (26 teams). In total there are approximately 6,000 Men & 9,000 Women's players currently in Japan. 95% of all lacrosse players in Japan start playing lacrosse in College, there are no youth programs and only a handful of private high school programs.

International record

Japan's first entry into the World Championships was in 1994 in Bury, England, they got off to an inauspicious start with a record of Played 6 Lost 6 but with the International growth of the sport when they entered the 1998 World Championships in Baltimore, USA, they won all their Round Robin games before being edged out by Germany 5-4 in a play-in game and losing to Scotland in a nail-biter 10-9 (OT) finishing in 8th position overall. The 2002 World Championships in Perth, Australia was their most successful games to date, again winning all the Round Robin games, this time however they won the play-in game vs Germany 8-and beat England 13-12 to confirm 5th place overall and promotion to the Blue Division in World Championship games. The 2006 World Championships in London, Ontario was Japan's first in the Blue Division and they performed well narrowly losing to Iroquois Nationals 13-11 and

to England 9-8. This meant that they had to play Ireland team to retain their Blue Division status. which they did 11-9. Japan finished in 6th place.

Preparation

Japan went to South Australia in July 2009 to compete against the Australian State teams losing to South Australia 13-8, Victoria 13-5 and Western Australia 13-8. Japan has also hosted US touring sides losing to UMBC 12-11 in June 2009 in Tokyo and more recently losing to Notre Dame 7-6 in front of 6,000 fans in the Final of the International Friendship games in June 2010 in Tokyo. Japan had Training Camps 3 weekends a month from January 2010 and should be one of the best organised and drilled squads at the games. The target for the 2010 Japan squad is to reach the semi-finals.

Star players

Shinya Maruyama: (Attack) - The 5' 7" 132lb attackman has been the top point scorer for Japan in the last three World Championships, WC 1998 he finished fourth overall in tournament scoring; WC2002 he scored 25 points; in WC2006 had 12 points (10G,2A). Shinya Maruyama has established himself as one of the World Championships' fastest and most exciting players. He began playing lacrosse in college because "it looked fun to play."

Yoshiro Hikichi: (Defence) - The 35 year old 5" 11" 176lbs defender will be competing in his 5th World Championships having played since the 1994 World Championships, he will be using his experience to lead the team defence. He is the oldest player on the Japan roster and tried out for the MLL Chicago Machine.

Head coach

Yoshihiro (Yon) Okubo was the Assistant Coach in the 1994 World Games and the Head Coach of Japan's 1996 U19s Men's Team. He took over Head Coach position for the 1998 World Championships in Baltimore, and also Coached the Women's World Cup team at High Wycombe, England in 2001. He is one of the original eight players who started lacrosse in Japan in 1986. The 42 year old has been there since the beginning and has seen the tremendous growth of Lacrosse over the last 24 years. His mission for the 2010 games is "Show the Japanese" Lacrosse (Original Style and Culture)".

And finally

Japan are now developing Lacrosse for Over 40's (such like Masters rules/league) so look for them to dominate the Masters divisions at the 2014 World Championships in Denver, USA.



USA

History

The LISA are the World powerhouses of Field Lacrosse, they have over 300,000 players (Men's & Women's) who compete at all levels from High School, performances ever in the 1995 NCAA Final Four when through College under the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and then on to Professional Leagues, Major League Lacrosse (MLL) Pro Field Lacrosse and National Lacrosse League (NLL) Pro Indoor/Box Lacrosse.

According to www.LaxPower.com there were over 3,000 Boys' High School Teams competing in the 2010 sesson.

International record

USA have been named World Champions 8 times out of the 10 World Championships to date and were runners up on the other 2 occasions (1978, 2006). The USA have only ever lost 2 games in international competition.

The last time the World Championships were held in Frictand, the USA dominated all their games beating Australia 21-7 in the Final on the 30th July 1994. The only other time England have hosted the games the USA suffered a shock defeat 17-16 to Canada, USA had defeated Canada in the round robin stage of the tournament 28-4. So their record is one Gold & one Silver Medal on these shores.

Star players

The USA team is packed with All Star players, you don't get to play for USA unless you are a star player, but even on this team some players stand out.

Ned Crotty: (Midfield/Attack) - He led Duke University as a Senior Captain to their 1st NCAA Div I National Championship in 2010. He won the 2010 Tewaaraton Trophy awarded to the Best Player in all of NCAA lacrosse. He was the Top Point scorer in Div I 2010 with 23 Goals 63 Assists for 86 Points averaging 4.3 Points/Game. He was then drafted No 1 in the MLL draft by the Chicago Machine. He is definitely the man in form.

Paul Rabit: (Midfield) - He led Johns Hopkins to 2 National Championships and won the 2007 Tewaaraton Trophy in his Senior Year. He set the record of 111 mph in winning the MLL Hardest Shot Contest in 2009, and led the Washington Stealth win in the 2010 NLL Championship. The do everything midfielder reknowned for his high energy play and his "swim" move where he uses his 6' 3" 225lb frame to pull his stick over the head of his defender usually leading to a 90+ mph shot on the run left or right handed.

Brian Dougherty: (Goalie) - The "Doc" is a larger than life character and the oldest member of the Team. He

led the Philadelphia Barrage to back-to-back MLL Championships in 2006 & 2007, He graduated from Maryland in 1996 and gave one of the best individual he led his Maryland Terrapins past Johns Hopkins University 16-8 in the NCAA Semi-Final. He will be key if the USA are going to win Gold in 2010.

Preparation

Coach Pressler has taken Division II Bryant University into NCAA Division I status and has made them competitive immediately, which is no small feat. They finished with a 12-5 record in 2010 and would have made the play-offs if they were eligible, they also had the best defensive record in Division I only conceding 6.6 Goals/Game (GPG) finishing above #2 Syracuse (7.4 GPG) and losing finalist Notre Dame (7.5 GPG).

This is the first time USA have picked a Team of Stars rather than an All-Star team. They have selected a specialist Face-off man (Alex Smith) and short stick defensive midfielders (SSDMs) where previously they have just selected the best nine middles and asked them to play both ways (attack/ defence) and take face-offs. Also Coach Pressler has selected players with Box Lacrosse (NLL) experience to counter the 2-man game, the style of play favoured by Canada.


The defenders selected are less aggressive and more position players than those that were cut from the 40 man squad, this is to counter the Canadian Extra Man Offence (EMO) Unit who are clinical when given the opportunity. This is very much a Team to beat Canada.

There have been a couple of upsets for USA in their build up, losing to Duke University 9-8 in Florida January 31st 2010 and losing to MLL College All-Stars 12-11 at Yale University June 6th 2010.

They got things back on track on the 18th June 2010 though, comprehensively beating the Philly All Stars 15-8 with Hat-tricks from Brendan Mundorf & Ned Crotty.

And finally...

You won't be able to miss the USA players; Warrior the Official Kit Sponsor for USA Team have come out with a customized "star spangled" range of kit including a pair a "Wrath" gloves that the late great Evel Knievel would be proud to wear, they will stand out from the crowd and are far from Low Profile. I'm sure they will be the hot ticket at the trading tables after the games.



Argentina



History of the game

Lacrosse in Argentina had a very humble beginning when founder of the Argentine Lacrosse Association (ALA) Richard Acuña was introduced to the game in 1997, "I went to a sports museum and became intrigued by the concept of lacrosse. From there, I enlisted some friends to help me start a league in Argentina and we have been steadily growing in size ever since."

Games started in 1998 with about 40 players in Buenos Aires. There are Leagues selected 1st Team All-County by The in Buenos Aires (indoor and outdoor) and Chubut (indoor only in Chubut).

