HIGH STANDARD IN OPENING LACROSSE GAMES

Interesting Series to be Played on Saturday

Great enthusiasm and a high standard of play marked the opening of the lacrosse season. Extra entries have brought the list of teams to 68—the greatest on record. The season's programme will not be closed until next week.

THE best match on Saturday should be at Caulfield, where the students will meet University, where the students will meet Caulfield. Last week Michael, from Perth, was one of the best men on the University side, and is a decided acquisition. Old players in Jarrett, Wilson and McKillop were in great form, and Caulfield will need to strain every nerve to win.

The appeal by H. Harrison against the refusal of his permit from Caulfield was dismissed by the investigation committee. Caulfield are disappointed, as Harrison would have been of great assistance.

BOTH WILL IMPROVE

Hawthorn will be at home to Brighton, and with the team almost even strength there should be a close contest. Brighton and Hawthorn at present are having rather lean times, but it will not be long before both sides are greatly improved, as several players have yet to come along.

Malvern, who opened so well, will be at home to M.C.C. Malvern seldom fail to produce players of high standard, and the fine appearance of Fowler was a distinctly creditable one. Willing to learn, he should go far and will be a permanent member of the team if he can maintain his fine form of last week. Jack Beattie, V. Neale and Reg. Brerley, three veterans, still are quite capable of holding their own, and were as good as any on the ground at Caulfield.

Glen, who was hon. secretary of Malvern last season, is taking up a legal practice in Ballarat, and will be playing for one of the country sides.

M.C.C. showed a great improvement on the form of last season. The loyalty to the cricket club team of men like Wilson, Melrose, Walters and Russell is refreshing. Year after year they help their side along, and now, with the assistance of several fine recruits, the best of whom last week was Leigh from Brighton, the cricket team should do well, although Malvern will no doubt prove too experienced to overcome on Saturday.

Williamstown, with fine recruits in Hicks and P. Duco, are as strong as ever. Forster, another recruit from the junior team, should make good. Last week he was played out of position. More could be got out of him further up the field, on Saturday against Camberwell at Canterbury C.G. The seashore should win, but Camberwell will not doubt be able to put up a better performance at home.

Cantwell, who kept goals for Camberwell, has been granted a permit to M.C.C.

COBURG'S GOOD SIDE

Coburg, with Marshall, the interstate player, as captain, seem to have a great side, and with a little earlier attention to training might have beaten Williamstown. The defence got a little unsettled in the final stages, and the

readers did not fail to take advantage of it. On Saturday Melbourne H.S. Old Boys will be faced with stiff opposition, but Coburg will need to be prepared for a good game, as the ex-High School boys showed fine form against Hawthorn. McCay, a brother of the interstate player, is captain, and old players in May, Kinner and Clark seem to have improved.

University and Malvern again appear to have the combination. The form of the students on Saturday was particularly impressive, and they should be a better side than for many years past.

Both Coburg and Williamstown seem to be quite as strong as ever. Their engagement was a stirring one, a little too strenuous, but never below there were many brilliant moments.

LACROSSE CONTROL

Move To Abolish Elected Members

As a result of a largely signed requisition the hon. secretary of the Victorian Lacrosse Association has called a special general meeting of the association at the Amateur Sports Club on Wednesday evening to consider a notice to alter the constitution so that the office of elected members of the V.L.A. may be abolished.

The constitution of the V.L.A. provides for eight elected members in addition to the club delegates and executive officers. The sponsors of the motion assert that the governing body is at present too unwieldy, and that the abolition of the elected members would reduce the size of the association, thus expediting the transaction of business. The proposal is creating considerable interest among lacrosse followers, and Wednesday night's meeting promises to be a lively one, as no doubt there will be much opposition to the suggested alteration.

LACROSSE.

In the Ooburg-Williamstown match, Ooburg were first to show out and clever dodging by Paddy resulted in a well-earned goal. Williamstown attacking vigorously was exploiting the back of the goal game, and Henry, with fine anticipation, twice enabled Frank Deacon to score. This term ended in favor of Williamstown 2 goals to 1. A pass by D. Marshall to Paddy was brilliantly converted, but Williamstown's response was prompt, Jenkins capping a rushing play by Crook, with a clever shot. Ashby equalized the score from a cleverly granted free throw. Nick put the leaders in the lead with an angle shot just on time. O'Gorman, who had been unusually quiet, put the teams again equal with a remarkable goal—all. Towards the close of the third term, Ashby gaining possession, came through, and his clever dodging, enabled Crook to lead at three-quarter time, 4 goals to 4. D. The subject of goal umpiring has again cropped up. Camberwell complains that M.C.C.'s winning goal was thrown when there was a man in the goal circle. If this be correct—and it is stated that the goal umpire admitted it after allowing the goal—it is further and most convincing evidence of the need for control by some competent authority of nominations to this important post. No man should undertake the duties of a goal umpire who has not this rudimentary knowledge of the rules.