International record

This is the first time Argentina will play International lacrosse so the whole team (with one exception) will make their International debut when they play Austria at 9:30am on Friday July 16th 2010. The exception being Ricardo Acuña, who represented Italy in the WC2002 in Perth, Australia.

Star player

Sebastian Astrada: (Defence) "Sebbie" The 6" 0" 200lb defender hails from N. Potomac, Maryland, USA, and played his High School Lacrosse at Bullis (Class of 1998) where he was inaugurated into their Hall of Fame for his play on the Lacrosse field. His Profile reads:

"Sebbie" is one the best lacrosse players to have graduated from Bullis. As a senior captain he led the team to a top-20 ranking by The Washington Post, was Journal, The Gazette and The Almanac and 1st team All-Met by The Washington Post. The Almanac also selected him as Defensive Player of the Year. He earned All-IAC honours and was also named a high school All-American.

Sebbie went on to play for Middlebury College where he helped them win three NCAA Division III Champtonships ('00, '01, '02) and amass a record of 65-5. Middlebury head coach Erin Quinn said that "Sebbie was a great fit for our program. He was a dynamic player whose stick skills and athletic ability were well suited for Middlebury's program." These qualities helped Sebbie earn 1st team All-American honours as a senior.

Scott Hylen - Co-Founder of Argentina Lacrosse. Currently is coaching at Palisades Varsity.

Gary Podesta - Offensive coordinator at NCAA DII Notre Dame De Namur, brings 24 years of high level college coaching experience.

Ricky Acuna - Co-Founder of Argentina Lacrosse - his organization and leadership is what has made this trip to Manchester possible

John Walsh - (2009- Present) Goalie Coach and Assistant Coach Scotts Valley High School, CA. USA.





Austria



Lacrosse in Austria began in 2001, when contact was made with teams in Munich and Passau. The Salzburg Arizonas Lacrosse Club was officially formed and hosted a visit from European Lacrosse Federation President Peter Mundy and several European based coaches. The Austrian Lacrosse League (Österreichischen Lacrosse Liga or OLL) was formed in 2005 and currently has nine Lacrosse Clubs participating.

Austria fielded both Men's and Women's National teams in the 2008 European Lacrosse Championships in Lahti, Finland.

International record

Austria has travelled to compete in friendly internationals in Ireland. England, the Netherlands, Germany, Switzerland, Slovakia, The Czech Republic, Italy and Finland.

They took part in their first International competition at the 2008 European Championships in Lahti, Finland, where they finished in 15th place of 18 teams competing.

Since the roster was selected in November 2009 Austria are 14-0, they have played and beaten the National teams of Bulgaria, Poland and Slovakia. In 2010 they won the Bratislava Tricksters Tournament and the Austrian Lacrosse Open.

Preparation

The Austrian Men had their National Team tryouts in May 2009; a full 16 months before the start of the World Championships and have been having training camps one weekend a month.

Head coach

Chris Arnold Coached Tampa Jesuit HS 2003-2007, University College Dublin 2007-2009 as well as being the former Coach of Ireland 2007-2009. He currently coaches Vienna Cherokees (Men's & Women's).

Sponsors

The team is self-funded by the players and currently has no sponsors.

Denmark



Lacrosse was started by Kristian Gotsch (ELF Men's Vice President) in 2002 when he formed Copenhagen Lacrosse. The sport has been growing slowly and there are now four steady teams in Denmark and approx 80 men and 20 women. Denmark became full FIL members in 2006 at the last World Championships.

Six teams compete in the Danish Lacrosse League (aka DLL), four Danish teams, one team from Sweden (Lund) and one Canadian team.

2009 saw 10 Canadians moving to Denmark for 10 months to form a team and play lacrosse in the Danish Lacrosse League. It was a great experience for the Canadians and the local players learned a lot from them. They hope to repeat this next season.

Lacrosse first arrived in France about 3 years ago (2007) simultaneously in Lille and Paris. In Lille a couple of roller hockey players picked up the sport after watching YouTube videos and in Paris the sport-was introduced by a German exchange student who got some of his friends and classmates to play and it grew from there. Currently there are three organised club teams in France; Paris, Lille, and Nevers. The teams meet regularly for both indoor and outdoor matches. Many teams are in the works: Reims, Rouen, Le Havre, Lyon, Grenoble, and Disneyland Paris Team. France can draw from a pool of about 100 players locally and estimated 150 abroad. France became a Full FIL Member this year, 2010.

Preparation

The first training camp for the 2010 team was officially held Saturday December 19th 2009 on a snowy field on the outskirts of Paris. Field time at our usual practice facility was cancelled at the last minute Friday evening because of snow that had just fallen. Our head coach Billy Tauzin had just arrived the night before and everyone was still in town before leaving for the holidays. Captains Pierre-Yves and Hugues frantically called dozens of sports facilities around Paris, but to no avail. It was after 5pm on a Friday evening right before the holidays. The final solution was to take all the equipment the next morning to a large open park on the outskirts of Paris. The normally muddy pitch was frozen solid with bumps and holes hidden by the white snow. Miraculously there were no major injuries. and Coach Tauzin was still able to spot new talent for the team. This first try-out weekend under the snow will not be soon forgotten. The French Team is a balance between local and overseas players with an experienced International Coaching Staff. We hope to make a top 20 ranking and be competitive in all of our games.

Hong Kong

History of the game

Lacrosse was first introduced in to Hong Kong by a British professor teaching at the University of Hong Kong. The Horig Kong Lacrosse Association (HKLA) was then founded in 1993 by a group of graduates from the University. The HKLA regularly participates in overseas tournaments including the Lacrosse World Championships, the Asian Pacific Lacrosse Tournaments and the China Ambition Friendship Games.

Every year a men's league is held from January to June and a mixed game is held each August where all men and women lacrosse players of all levels of experience, come together and form teams to compete against each other. The Association also regularly holds fun day events for children to promote and develop lacrosse in Hong Kong.

There are seven Lacrosse Clubs in the Hong Kong Lacrosse League (HKLL) Aqulia LC; Castlers LC, HKU LC, Lee Hall LC, Ricci Hall LC and the SJC Skyers LC.

International record

2010 marks the third time HKLA sends a national team to participate in the World Lacrosse Championships. In between World Championships events, HKLA also formed teams, men and women, to play in regional tournaments including the Asia Pacific Lacrosse Tournaments held in Auckland, New Zealand in 2007 and Seoul, Korea in 2009.

WC2002: Perth, Australia: Won 1 Lost 4. Hong Kong lost to Ireland twice, South Korea and New Zealand but had their first World Championship win in the rematch beating New Zealand 9-5. Hong Kong finished tied for 13th Place overall.

Preparation

The Hong Kong squad have been training together since September 2009, with the roster being finalized in February 2010. The team firmly believes that the key success factor would be fundamentals at both individual and team levels.

Our team features mainly local players and several expatriates who settled in Hong Kong due to their professional careers. The team is led by team captains Kevin Chan, Austin See, and Gabriel Wong. With Hong Kong being a very vibrant and popular city, we benefit from the experiences and skills of many expatriates and exchange students from overseas. That being said, we are prepared and looking forward to competing against Germany, Spain, and Norway. We believe our competitors

would find this 2010 Hong Kong team a much more balanced and improved one compared to previous Hong Kong teams.

Coaching staff

Louis Hou (Head Coach) - Louis founded the HKLA and has been the Executive Director of the HKLA since. He represented Hong Kong Lacrosse in 2002 in Hong Kong's first appearance in the World Lacrosse Championships event and was the team's Head Coach for the 2006 Hong Kong team.

Matt Caplin (Assistant Coach) - Matt is our player coach with roots from England. He was part of the England national team back in 2002 and has moved to Hong Kong for his career in education. He works closely with our attack and midfielders to coordinate our team offense.


Frankie Fung (Assistant Coach)

Mexico

History of the game

Mexico Lacrosse started when founder and current coach Iliad Rodriguez attended the 2006 World Championships in Canada, Iliad put together a group of players of Mexican descent and played a friendly in April of 2008 against a club team (Palo Alto Ducks) prior to an MLL game in San Jose California.

Jose Luis Espinosa learned the game at the University of Michigan Dearborn, when he moved back to Mexico City in the spring of 2009 he got in contact with Iliad Rodriguez to map out a strategy to get lacrosse off the ground in Mexico City.

September 2009, 12 players of Mexican descent from the United States made the trip to Mexico and played 3 exhibitions at 3 major Universities in Mexico City. The exhibitions were a huge success. There are currently 6 teams in

Mexico City, and 1 team in Monterrey, in total there are now over 100 lacrosse players in Mexico.

Iliad Rodriguez: Iliad brings many years of experience as both a player and coach to the Mexico team. Iliad began his lacrosse career as a founding member and player of both his high school (Bishop O'Dowd-'84,'85) and college (San Jose State-'88-'90) teams. For all his contributions to Northern California Lacrosse Iliad was recently inducted into the NorCal Lacrosse Hail of Fame.

Head Coach - Carlos Truiillo: Coach Trujillo brings over 10 years of college and high school coaching experience to the Mexico squad. Most notably taking both Stanford University and Chapman.





New Zealand



History of the game

First played in New Zealand in the early 1900s, lacrosse had a small but enthusiastic following until the arrival of WWI. It was not played again for more than 85 years. In 2000, a group of largely expatriate lacrosse enthusiasts established the New Zealand Lacrosse Association (NZLA). There are seven senior level clubs nationwide.

Preparation

The New Zealand National Team will be playing in is its 3RD World Championships. The Team was announced in January after two weeks of intensive trials culminating in three games against visiting Melbourne team, the Eltham Panthers. The level of competition provided an excellent opportunity for the selection of the 23-man roster.

Head coach

Gavin Higgins was appointed as the NZ Coach in October 2009. Before migrating to New Zealand he coached High School Lacrosse with the Starz Youth program in Los Angeles.

"Unselfish and hard-nosed play is the key to our success. While we will have our best World Team yet, we don't have one or two guys that can do it all for us," he explained. "We have a team of talented players that have to depend on one another every play. Working together as a team for the entire tournament will undoubtedly have a very positive result for us."


Key players

Norway



History of the game

The first game of lacrosse played in Poland was in April 2008, and they played their first International game in October in Warsaw vs Latvian National Team. There is no domestic league in Poland but there are four teams (Warsaw, Krakow, Wrocław & Poznan) who participate in tournaments in Poland and surrounding countries. There are approximately 100 players in Poland playing men's Lacrosse, Women's lacrosse started in November 2009 in Poland.



There are five Scottish Universities that compete in the BUCS Men's Lacrosse Scottish Conference University of St Andrews were the 2010 Conference Champions.



Sweden



History of the game

The first Lacrosse game in Sweden was played in 1988. The first Swedish championship was played in 1992. There are today eight teams playing in the Swedish league representing Lund in the south to Luleå up north. Swedish club teams try to travel abroad as well to participate in international tournaments.

International record

Sweden made their international debut in 1990. Their first appearance at the World Championships was playing in the emerging nations tournament in Manchester 1994. Sweden is one of the six founding members of the European Lacrosse Federation (ELF). Sweden has, with one exception, participated in every World and European championship since 1994.

The Swedish Men's Lacrosse team is currently ranked fourth in Europe after two consecutive European

Championships (Prague 2004 and Lahti 2008). Sweden was ranked eighth in the World cup in Perth Australia 2002.

Star players

Johnny Axelsson - is, through his team based actions, a true role model for the team. Johnny is a player that never gives up, a goal scorer with the right physique and attitude.

Sanny Samuelsson - one of our most experienced players that play a key role on the midfield.


Peter Welff - a player that sets the tone on the field with true fighting spirit. Peter showed a high level game during the European Championship in Lahti and is an important link in the defence.





Switzerland

History of the game

Lacrosse in Switzerland was initiated simultaneously in Zurich and St. Gallen in 2005, these were the first two places to have a sufficient number of players to compete in games. The St Gallen University Team started to Play in the Southern German League (SDLL) as early as 2006.

In 2008 the Swiss Lacrosse Federation decided to initiate the first Swiss Lacrosse Championship, it was won by Zurich, 2008 also marks the first appearance of a Swiss National team, as it participated first in the Austrian Nations Cup and later in the European Championships in Lahti, Finland.

In the Summer of 2009 a Swiss Team was able to win its first international tournament in Vienna, when they took the Gold in the 2nd Austrian Nations Cup. In

2010 the Swiss Lacrosse championship has nine teams competing.

International record

As mentioned above, the Swiss made their first international appearance in 2008 during the EC in Lahti, Finland. The Level of Play was very diverse. The Swiss suffered crushing defeats to some teams, while other games were very tight. Ultimately the Swiss finished in 16th place.

Preparation

In preparation for Manchester the Swiss National Team has held a number of practices, clinics and friendly matches against opponents like Munich and Stuttgart. In June the team will participate in the Berlin Open as a final preparatory measure.

Head Coach: Niklas Kukat: represented Germany on a number of accounts in European and World Championships, He























Wales



History of the game

The Welsh Lacrosse Association (WLA) was formed in 1930. The first Men's National team was formed in 1991 and has competed in both European and World Championships since. The WLA in conjunction with Penarth Lacrosse Club hosted the European Championships in 2001. The WLA created the Celtic Cup and hosted the inaugural event at the Welsh institute for Sport in July 2005.

International Record

WC1998: Baltimore, USA: Wales played 5 lost 5, (losing to Japan, Scotland, Sweden, Czech Republic, Germany) and finished in 11th position.

WC2002: Perth, Australia: Wales played 8 won 1 lost 7 (losing to Japan, Germany, Scotland, Sweden, Czech Republic) before beating South Korea 19-10. This was followed by a loss to Czech Republic and South Korea finishing in 12th place overall.

Star players

Chris Bishop: (Defence) "Bish" is a true take away player with an arsenal of checks to throw at his attacker. Not only is he a nightmare for attackers but can also cause problems for the opposition defence with his many ground balls and breaks up field.

Tom Brooks: (Attack) A real handful for any defence man. Tom has an ankle breaking dodge and has a cannon of a shot. He spent 2 years at Hudson Valley CC, USA before being recruited to play Div I at Manhattan College.

James Gallagher: (Attack) Shoots at over 100mph and is a much feared

attacker from Heaton Mersey. Back tofitness after what could have proved to be a career finishing injury. A valuable asset to the Wales squad especially on the EMO unit.

Preparation

Head coach - Jason Perrin: Former Wales player who brings a vast amount of International experience to the coaching staff. Jason will be coaching in his third World Championships having led Finland to 9th place in 2006 only losing to World Champions Canada.

20/0 FIL Festival preview

The 2010 FIL World Lacrosse Festival held in conjunction with the 2010 World Lacrosse Championships is one of the biggest ever, with 47 teams and 1000 players competing across 7 divisions.