The match between M.C.C. and Camberwell was remarkable in the first place for the low scoring. The result was a win for M.C.C. by 3 goals to 2. In addition to its protest against M.C.C.'s third goal being allowed, Camberwell claims that Melbourne's first goal was thrown after the bell was rung. M.C.C.'s weakness in attack was another remarkable feature, though many failures in shots for goal were due to the most efficient keeping of McCorkill. This fine display of goalkeeping was equalled by the good work of Cantwell in the other net.

Ooburg by defeating Williamstown (7 goals to 5) has gained second place on the premiership list, two points behind Malvern and two ahead of the layabouts. The match on the Bell street reserve on July 19 was a strong attraction, as both teams were well equipped in expert forwards and both were keen to win. Ooburg had the advantage in that, while the Williamstown forwards were undoubtedly an even combination, they lacked the force and ability of at least two of the Ooburg men in Bulky and Ashby, who, after their dashing display in this match, seem assured of their inclusion in the interstate team.

University had an easy match against Brighton, scoring 16 goals to 5. Eight of the students' goals were scored in the first quarter. All of Brighton's efforts were unavailing against the strong University defence until the final quarter. Hawthorn scored its third win this season, defeating Melbourne High School Old Boys by 10 goals to 3. At their last meeting on the opening day of the season the High School team won with 17 goals to 2.

Malvern was too good for Caulfield, netting 21 goals to 10. The game was by no means one-sided in the first half. Malvern had an advantage of three goals—12 to 9—at the long interval, and dominated the game in the second half.

MATCHES IN ADELAIDE.

Owing to heavy grounds following the rain lacrosse matches in Adelaide last Saturday were on the slow side. Sturt against Port Adelaide finished indeterminately, and won by 11 goals to 8. North Adelaide and University drew with 4 goals each. East Tor was defeated Goodwood by 12 goals to 6. For the cateneters, G. Gellert threw nine goals.

For the match against Victoria this year the South Australian selectors have chosen mostly young players. Although it is hard to pass over with a fair centre as H. Kestel, a younger man in J. Muschke is playing equally as well. Kestel also would be an asset in defence, but here again there are J. Martin and L. Waddy, both fast players. In these circumstances the ultimate placing of Kestel is causing much interest. There is some doubt about several of the 18 selected to practise being able to make the trip, but provide all are available the following would comprise a sound side:—C. Mackenzie (goal), C. Boyce, A. Martin, J. Spencer (backs), J. Martin, L. Waddy (defence), J. Muschke (centre), A. Cook, G. Bailey (attack), H. Cook, J. Lee, M. Burley (forwards), H. Kestel (13th).

Some Good Scoring.

Williamstown, without their captain, A. Devcon, and missing the heady behind-goals play of Henry, were sadly disappointed against the High School Old Boys. The Old Boys were quick to take advantage of their disorganization, and at quarter-time led 3 goals to 2. Claringhough was taken out of the net and played forward, and the move was immediately successful, the leaders leading 7 goals to 6 at half-time. Over-anxiety among their forwards split many scoring chances for the Old Boys, and Williamstown were 10 goals to 7 at the final change. Williamstown's experience enabled them to prevail with a tally of 11 goals to 6. The goals were scored by Reid (3), F. Deacon (2), Jenkins (2), Claringhough, Ferris, Crooke for Williamstown, and by Clarke (2), Lemon (2), May and Jenkins for Old Boys.

University at quarter-time had scored the only goal for the quarter against Ooburg. Grant scored cleverly, and Ooburg's combined play gradually gained control. At half-time they were ahead 6 goals to 2. In the third quarter Fitzroy from a free throw in front netted for Ooburg. Towards the end of the quarter Paddy scored from an acute angle, and Ooburg led 6-2 at three-quarter time. The final result was Ooburg 11, University 2. The winners were best represented by O'Gorman, Smith, G. Reid, Floyd, D. Marshall, and Ashby (2). Floyd and Seale were the students' best players. Baylis, Pace, Unwin and Jarrett were most effective, and Grant scored their 2 goals.