There is a true international feel to this year's Festival with teams travelling to Manchester from across the Globe. The UK based teams are complemented by teams from the USA, Canada, Australia, Japan, Germany and the Netherlands. The Festival is split into 7 divisions: Boys' Under 16, Boys' Under 19, Men's Elite, Men's Masters (over 35), Men's Grand Masters (Over 45), Men's Super Grand Masters (over commence on Saturday July 17th and conclude on Wednesday 21st July. All masters' divisions commence on Sunday 18th July and conclude on Thursday 22nd July.

U16

Mimico Mountaineers - The Mimico Mountaineers U16 team is somewhat of a hybrid team cobbled together from several places in and around the Greater Toronto Area. The core of the team is a group of 15 and 16 year olds who have played together for almost ten years as part of Mimico's rep box and field lacrosse programs. This core group is supplemented by additional players from neighbouring communities of Alma, Burlington and Oakville. The team is proud to be the only U16 team in the tournament representing Canada, the ancestral home of lacrosse.

Lake Oswego - is a team assembled of boys from 5 different lacrosse programs in the greater Portland (Oregon, USA) área; Lakeridge, Lake Oswego, - Kingsway (Washington), West Linn and Lincoln. The Lake Oswego U16 team consists of 22 players who have been selected after a number of tryouts dating back to summer 2009.

Vermont Green Mountain Boys - Is a team made up of U16 high school players from across the state of Vermont (USA). Team Vermont is based in Manchester, Vermont which is located in the southern part of the state surrounded by the states Green Mountains, Vermont Green Mountain Boys are coached by Don Benasich (Vermont coach of the year 2010), Sam Johnson (former Burr & Burton Academy coach), David Cone (University of Vermont alumni) and David Sands (Syracuse University alumni).

England Academy 1 & 2 (U16 & U19) - All England Academy sides are made up of the cream of English U16 & U19 boys lacrosse. All players have successfully passed through the English Lacrosse

Association's Academy talent ID programme which helps prepare players for the rigours and skill levels required to compete at both international U19 level and international senior level.

U19

Harvard Sports (U19 & Elite) - The Harvard Sports teams are made up of players from High Schools 55), and Ladies. All U16, U19, Elite and Ladies games and Universities from across the USA. The concept of the team is to provide international competition to individual players looking to carry their game with others from around the USA to Europe. Harvard Sports selects university coaches to act as trainers and game staff coaches to those lacrosse athletes on tour. The staff at Harvard Sports NY wish all the athletes the best in athletics, sportsmanship, and fun

> USA West - USA West lacrosse was established in 1999 to give lacrosse players from non-traditional lacrosse regions an opportunity to play at the highest international level. USA West Lacrosse promotes lacrosse players from outside the traditional hotbeds of the sport, the majority of USA West's team is made up of players from California. Over the past eleven years USA West All- Star teams have competed in China, Japan, England, Wales, Germany, Australia, South Korea, and the Czech Republic.

> Minnesota - All players on Team Minnesota were born and raised in the state. In Minnesota (USA), lacrosse is a relatively new sport with most players having only started playing in the last 5-7 years. Several players from the state can be found playing at DI, DII, and DIII college levels. The team is made up of several high school and college players who have honed their careers in the state.

USA Starz (U19 & Elite) -This team was formed from the Starz Lacrosse Organization, a club of over 4000 players in the western US. USA Starz are in their third year in operation. The Starz are travelling on four different trips in 2010: Japan, Australia, Berlin/ Prague and the World Championships. The USA Starz program is comprised of players from over 20 states (and Canada), all players come from college lacrosse programs (MCLA- Div I).

Gin & Juice 1 & 2 - Started in 2003 as a small Touring team, Gin and Juice has developed into an

international conglomeration of lacrosse players headed by Jason Perrin. From the first entry at the 2003 E-Lacrosse Tournament until their latest championship at Bluesfest, the team has featured athletes from many countries and is continuing the international theme in this year's festival. With two teams entered, Gin & Juice is bringing 45 athletes from 5 different countries.

Tokyo Tower - Tokyo Tower was established in 2001 to join off-season tournaments in Japan. The members are mainly graduates of Univ. of Tokyo and some friends. The team's missions are pursuit of enjoying lacrosse and experiencing new ideas. Tokyo Tower wants to have a great experience, show high performance and make many new friends.

Behind Bars - Behind bars are comprised of local club players along with some friends from the USA, Australia and Europe. The core of the team played for the 2010 Lancashire team which recently won the 2010 British National Championships.

Team Ireland White - Team Ireland White is the development squad for the Irish National Lacrosse Team. This squad is the initial step for selection to the Irish National team. The team consists of players from all of the constituent clubs of the Ireland Lacrosse League including UCD, Dublin Lacrosse, UCG and Belfast Lacrosse. The Team is lead by Head Coach Mike Daly who recently coached the Tufts University Lacrosse Team to the NCAA Division 3 Championship

Stuttgarter Kickers - The Stuttgarter Kickers are a mix team from Southern Germany. The name originates from one of the lacrosse clubs in Stuttgart, HTC Stuttgart Kickers, which was formerly a football club but the name lives on. The players come from the Kickers, Karlsruher SV Storm, Bundeswehr (German Armed Forces) Lacrosse, and HLC Rot-Weis Munchen, Auf Geht's!

South Unis - The South of England Universities team is made up of players south of the Midlands city of Nottingham. Established in 2006 as the English Universities side split up into North and South. Since then the side has improved every year in the British National Championships, lately finishing runners up in the Plate Final. The team is now looking forward to its next challenge and test at the international level in the elite tournament.

Wales Development - This team comprises of players representing many of the clubs in Wales and players of Welsh heritage. A number have competed in the last World Championships in Canada. Led by

Coach Ray Nash who has seen action in many World and European Championships these players will provide an exciting and refreshing outlook to what they are seeking to achieve, which is a place in the Wales team for the next Under 19's-in Finland or the senior team in the Europeans in Holland.

University of Tokyo Blue Bullets - Blue Bullets are a varsity team, representing the University of Tokyo. Established in 1987, they are one of the oldest lacrosse teams in Japan, and it has been among the top college teams for over 20 years. Tokyo sent a team to the 2006 World Championships and made it to the final of the elite open tournament. University of Tokyo Blue Bullets are committed to keeping up with the games most up to date development in America as well as anywhere in the world, and thus remaining a leading lacrosse force in Japan.

Masters

Oakland's Hospital Select - The Oakland's Hospital select comprises of players from South Manchester based Cheadle Lacrosse club and friends from other local clubs. Many of the team's players have international experience, with players representing England over the years. The club has had much domestic success, winning numerous Northern League cups throughout the 1980's and 1990's. More recently members of Oakland's Hosp select were in the Cheadle Team which won the 2009 Northern Flags which is one of England's most prestigious amateur titles.

Bayswater Rocks - The Bayswater Rocks Lacrosse Team has been created for the members and friends of the Bayswater Lacrosse Club in Perth, Western Australia to support current and past players who represent their country in the FIL World Lacrosse Championships. The core members of the team have competed in the Masters festival in 2002 (Perth. Australia) and in 2006 (London, Ontario). In 2010 the club is represented in the FIL World Lacrosse Championships by Glenn Morley (Australia) and Nick Ravenhall (New Zealand).