Splashing through mud and water the players were unable to give their best display. In such conditions the more experienced men had the advantage, quickly adapting their methods to the occasion. The South Australians were a young combination, only two of the team having played before in an interstate match in this State. VICTORIA SUPREME IN LACROSSE

By "CENTRE"

NEARLY 50 years have passed since the first interstate lacrosse game between Victoria and South Australia was played. In all those years I doubt if there was ever such a disappointing contest as that played last Saturday.

At no stage did the South Australians produce anything like the form usually shown by teams from that State. There was no team work, none of that hard, fast, dashing lacrosse that we have become so used to in Adelaide teams. In fact, one can say it was perhaps the poorest side that has ever represented South Australia. This was distinctly unfortunate, for notwithstanding the dreadful weather, a very big crowd witnessed the game, and spectators who were seeing lacrosse for the first time could hardly have been impressed.

While the South Australians failed badly, there is no doubt about the superiority of the Victorians. I doubt if ever a finer or better balanced side has appeared in the dark blue uniform. There was not a weak link in the whole combination, from Sid Wilson, in goal, right down the field to Jack Beattie, in the first home position. I am sure that at the moment the Victorian team could easily account for any side selected from the rest of Australia.

The present satisfactory position of Victorian lacrosse is due to two factors. First the judicious selection that has enabled the players to work in together, each man being a specialist in his position. Secondly, the recognition of the young player. Thus we have now a combination of youth and experience that by its machine-like precision, and remarkable dash, is almost unbeatable in Australian lacrosse.

My reason for making these comments is to show how South Australia were so badly beaten last Saturday, and to explain that it was not such a disgrace as many seemed to suggest. Certainly the action of the Adelaide selectors in placing so many young players in the team, new to big lacrosse, was a drastic step. Still, I am sure the Victorians would have beaten any team that had been pitted against them.

Last year in Perth our young side demolished the older South Australians, perhaps not so severely as on Saturday, but enough to show that new material was wanted.

There were many young players in the visiting side of great promise, and as Mr. Rule, manager of the team, remarked, the side was selected

with an eye to the future. By the time the 1932 carnival arrived South Australia hoped to have a team that would prove capable of winning back the championship of Australia.

Beattie's Captaincy

There is one other feature of Victorian lacrosse that stands out above all other States.

That is its leadership, for in Jack Beattie we have a captain without an equal. On Saturday he handled his team with such judgment and ordered his team's movements so skillfully that the opposing players were non-plussed and seemed incapable of counter checking his tactics. Besides this, Beattie played great lacrosse, and capped all by scoring six goals.

Edwards, the Malvern centre man, was easily the greatest player of the day, and it was remarkable how he seemed to be always in possession of the ball. Never for a moment was he troubled by the conditions, and very seldom by his place man, who seemed to find it impossible to quieten him. The back line was rock-like. Sid Wilson, in goal, was in excellent form, and it must have been very disheartening to the South Australian forwards to find every shot cleanly and skillfully turned away. A finer exhibition of goal keeping could hardly be imagined. A. McLeod, N. Gibbs, and J. Reid withstood every attack without flinching, and kept the opposing forwards so far out that they seldom had an opportunity to be dangerous.

While naturally very disappointed at their poor performance, the South Australians took their defeat in a grand sporting spirit, and made no excuses, giving all the praise to the winners. No doubt, much good will come out of the game, for the experience gained by these young players will soon bear fruit. Next year, when the Victorians play in Adelaide, they can expect to meet with much sterner opposition, for South Australia takes its lacrosse seriously, and will benefit by Saturday's painful experience.

LACROSSE.

Fine Display by Coburg.



QUEENSLAND'S VICTORY.

On Saturday afternoon on the main Exhibition Oval, under exceedingly wet conditions, Queensland defeated New South Wales by the wide margin of 16 goals to 6.

At the outset the wearers of the Waratah created a surprise by scoring two goals in quick succession, but the fast and combined play of the home forwards quickly changed the complexion of the game, and Queensland, obtaining the lead, maintained it until half time, after which they speedily drew further ahead, allowing their opponents no quarter. The defeated side, however, were not demoralized at any stage, and played strongly until the final whistle.