Wildrose Brewery (Masters & GM) -The majority of Wildrose players hail from the beautiful Canadian province of Alberta. In general the only common connection is that they all love to play lacrosse! For most of the Wildrose Crude members it will be the first time they have played Field Lacrosse. Wildrose play in the Masters (O35) Indoor (Box) Lacrosse league in Calgary where the season runs April through to September. Wildrose Brewery and Crude are looking forward to the Manchester experience and are hoping the Festival will introduce the team to the world of old guy lacrossel





England Lions (masters, Elite, GM & SGM) - England Lions Lacrosse was formed in late 2009 in order to provide the opportunity for players of a more senior age to enjoy the game on a competitive basis. From small beginnings with practice sessions every couple of months, squads have now been assembled to compete in all three Masters Divisions and the elite division. A number of players who played in the 1998 games in Baltimore once again feature in the current Lions squad, and although the majority of players hail from northern clubs the 2010 squad now includes a number of players from southern teams.

Japan Masters - Participated in World Lacrosse Festivals as tour team 'Zipang' at the 2002 (Perth, Australia) and 2006 (Ontarlo, Canada) World Championships. Many of the team's players have represented Japan at international level. The history of lacrosse in Japan is short, the 2010 Festival is the first year where Japan Masters will compete within the Masters division. Japan Masters aim to become the first team to become FIL Masters World Champions.

SCOG - South Charlotte Old Guys is a team formed through the efforts of Doug Little who created a masters league in the Charlotte (North Carolina, USA) area. Many SCOG members volunteer as lacrosse coaches for local junior lacrosse leagues and schools across the Charlotte community. SCOG are very much looking forward to representing Charlotte in the Festival.

Grand Masters

FRQGS - The FROGS Team or Florida Real Old Guys was born about 25 years ago where transplanted lacrosse hotbed natives such as New York. Maryland, New Jersey, among many others, started to play in tournaments around the United States. Today, most of the FROGS hall from Tampa, Orlando, and other parts of Florida, with other players coming from all over the USA. Many players played at Denison, as well as Duke, Hobart, Cornell, Princeton, William & Mary, NC State, and USF. This is FROGS first overseas tournament.

Canada Ontario Masters - Team Ontario Canada is built predominantly around box players and was assembled in 2009 to play in the 2010 FiL Festival. The team includes five former Team Canada Field Lacrosse players; Stu Aird, Peter Follows, Joe Masterson, John Munroe and Bob Wasson. Five players have played professional box lacrosse and twelve players have played Major or Senior box lacrosse, Canada's highest amateur level. The team is based just outside Toronto in Oakville, Ontario.

Super Grand Masters

Cloud-Splitter - Cloud Splitter was initially a team from the Albany, New York area. The team now comprises of players from all over the east coast of the US. The majority of the team have been playing together since the late 1990's. As Grandmasters the team captured several championship titles at the annual Lake Placid tournament. Cloud Splitter are the reigning SGM champions (2006, 2007, 2008 and 2009) at Lake Placid.

USA Stars - The USA Stars team was originally formed in the latter part of 2001 for the purpose of competing in the 2002 World Championships of Lacrosse in Perth, Australia. For the 2010 Festival, only six of the original team players are able to compete in the SGM division. The team is comprised of players from all over the US with players coming from 15 different states. Some of the USA Stars players are recognized names in lacrosse in the US, while others are simply serious and capable players that love the game. It is this and the camaraderie that binds the players together into the USA Stars that will compete in the 2010 Festival.

USA Patriots - The 2010 World Championships marks only the second time that the USA Patriots have assembled to astonish the lacrosse world. The patriots represent 12 US states and 2 Canadian Provinces. Jim Baker gets the prize for travelling the farthest to play as he resides in the Aloha state of Hawaii. The Patriots look forward to silencing the critics who have cited age and infirmity as reasons why they will not do well in these games. Are the Patriots Indeed old and slow? Forgetful? Yes, all of these, but most of these men are hungry for victory and thirsty for English beer.

Old Glory - The team originated as Paladins, a group of Holy Cross alumni that wished to play at club level. The team now.includes players from Cortland, Hobart. SUNY, Williams, Ohio-Wesleyan and many other quality programs. In January of this year Old Glory travelled to the Florida Lacrosse Classic and placed 2nd in the GM Division. At Easter, a long-time friend and former Colgate head coach named Paul Rose passed away before he could join the team for the Festival. In what will likely be Old Glory's last World Games, the team hope to bring home the FIL SGM championship in honour of Paul and his wife Jeanne.

Ladies

Wales U19 Red & Black - Both teams are comprised of Wales U19 development players. These two squads will form the basis of the Wales U19 team which will compete at the 2011 Under 19 World Cup.

Munich - The Munich Ladies have already competed in some international tournaments and became German Champions in June 2010. Having two ladies teams in Munich both competing in Bundesliga Sud; the HLC Rot-Weiss Munchen is one of the biggest clubs in Germany.

Heaton Mersey - Is a local team based in South East Manchester, Heaton Mersey have been involved with many International tournaments over the last ten years. This will be Heaton Mersey's first FIL World festival.


JNGLA - JNGLA was formed in 2005 by Alison Dunn to travel to Annapolis to play in the Cup of Nations at the Women's World Cup. The team has grown since 2005 and is comprised of current North of England players. Many JNGLA players have played at international level, representing Wales U19, Scotland and England U19.

Orange Wave - The Orange Wave Programme was established in 2009 to bring a higher level of coaching and training to Dutch lacrosse. The team is a mix of established players who have World Cup experience and very new players, all improving rapidly due to the coaching efforts from coaches such as Molly McCourt, Stefanie Web, Chris Kohler and Travis Taylor. The team are all very excited about Manchester.

Team L.A.D - Are a mixed group of lacrosse loving L.A.D.S brought together from an assortment of London teams and unis by a shared love of international competition. Team LAD first came together at the 2009 Women's World Cup in Prague.

Ex Pats - Is a team compromised of the English Lacrosse Associations School coaching officers (SCO's). All players have competed at NCAA Div I, Div II, and Div III level.

Timperiey - Is a local team based in South West Manchester. Many of the team's players have international experience, with players representing Scotland and England. Timperiey were recently crowned 2010 North League champions.



A major legacy

Major legacy for a minor sport

Manchester hosts the World Championships for the 3rd time, and the game has grown so much since 1994 (from 6 to 30 nations). Based on the number of participants the event will be the largest competitive sporting event held in the UK since the Commonwealth Games in 2002. How can English Lacrosse use the World Championships to attract more people to the game, keep people in the game longer and improve the standard of those playing? Who are the agencies willing to buy into these objectives and how do we implement it with little or no funding for the event itself?

Growing the grass roots of the lacrosse and sustaining participation

Manchester was chosen as the host to the championships as it is the hub of the game in the UK. The North of England Men's Lacrosse League is the strongest in Europe and there are 17 clubs providing access to competitive lacrosse from under 12's to open age. The aim is to increase the number of people accessing these clubs and look to increase retention rates. The Championships provides the opportunity for individuals to be part of the event, play on the same fields as elite athletes, meet those athletes and feel that they are part of the 2010 Lacrosse World Championships, not just as spectators but as participants.

Schools and youth groups

Lacrosse is successful in achieving curriculum delivery through its long established LDO programme which has, for over 30 years, seen clubs bringing over American college graduates to deliver lacrosse in primary schools. Our plan is to provide access to coaching and competition to both primary and secondary school pupils who have been part of an existing programme and to engage with new school that have not.

Old men!

The physical nature of the sport of lacrosse means that 20 something's and 40 something's don't always mix on the field. The development of competition at older age groups will not only provide better opportunities for those in the game but re engage those who have stopped playing. The Masters,

Grand Masters and Super Grand Masters tournaments which will run in parallel to the main championships will be the first a series of tournaments making up an annual programme of regional, national and international competition for over 35's, 45's and 55's.