The game in the Mother State is at present undergoing the process of rebuilding from younger players, as many of the older players familiar to Queenslanders in inter-State games have now retired in favour of their younger exponents. The team from New South Wales on this occasion was, therefore, composed of players of an unknown quantity, and their appearance against the pick of this State was keenly looked forward to by local enthusiasts.

Three years have elapsed since New South Wales sent a team to Brisbane, and on that occasion the home side was victorious by 12 goals to 6. The visitors are here to avenge that defeat, also to make amends for similar defeats suffered in 1922 and 1928 when the two States met in Sydney and Perth respectively.

The weather conditions were far from ideal, the steady rain having created a quagmire in the centre field. Despite the inclemency of the weather a fair crowd was present, and the teams were greeted with applause when they filed out on time.

THE PLAY.

Queensland got away from the opening face-off, but the attack failed. New South Wales looked dangerous on two occasions, and were pressing the local men. From a scrimmage in front of goal the ball lobbed in a dangerous position, and Fletcher quickly followed up the advantage, and netted for New South Wales. New South Wales attacked again, and Tillman passed across the goal to Richardson, who scored. New South Wales, 2; Queensland, 0. Queensland were not demoralized by this unexpected success on the part of their opponents, and a fast attacking movement, initiated by Hubbard and Tealby, resulted in the latter scoring amidst enthusiasm from a fine angle. New South Wales, 2; Queensland, 1.

The home side were now inspired, and by scores were evened when Brown came through from the defence, received in a dry position, and goal.

Upon the resultant face off the Maroons attacked hard, and Farquhar netted in fine style to net from a fine angle. Queensland, 3; New South Wales, 1.

QUEENSLAND FORGE AHEAD.

A pass from Hiron to Tealby was spoiled by Walde, and the visitors retained possession. Tillman made a fast and accurate and a sizzling shot to the goal, but Cross cleared well.

Queensland attacked, and a hard pass from Hubbard to Tealby flew off the wood of the latter's crosse into the net. Queensland, 4; New South Wales, 2.

The fifth goal came soon after, as the result of a short pass from Radford to Tealby, and the latter's well aimed shot deceived the goalkeeper, Queensland, 5; New South Wales, 2.

Tillman made a run down the wing with the ball, a dogged effort to follow, but his shot went high. Play was transferred into New South Wales territory, and Donnelly had a busy time frustrating the Queensland attempts to further add to their total. The quarter ended with the scores unaltered, Queensland 5, New South Wales 2.

SECOND QUARTER.

The heavy going had slowed the game up to some extent. The middle of the ground was now a quagmire, and it appeared difficult to find the ball during the face offs. H. Harris displayed the pace that he is renowned for, when he quickly traversed the field from goal to goal, but his effort was rendered abortive by Brown, who gave his opponent a hard body check, which put Brown temporarily out of action. Play was now of a scrappy nature, but Queensland, in Queensland's favour, Hubbard goal scored successfully with two brilliant shots after working hard for position. After a lull in the scoring, further goal was added to the home side's total, when Tealby shot for goal. The goals collected, but dropped the ball into the net. Queensland, 8; New South Wales, 2.

The visitors now played desperately to overtake the deficit, and fast work and safe handling by Turnbull and Richardson, and his result when the latter netted. New South Wales forced the pace again, and Tillman achieved the success that he had repeatedly sought for. His goal came heart to his side when the latter looked black for them. Queensland, 9; New South Wales, 4. Turnbull drew applause when despite a hard body check from Gladhill, he succeeded in netting, and then collapsed from the effect of this previous impact with his opponent. Queensland, 9; New South Wales, 5.

Hubbard raised the ninth goal at a stage when the Queensland supporters were feeling that the lead of three goals was in danger of being reduced. Play now turned in the home side's favour. Radford and Hubbard combined well, and the former increased the Maroons' lead to five goals. The half-time whistle came with the scores, Queensland 10; New South Wales 5.

THIRD QUARTER.

Queensland were in their opponents' territory from the commencement of the quarter's play, and Radford looked dangerous, but Kable spoiled his shot for goal. The visitor's captain, H. Harris, smashed his stick in a maul, and had to call for a new one. Hubbard gave Queensland their 11th goal, and the lead was consolidated when Farquhar goal scored in a spectacular manner. Queensland, 12; New South Wales, 5. H. Harris retired injured, accompanied by Hiron and Brown, and Fletcher drew off during their absence. Hubbard and Radford again came into the picture. The latter left his man standing, and deceived the goalie. Donnelly, the New South Wales custodian, was called upon to save the goal on many occasions, and stopped some difficult shots. One of his clearances to the side was collected by Tealby, who did not hesitate in quickly passing to Hubbard, for the latter to add another to his total. Hubbard made another attempt, which Donnelly cleared to a few yards from goal. Farquhar was handy and gathered in fine style to net from a fine angle. Queensland, 13; New South Wales, 5.

The Maroons were doing all the attacking, and had the opposing defence with their backs to the wall. Tealby grasped the opportunity by the New South Wales custodian had his view obstructed by some of his own men, and a long shot found its objective. Queensland, 16; New South Wales, 5.

Harris, the waratah wearers' skipper, made a spectacular run, beating several defence men, and transferred to Turnbull at an opportune moment. The latter did not fail his skipper, and Cross had no chance of stopping his shot from close in.

Queensland, 16; New South Wales, 6. After up and down play resulted for some time New South Wales, led by H. Harris, made determined attempts to reduce the jersey, but Cross was equal to the occasion. Harris was applauded for many brilliant solo efforts but the Queensland defence on each occasion smothered him.

OUTSTANDING PLAYERS.

The Queensland forwards combined excellently, and Hubbard, Radford, and Farquhar provided an attacking display which, despite the slippery nature of the ground, was first class. In this respect position was that of left attack, played more as a home man, but, nevertheless, his bag of five goals was typical of his heat club form. J. Brew played in the same of the true winger, considerably to the home team's advantage. His unselfish tactics of keeping the home men well supplied with the ball were responsible in no small measure for his side's success, and to him much credit is due. Of the Queensland defence Crick and Gladhill stood out, but Elphinstone appeared to have an off day. Tillman, Brown, and West, on the wings, both functioned well, the former particularly producing his best form, and his loose man play frequently confused the opposing team. Cross, in goal, saved some hot shots, and his sure keeping was of the best. The visitors certainly gave a surprising exhibition for a young team, and the scores are no indication of their splendid performance.


The forwards were a fast bunch, and frequently left the defence at a disadvantage, of finish on occasions in completing their movements robbed them of many advantages. Richardson, Turnbull, and Tillman were the best of the bunch in the front line. H. Harris, the team's centre and captain, provided the most outstanding performance of the day, and Queensland could well do with a centre of his speed and capabilities. His dashing runs through the field from goal to goal, leaving opponent after opponent in his wake, drew the spectators' applause time and again. Hiron fought gamely, but had no chance of coping with such a speedster. New South Wales' defence men were sorely tried with such a combination in opposition to them. Kable gave a creditable display. Donnelly, the custodian, had to withstand the brunt of the onslaughts that the back men could not sustain, and he performed nobly. Many spectacular saves went down to his credit.

CURTAIN RAISER.

As a curtain raiser to the big game a challenge match was played between the Queensland B grade side that visited Sydney in July, and a selected A grade side. The experience of the latter was too much for the B graders, who were defeated by 10 goals to 3.

YERONGA V. CHELMER.

In the Yeronga v. Chelmer match, Cross gave one of the finest exhibitions of the art of keeping goal that have been seen here. His anticipation and interception were excellent, whilst his clearances were heart-breaking to the opposing attack. To E. Farquhar in the attack and Cross in goal can be attributed half of the credit for the Yeronga success. After Farquhar left the field in the third quarter when Berry was hurt, only two goals were placed to the credit of the royal blues, one of which was knocked in by the opposition.

Farquhar was in great form, scoring four of the seven goals registered while he was in the game, and giving Berry a very lively time. Berry was unfortunate when, in endeavouring to body check Farquhar, he collided with a team mate Wood, and twisted one of his legs, putting him out of the game.

The stick work generally was not of a very high standard, though occasionally glimpses of brilliant play were seen. Chelmer are unfortunate in not having sufficient support for J. Brew, who did hard useful work with no tangible result. A little more initiative on the part of Chelmer's attacks might easily have altered the result, despite the stone-wall appearance of Cross.

McDonald in Chelmer's goal was not at his best in the early quarters but towards the end of the game he showed great ability. In addition to E. Farquhar, J. Farquhar, Dyer, Wilson, and Woolston were successful for Yeronga. The display by the Yeronga attack was the most convincing they have given for some time, whilst their passing at times was very pleasing to the spectators.