Monitoring of success can be implemented relatively easily and progression routes identified and recorded. We are confident that we can achieve a long term legacy through the use of local clubs and agencies targeting local people.

History of English Lacrosse

In 1867 Captain Johnson brought 18 Iroquois to England to show off the Canadian National Sport of Lacrosse. Demonstrations were given in various parts of the UK and the first clubs were formed.

The first club established was in Glasgow but the oldest club still playing is Stockport LC which was formed in 1875.

In the late 19th century the British had developed a bent for setting up sporting bodies and codifying sports. In 1868 the English Lacrosse governing body was formed for the new sport and it also produced its own version of the rules which even though the sport was first seen in UK a year previously, were considered (at least by the English) superior to Dr Beers Canadian rules

The Rev JG Wood in his compendium of Victorian sport explained without a hint of irony or humility that the British had invented the very process of codifying sports. "The Canadian rules," he explained, "are much more minute than ours and seek to provide laws for all sorts of matters which we in England prefer to leave to honourable understanding amongst players. The colonists have not been schooled in the continual playing of games where written laws are unknown, so they pile up safeguards as if the contestants were going to law instead of playing a match."

After its initial flourish the game made only stuttering progress. Before the 1st World War some of the best Lacrosse was played in Northern Ireland. The effect of the war was profound in much of the UK and in many areas where the game was initially started it never re-established itself and it disappeared completely from places like Northern Ireland. Player numbers suffered badly from war casualties and sticks also become difficult to access.

In the USA rule changes were beginning to be introduced and in 1921 the offside rule was introduced

In 1922 a Baltimore journalist coined the phrase "The fastest game on two feet," and no better summing up of the sport has been thought up since.

In 1933 teams in the US were reduced to 10 players per side and the 15 minute quarter was introduced. In the 1920s and 1930s transatlantic tours took place with Syracuse University playing and losing to the North of England in front of a reputed 9,000 spectators at Cale Green.

One of the outcomes of this interchange was to bring to the fore the rules debate and in 1938 there was a proposal to introduce 10 a side Lacrosse with offside for a trial period. This experiment was unfortunately prevented by the 2nd World War and when the game restarted in 1946 it was to the old rules.

It was not really until after the Oxford/Cambridge tour of 1961 that the pressure for rule changes once more began to gain momentum. Boundaries were first introduced and following the 1967 World championships helmets were worn and within a few years made compulsory bringing head injuries

In 1970 Off-sides and 10 a side were introduced in the south of England with the more conservative north following a couple of years later.

In 1978 England hosted the Men's world championships at Edgeley Park Stockport. The England team nearly posted a major upset when they went down to an 11-12 defeat to USA. The Championships did provide a major upset with Canada reversing a then world record margin in qualifying games to defeat USA 17-16 in overtime

England took the lead in establishing women's international competition by staging the first evo Women's World Cup in Nottingham in 1982.

In the 1980s men's Lacrosse began to struggle Problems arose in British schools with teachers taking industrial action which caused great dan to sports programmes, Minor sports, like Lacros were particularly badly damaged.

However, a threat was also an opportunity and the sport started the fight back. Areas of close cooperation with women's Lacrosse emerged. In particular the All England Women's Lacrosse Association and the English Lacrosse Union established the Joint Development Programme and with support from Sport England a small team of dedicated staff was set up. The AEWLA had launched POP Lacrosse as a simple game which gave access to Lacrosse to everyone, particularly primary school children. In 1980 the men's game had started to employ young US graduates to deliver Lacrosse in schools as part of the PE curriculum and to improve coaching at all levels in clubs. The partnership was immediately positive and productive and first of all stabilised the game in clubs and the girl's schools and has since laid strong foundations

In 1990 the two Governing Bodies co-operated to set up a joint magazine -Lacrossetalk. Twenty years and 118 issues later the magazine is still a strong and positive communication tool for Lacrosse.

Men and women also co-operated in producing a generic Coaching award where Lacrosse was treated as the same game for men and women with common skills, strategies and tactics.

The logical outcome of this co-operation was that the men's and women's governing bodies should amalgamate to form a single national governing body for Lacrosse. The English Lacrosse Association was formed as the National Governing Body for Men's and Women's Lacrosse in 1996

In 1994 England again hosted the Men's World Championships. There were 5 teams in the main Championship with the Iroquois Nationals and Japan joining the 4 founder nations. The most significant move was, however, to host a tournament for emerging nations featuring the Czech Republic, Germany, Scotland, Sweden and Wales. The expansion of International Lacrosse had begun!

The expansion was consolidated and continued in Baltimore in 1998.

In 1999 England were again international hosts organising a men's and women's European Championship in Manchester.

In 2001 England hosted, for the second time, the Women's World Cup. The major part of the event was held at Wycombe Abbey School with the finals held at the ground of Wycombe Wanderers FC.

The first decade of the 21st century has been exciting and progressive for Lacrosse in England. In a large part this has been due to increased funding from central government through Sport England.

The number of Coaches employed on the Development Programme has grown to well over 100 representing a resource which Sport England acknowledges is worth nearly £3,000,000 every year. This programme is enabled by grant aid and clearly represents an effective use of public money.

Over the last five years membership of English Lacrosse has grown 4 fold to around 20,000.

Lacrosse is expanding all over England. University Lacrosse is particularly buoyant and is growing by around 20% per annum - a rate which should continue for some years. The number of institutions playing men's Lacrosse has increased from around eight 7 years ago to over 60 registered for competition in 2011.


We are seeing more clubs formed often spawned out of the University programmes and are about to launch an exciting new initiative, in partnership with the Youth Sports Trust to introduce the game into more secondary schools.

The World Championships is the biggest Lacrosse event ever. It is an exciting project to be involved in but its legacy will certainly be to boost the sport in the UK and hopefully continue the momentum of international growth.









Things to do in Manchester

Areas of the City Centre

1. Northern Quarter

The Northern Quarter has long been known as the 'creative quarter' of Manchester - the home of fashion designers, creative agencies, art galleries and quirky retailers. Whilst these still remain the area is growing in popularity with bars, restaurants and residential development. It is forming a contemporary and inspirational extension to the core of the city centre. Sited between Piccadilly and Ancoats - the Northern Quarter retains a unique character and charm, it must be seen to be appreciated - the heart of the area is beating again with vitality and personality second to none. Visit Simple on Tibb St the original Northern Quarter bar, next to the cool record shops. Great import beer selection, wonderful food, fantastic offers and DJ's play at the weekends.

2. Castlefield

When the Romans withdrew from Britain, the fort was abandoned (410AD) and over the following centuries the site decayed and became overgrown, so that by the Middle Ages it was known locally as "The Castle in the Field", which eventually became condensed into Castlefield, as it remains today. The Castlefield area has been designated as Britain's first Urban Heritage Park. It contains not only wealth of Manchester's industrial heritage - railway viaducts, canal systems and museums but also many tourist attractions including waterside pubs. pleasant walks, boat trips and frequent events in the outdoor area. Visit Dukes 92 located at the 92nd lock those visitors seeking a more refined retail of the Canal, perfect for a summer's evening drink.