Chelmer made desperate efforts in the last quarter to retrieve the position, but the loss of Berry was felt, and every attack on the Yeronga goal was quickly followed by counter-attacks which were difficult to check. Chelmer's only success was due to J. Brew, who thoroughly deserved it.

Mr. S. J. Smith had charge in the central position, and was not called on to award an unusual number of penalties. The final scores were 9-1 in Yeronga's favour.

SUCCESS OF KALINGA.

By defeating Toombul, Kalinga cannot be deprived of possession of the Hadley Cup, having an advantage of four points and only one match to play. Both teams were without several of their regular players, Buchanan, of Kalinga, and Jackson and Gough, of Toombul, being unable to participate. Mr. H. Kilgour had charge of a good game which was won by Kalinga by 10 to 5.

Kalinga's attacks were more impressive in the opening part of the game, but appeared to weaken off later, whether because they thought they had the game won or not is uncertain. If the Toombul shooting had been more accurate at one part of the game the advantage would have been very much in Toombul's favour.

Hubbard and Boucaut were the bright stars in the tricolour firmament. Boucaut played one of his best games to date, and put Martin out of position so often that Gleadhill was repeatedly called on to assist. These two monopolised Toombul's scoring, and several goals were the result of good combined work between them.

L. Tealby proved to be a thorn in the side of Toombul's defence and with his brother Allan worked some nice combined moves resulting in one or the other netting. Tanner and Roy Tealby on the light blues' wings were always alive to opportunities and both assisted in increasing the Kalinga total. Lenton had the measure of Purcell and kept him well out of the picture all afternoon, but otherwise the Toombul backs did not have too much success, being continually worried by a man breaking in.

Next week's games will not affect either the Hadley Cup or premiership competitions as a result of the wins by Yeronga and Kalinga, and the resumption of fixtures after the Interstate match will be eagerly awaited.

B1 GRADE.

A very hard and even game at Wynnum resulted in Norman Park winning from Tingal by the narrow margin of 2-1. Tingal were without Newcomb, and Cory played in goal, thus considerably weakening the attack line. Johnston and Clarkson for Norman Park and K. Murray for Tingal were the scorers.

Kalinga again defeated Clayfield; this time the margin was greater, namely 10-2. Clayfield lacked in team work, and also suffered by reason of several of their attacks discriminating too obviously in their choice of men when passing the ball. Tingal were surprised to gain victory against the heavier Toombul team 6-4. Lenton and Cunningham scored for the losers and Bennett and Cory for Tingal.







Victorians' Narrow Victory

Fine Exposition of the Game

Queensland put up a splendid performance against the crack Victorian team at the Exhibition Ground on Saturday afternoon. Two years had elapsed since a representative team from that State visited this State. Then a second team was beaten by Queensland, 6-3. The southerners, to avenge that defeat, sent a thoroughly representative side on this occasion, but only prevailed by 11-9 after a splendid game.

THE PLAY.

Play opened at a fast bat, the ball going up and down field quickly. The first dangerous move came from Jack Beattie, the Victorian's clever leader, when Cross was called upon to turn aside a hot shot straight to the top of the net.

Queensland opened the scoring, E. Farquhar netting from a pick up in front of the goal. The home side continued to press, Brew just missing after receiving from Hubbard, when the latter was checked. Another determined effort by Hubbard shortly afterwards also came to naught.

Victoria were really playing continually to the celebrated Roy Read, but the young Toombul defender was making a surprisingly good job of checking him, frequently robbing the flying winger at a critical stage. The equaliser came when a quick pass to Beattie just as quickly flew into the net.

CONTRAST IN STYLES.

The Victorian backs were combining cleverly to clear the ball from their danger zone. Another feature that took the eye was the contrast in the styles of play. Victoria adopted a very open, long passing method of play, and were never afraid to throw right across the field when in difficulties. Queensland played their usual close game, with short, snappy passing.

The Victorian backs, however, were adept at intercepting at close range, while Crick revelled in intercepting the long throws at the other end. With the defences on top it was some time before Tealby gave Queensland the lead with a hot shot into the top of the net. Ere the change over, Read attracted the attention of the Queensland backs, with the result that F. Deacon, receiving quickly, netted—2 all.

Amidst excitement a shot straight at the net by Tealby was finely turned aside by Denton. With Cross out of play, Wrixon missed, but Puddy quickly secured, and coming round the side scored, giving Victoria the lead for the first time. Immediately afterwards Beattie dodged and called for the ball, but missed the pass from Puddy, which went straight in with Cross unsighted. Victoria 4, Queensland 2.

WONDERFUL EFFORT.

Gough ended with a weak shot, after West had made a typical run down the field. Hubbard then brought off a wonderful individual effort to make the score 3-4. The next thrill was when Puddy's dangerous angle shot hit the side of the net; then Wrixon forced Cross to bring off a fine save.

Victoria continued to pepper Cross, and Beattie went round Gleadhill to give Cross no hope with a splendid shot. Hubbard replied with a successful low shot. 5-4. A good check from behind by Gleadhill saved what looked like a certain goal from Beattie.

Beattie was playing a great game for a man who fractured a rib last Saturday in a practice game. After Hubbard had again got past Reid, but finished with a bad shot, half time sounded with the score: Victoria 5, Queensland 4.

KEEN EXCHANGES.

E. Farquhar was shifted out on to the wing on resumption, Brew going into the front line. Victoria pressed, and Puddy scored after several unsuccessful attempts. Beattie then beat two men to net with a brilliant shot. Victoria seemed to be going away from their opponents at this stage, with the score, 7-4.

Queensland now began to wake up, and Brew was nearly in, but Denton cleared. Victoria were giving a clever exhibition. Tranter made an opening for Read, who just missed. This move was reversed, but Cross cleverly put the ball over the top.

Tealby reduced the lead when he received from Gough, when in a good position. Tealby added another when he failed to collect, but quickly recovering went right in to score. 7-6.

The crowd went frantic when Hubbard cleverly eluded Reid to even the scores again. This score held till three-quarter time.

EXCITING PLAY.

Queensland, urged on by the crowd, went at it hammer and tongs. Brown made a spectacular run through, and shortly after clever combination by Gough, Hubbard, and Tealby, which brought the crowd to its feet, ended in splendid save by Denton.

Hubbard, who was starring in the Queensland forward line, could not be denied, and a backhander gave Queensland an 8-7 lead. Gough, who was playing a useful game, but showing badly, missed an open goal when West came down. The score was again brought level when Puddy got in a hard shot.

Crick brought off a brilliant intercept when Beattie was looking dangerous. Elphinstone was having considerable trouble with the Coburg deaf mute, Puddy, who seemed to be too clever for him. Puddy put in another hot one, which Cross stopped, but could not clear, and Wrixon knocked the ball in again. Victoria, 9; Queensland, 8.

PLENTY OF THRILLS.

It was anybody's game at this stage, and both teams were giving the crowd plenty of thrills. Queensland, led by Hubbard, were combining nicely, but frequently a bad pass to Tealby spoiled their moves at a critical stage. Deacon was marking him splendidly, frequently taking the ball right off his racket.

With a goal dead and full-time drawing near, Vies were packing their defence and making it extremely hard for the Queenslanders to get through. Brew, however, equalised after a long scoreless period.



VICTORIA BEATS QUEENSLAND

By "FIELD CAPTAIN"

Better tactics and a sounder knowledge of combined play by their attacks enabled the Victorian lacrosse team to vanquish Queensland by 11 goals to nine in an excellent game at the Exhibition on Saturday.

Whilst the maroons were in the ascendant in the third and portion of the fourth quarters and playing a great game, it appeared as if an opportunity to disorganise the Victorian ranks was lost, for their defence men were playing out of position badly. By endeavouring to get in and score instead of feeding Tealby to the maximum, however, the Queensland attacks allowed the chance to slip and the experience of the Victorians soon enabled them to again assume control. The whole game was brilliant and abounded with thrills, every player giving of his best.

The game was the seventh between the two States since 1913 and of these Queensland has won only one. Whilst Victoria is the recognised premier State in lacrosse, the standard in Queensland has been improving rapidly and enthusiasts were confident that the visitors would have to fight hard to achieve victory. The narrow margin between the final scores indicates that they were right and is gratifying, especially as the Victorian team is much stronger than that which previously visited Brisbane.

CALL OF THE "CROSSE"

AUSTRALIAN BOARD OF CONTROL
MOOTED

FINE PLAY FOR OPENING GAMES

MOOTED formation of an Australian Council of Lacrosse Associations is one of the biggest moves yet made by the various State controlling authorities. It will place the game in Australia on an International footing, and allow of authoritative negotiations being carried on with foreign organisations with a view to arrangement of overseas visits.