The Chinese district is dominated by the Imperial Chinese Archway, a gift to the City from the Chinese

people, the only one in Europe, and even more decorative than that found in San Francisco. Chinatown is one of the busiest and most colourful areas of Manchester. The area bustles with life tradesmen and tourists alike and is usually particularly well worth seeing on Sundays, when ethnic Chinese traders from all over the country have traditionally descended on the area to buy in food supplies from the proliferation of small shops. herbalists, gift shops, restaurants and markets. Apart from a profusion of Chinese Restaurants, there are many other ethnicities represented in Chinatown. including Thai, Malaysian, Singaporean, Nepalese, Italian, French and Japanese shops and restaurants. For the food-seeker, there is a cornucopia of restaurants to choose from, both Cantonese and Pekingese, as well as other oriental restaurants.

Shopping

4. Market St

Shopping in Manchester's Market St really is main stream shopping. Possibly one of the city centre's busiest and most popular shoppers' thoroughfares, now entirely pedestrianised, many familiar High Street shopping outlets are to be found here in addition to the entrance to the all dominating Arndale Centre shopping mall, along with street performers who tend to set out their pitch here.

The King Street area of Manchester is a must-see for experience; it is a mecca for designer aficionados. It boasts top High Street brand names like Armani, Agent Provocateur, East, Jaeger, Diesel, Tommy Hilfiger and Vivienne Westwood.

6. Hard Rock Cafe

8. Comedy Store

The serious night out! The original Comedy Store opened above a strip club in Soho, London in 1979. Comedy lovers can now enjoy the acts right here in Manchester, located in the cool 'Deansgate Locks' area of the City Centre. Still the greatest and most influential comedy club on the planet. Six nights a week. £10-£20/ ticket.

9. Manchester United

The story of Manchester United is unlike any other club in the world. Beginning more than a century ago, it combines eras of total English and European domination with some of the greatest adversity faced by any football club.

Only at the Manchester United Museum & Tour can you experience the story in all its glory, and immerse yourself in a legend still being made.

Only at the Manchester United Museum & Tour Centre can you see the stadium through the eyes of Manchester United greats themselves on the Old Trafford tour. Or get even closer to the world of Manchester United and share 130 years of football in the award-winning Museum.

Whether you're a Manchester United fan or not, a visit to the Museum & Tour Centre is a day to remember! Tickets £12.50-£8 per person.

10. Manchester City Football Club

The 'other' football club in Manchester; though supporters of Manchester City will claim the 'only' football club in Manchester. Manchester City reside in the City of Manchester stadium, a legacy left behind after the 2002 Commonwealth Games. Stadium tours cost £7.50 - £6.00.



11. Deansgate Locks

The converted arches on Whitworth Street West at the bottom end of Deansgate house some of the most popular bars in the city centre. Not to be mistaken with the Deansgate area of town, 'The Locks', as they are better known locally, are famous for their trendy bars and clubs. The ten railway arches are home to five bars hanging over the canal below.

12. Beetham Tower - Cloud 23

Completed in 2006 at a cost of £150 million, the Beetham Tower in Manchester, is the highest building in Manchester, the tallest residential building in Europe and the 7th tallest building in England with over 525,000 square feet of space. The Beetham Tower is 168.87 metres high, has a total of 47 floors. Floor 23 houses the Cloud Bar, This bar promises opulence never before seen in the city. Above it is another 20 floors of apartments, below it are a lot of hotel rooms and another bar (Podium). Double vaulted windows and glass peepholes in the floor will add to the effect, and if you can look past the pricey drinks then you'll be in for a treat. The cocktails are excellent though, and well mixed.

13. Common - Northern Quarter

A gorgeous anti-corporate bar set in the midst of the resurgent Northern Quarter. Common is hidden away down Edge Street, you get the feeling that the entire building's budget was spent on artwork. Adorning the walls are huge spray and template pieces, ranging from intense i-pop kids to super-cute animals with imaginary toilet rolls. Inside the bar is absolutely tiny, but there are plenty of seats and cubicles. A good range of local DJs play from Thursday - Sunday.



Places to eat

14. Dimitris Tapas Bar Taverna - Deansgate

Dimitris is nothing less than a Manchester institution, providing one of the city's most popular and atmospheric dining experiences. It's right at the Castlefield end of Deansgate, opposite the Beetham Tower, and makes great use of its appealing location, the Campfield Arcade with its distinctive glass and ironwork. Set meals at good prices is what Dimitris is known for, where the laid-back atmosphere and relaxed look of wood floors set off the honest to goodness Mediterranean cooking. What sets the cooking apart is the policy of offering good food at affordable prices. It has a something for everyone appeal.

15. The Ox - Castlefield

A traditional gastro pub/hotel serving excellent, modern, English food sourced from the finest local ingredients. Food is served in the historic pub where you can enjoy a pint of traditional cask ale or choose from our hand-picked wine list.

16. Grill On the Ally - Deansgate

Located off iconic Deansgate this restaurant epitomises old and new Manchester, coming together to form a perfect partnership where you may hide away in a haven of great food, drink and atmosphere; enjoy our produce driven menu of freshly prépared and mouth watering dishes cooked correctly and served simply.

17. ABode Restaurant - Piccadilly

Fine dining at its best; The Michael Caines Restaurant and Champagne Bar atl/ABode Manchester, located in an atmospheric lower level dining room, serves exciting and innovative European cuisine utilising the best local and regional produce and ingredients from Manchester, Lancashire, Cheshire and surrounds. An exciting range of menus include grazing, a la carte and tasting. The wine list has been carefully chosen to complement the cuisine, with a selection of excellent and excellent-value wines from both classic European vineyards as well as New World estates.

Wider Manchester - Curry Mile

A nickname for the part of Wilmslow Rd that runs through Rusholme. The name is well earned as the area is thought to home the largest concentration of South Asian restaurants outside of India. It is, admittedly, less than a mile but boasts at least 70 restaurants, take aways and kebab houses.

Pubs

Manchester is famous for many things, to name a few; Rolls met Royce here, we invented the first computer, an unrivalled music scene (as long as you don't ask Liverpool) and we split the atom! Perhaps, most importantly we are known for Beer. Manchester houses many top class breweries, Hydes, Joseph Holt, J W Lees, Robinson's and the more contemporary Marble.

18. Sams Chop House

A chop house isn't just a restaurant or a pub. Or even a gastro-pub (though it's probably fair to say that chop houses were gastro pubs centuries before the expression was coined by a marketing whiz kid). A chop house is a meeting place with much more than just beers to drink.

19. Peveril of the Peak

A pub as unique as it's name, which comes from Walter Scott's novel of the same title. The pub sits awkwardly on a triangular piece of land, surrounded by modern high rise buildings, solicitors, a hotel and all sorts of 'new Mancunia'. Its two tone yellow brickwork draws even more attention to it and you fenalmost sorry for the bar that was no doubt spectacular in its time. Inside you'll find a 'proper' boozer, of which there are a surprisingly large numbe within the city centre. The pub comprises: a pool table, a table football machine and a fine selection of ales and beers, many of them brewed locally.

20. Britain's Protection

With a choice of over 150 whiskies and bourbons, cas ales and fine wines it's hard to find many better pubs in the whole of the Greater Manchester region. As well as the many regulars you'll also bump into musicians and performers from the Bridgewater Hall which is based on the opposite side of the road. From the outside it looks like a small uninviting pub but inside it's a warm, friendly, tardis like boozer with rooms going off in all directions. One of the upstairs rooms is sometimes used as a live music and poetry venue, and there's even a secret beer garden at the back.

21. Town Hall Tavern

The Town Hall Tavern is a friendly little pub tucked away off Albert Square. Think classy traditional pub and you're not far off – open fireplace, bookcase with fading editions of Dickens classics, red carpets, beer mats. They deserve a special mention for their robust ale selection and range of whiskies on offer, and the food is cheap and filling.



World Championship Shield

The World Championship Shield was donated to the International Federation of Lacrosse (fore-runner of the Federation of International Lacrosse) by Laurie Turnbull in 1974 to be awarded to the winner of each Championship. As President of the ILF at that time he presented it to USA who were the 1974 winners in Melbourne.

Laurie Turnbull was an outstanding lacrosse figure, well known throughout he world. He dedicated himself to the growth of lacrosse and climbed through the club and state administrative structure in Australia. He managed the first Australian squad to tour England and then, in 1962 became President of the Australian Lacrosse Council. He was President over the period 1967 to 1974 of what became the ILF at that time.

World Lacrosse Championships

This article is intended provide a short overview of the men's senior World Championships, the major event in international lacrosse, and reflect on some of the changes that have occurred, as well as the growth along the way.

The first World Lacrosse Championships was held in Toronto, Canada in 1967. The Canadian Lacrosse Association invited Australia, England and USA to participate in a World Championship to celebrate the Canadian Centennial of Confederation and also the 100th, anniversary of the drafting of their Official Rules of lacrosse. The Mount Washington Lacrosse Club represented the USA. The format of the Championships was a round robin with 3 games for each team with USA top with a 3-0 record, followed by Australia 2-1, Canada 1-2 and England 3-0.

In 1974 the Australian Lacrosse Council took the initiative and invited Canada, England and USA to take part in the next World Championships, held in Melbourne, celebrating the 100th anniversary of the introduction of lacrosse in Australia. The same round robin format was used with USA winning 3-0 and the other three teams all having a 1-2 record.

At this event the International Lacrosse Federation (ILF) was established and agreement reached that the Championships would take place every four years with each of the four members hosting on a rotational basis. The "rotational" basis in those days included the bosts being responsible for the housing, food and internal transportation costs of all the teams.

1978 saw a similar format but with the concept of a "final" introduced. The Championships were hosted by England using Stockport County Football Club as the venue. The surprise result was Canada beating USA 17-16 in overtime in the final, having been soundly beaten 28-4 in the round robin. Also in the round robin England was narrowly defeated 12-11 by the USA.

The same format applied in Baltimore, USA in 1982, where the concept of a "tent village" was introduced and Toronto, Canada in 1986.

In the mid-late 80's the mould of the "traditional four" was being challenged by with the Iroquois Nationals, representing the Six Nation Iroquois Confederacy (Haudenosaunee) of the Seneca, Cayuga, Oneida, Onondaga, Mohawk and Tuscarora nations. After a number of financial and political hurdles were overcome the Iroquois initially joined the ILF in 1985 as a "Competitive Affiliate" and in 1987 were granted Full Member status.

This meant that the 1990 championships held at the famous Western Australia Cricket Association ground, known through out the world by cricket enthusiasts simply as the WACA, for others Perth, Australia, had five teams competing. The Iroquois ended with a 0-4 record but the losing streak was not to last for long. As well as the Iroquois Nationals competing the other momentous event was Japan becoming a Full Member of the ILF.

So the 1994 Championships, in England and played at the Bury Football Club, had 6 teams competing. At this time a new group of lacrosse playing nations were emerging, these being the Czech Republic. Germany, Scotland, Sweden and Wales. English Lacrosse Chief Executive David Shuttleworth had the foresight to arrange a "Division 1" competition held at the same time a the main Championships at the Manchester University sports fields known as the Firs. The 2010 Championships are also being played at this facility. These teams, together with England, went on to form the European Lacrosse Federation in 1995 and commenced the European Championships that year. This was initially an annual event until all the founder members had hosted and is now played every four years.

The 1998 Championships were played at Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, USA with 11 teams competing, the "Division 1" counties from 1994 all having been accepted into membership of the ILF.

This Championship heralded a number of fundamental changes. The method of financing Championships with the host bearing all the costs of housing, food and internal transportation, whilst possible with 5 /6 teams and rotational hosting was simply not sustainable with 11 teams. From this Championship onwards teams had to pay their own way, however US Lacrosse did provide some support to teams, from the event surplus, to ease the transition

The rotational hosting ceased at this time and the ILF introduced a bid process where national governing bodies could submit an application to host future events and these would be considered on a number of criteria including playing facilities, housing, finances, development opportunities etc.

At this Championship the format changed from all teams playing each other on a round robin basis to pools trying to match teams to provide good quality games and with the "play in" system still providing all Full Member teams the opportunity to get to the Gold Medal game. Associate Members cannot progress into the "play in games". This general for at, with increased numbers of pools has been car ed on through to this year and features in the planning for 2014. The pools of divisions were deliberately identified with colours, Blue, Red etc. rather than numerals so as not to create the perception externally of graded divisions. Blue division is the top 6 from the previous Championships but others are put together on a seeded basis across all the other teams.

The 1998 final was probably one of the most exciting international games ever seen. With USA leading 11-1 at 3rd Quarter Canada scored 9 goals in the last 15 minutes of normal time. Canada scored just prior to the final whistle to tie the game 13-13. The final score was 15-14 to USA.

In 2002 back to Perth, but this time at the University of Western Australia Sports Park, a tremendous facility with a large number fields to cater for the all the ancillary events and Festival games.

There should have been 16 teams with new entrants Korea, Hong Kong, Ireland, New Zealand and Tonga competing in the Green Division but Tonga failed to show.

2002 was also significant in that debate commenced within the ILF on the structure of future Championships and whether the current format could be sustained. Consideration was given to a reduction in the number competing with perhaps regional elimination events much like other sports. The prevailing view was that the inclusive nature of the event was a major strength giving the countries starting lacrosse a major goal to aim for in competing at world level.

Canada hosted the 2006 Championships in London, Ontario, with the event continuing to grow. Planning was on the basis of 24 teams, however 3 dropped out quite late on. The organisers of this event were perhaps a little over optimistic in their planning of the non-lacrosse activities and encountered a number of financial difficulties. On the playing side USA suffered only their second defeat ever in Championships play (the other one being 1978) when they lost the final to Canada 15 –10. New teams at this Championships included Bermuda, Denmark, Finland, Italy, Latvia, Netherlands and Spain.



And so we come to 2010 with the Championships in Manchester, England and using the Armitage Centre, the Manchester University facility, and this time with 30 teams competing. The first timers being Argentina, Austria, France, Mexico, Norway, Poland, Sjoyakia and Switzerland.

The growth over the last 16 years has been fantastic and let us hope our game continues to grow. For 2014 the preliminary planning is on the basis of being able to cope with up to 38 teams, possibly more.



FIL (ILF) World Championships



Growth has brought a number of other issues to the surface all of which have largely been resolved. In 1974 the playing rules were agreed by the managers and coaches of the 4 teams in the day or so before the event began and officials in striped shirts had not been seen in Australia before. Rule changes are not permitted now in the period of two years before a Championships, unless unanimously agreed in a FIL meeting.

Debates over the number of players in a squad ranging from 19 to unlimited which occupied a lot of time of the "traditional 4" in the early days have dissipated into a non-issue. The number has been at the settled level of 23 (with no replacement after a Championships starts) for a number of years now.

Eligibility (to play for a team) was not a matter of concern in the early years but became a matter of much emotive debate with the number of European teams increasing and some using North American players, often with a tenuous connection to the country that they played for. Major decisions were made in 2004 limiting the number of players not having the passport of the country represented and also defining the conditions of eligibility, marriage, grandparent, periods of residency etc.

Many teams that "imported" players have now passed through that phase and want to ensure that the opportunity is provided for home grown players to achieve the ultimate in lacrosse, and that of course is playing in the World Championships.