THE need for an Australian Federation has been felt for many years in the lacrosse world. In fact, there have been efforts in the past to form a board of control for the sport in Australia, but these have fallen through because of lack of enthusiasm on the part of the smaller States. But with the sport on the up-grade in New South Wales and Queensland, and on a solid footing in South Australia and Victoria, it is probable that the latest endeavor will meet with success.

Since the 1928 Olympic Games, several feelers have been sent out by overseas organisations with a view to arranging a visit from a lacrosse team from Canada, England or one of the Continental countries. Hitherto the negotiations have been addressed to Victoria, as the strongest State in the Commonwealth from a lacrosse point of view.



OVERSEAS TEAMS LIKELY

But Victoria has not felt capable of accepting their proposal on their own financial backing, but there is little doubt that, with the support of an Australian-wide organisation, the overseas visits may become an accomplished fact.

The game needs such a visit to cap the strenuous and successful efforts which are now being made to place the sport on its pre-war footing.

Games by teams from the United States Special Service squadron, a few years ago helped to push the game along in New South Wales particularly, but for a year or two the sport has been in the doldrums. However, prospects are now much brighter, and it should not be long before the younger players develop into expert stickmen.

Some efforts should be made by the State Association to keep the older players interested in the game while at the same time giving every encouragement to the new men.

SECOND GRADERS KEEN

If the Second Grade Club keep up their splendid efforts of the past few seasons there will be room for more first grade players, and consequently for the formation of new clubs on the lines of the successful Bondi Club.

It is gratifying indeed to followers of the game to see the new Club launched and meet with such success in its first game.

There is plenty of material available in Eastern Suburbs for the formation of even another club without weakening in any way the existing organisations, while the launching of other



clubs in new districts should be a move of the near future.

Prospect for the current season are brighter than for many years. Old stagers, by no means back-numbers, are fighting keenly to retain their places in the teams. The number of "B" grade players who are rapidly approaching "A" grade standards is increasing as the season progresses. It should be the policy of each first grade club to give these players a series of try-outs and thus develop the game.

REVIVAL OF UNIVERSITY

University, once a strong factor in the decision of any lacrosse game, are making great progress this year. They were only tyros last year, but made up in enthusiasm and keenness that which they lacked in stickwork and tactics. This season they have trained assiduously, and with match experience will make one of the most dangerous teams in the "B" grade competition.

The "A" grade teams should be at full strength by now, and if they are able to attract their members to training and practice, the games this season should be well worth watching.

Players would do well to remember that slovenly play will only react to the detriment of the game, whereas fast, accurate and nippy

stickwork will attract the crowds to watch the exhibitions.

It is the public support which the game needs, and if all teams could display their best form each Saturday, and provide thrilling games, the chance of drawing bigger crowds, with the possibility of later playing on enclosed grounds, would be enhanced.

Another point which the older players should take to heart is the training of the new players. Many of these lads, strange to the game, the use of the "crosse" and the laws of the game would appreciate the help and advice of the "A" grade players. BRIGHT PROSPECTS.

LACROSSE IN QUEENSLAND.

ANNUAL MEETING OF ASSOCIATION.

"The prospects for the 1930 season seem very bright, and with the assistance of lacrosseurs further improvement can be shown. The success during 1929 was excellent, but now that the game is decidedly on the upward trend it behoves all to throw their weight in. With more clubs and teams competitions can be run in four grades instead of three and lacrosse established as in pre-war days."

This cheerful statement was made by Mr. R. A. Little, honorary secretary of the Queensland Lacrosse Association, at the annual meeting at the Y.M.C.A. rooms last night.

Altogether, 318 players were registered with the association, an increase of 110 on the total of 208 in 1929. Good competitions resulted in all grades, the keenest being in the "B" grade, where the premiership was decided in the challenge round. "B" grade work was predominant during the 1929 season. Commencing with 16/3 the year ended with a credit balance of 230/6/10.

The president, (Mr. J. S. Hutcheon) said the report was very satisfactory indeed, the increase in membership to pre-war standard being a wonderful achievement. Every lacrosseur in Queensland volunteered for the Great War, and it took some time to re-educate the game when the war was over. "Lacrosse is a young man's game," said Mr. Hutcheon. "When a man reaches 30 his days as a lacrosseur are about numbered. It is a very fast, game-a game for youth." He advised leading players to make their annual holidays synchronous with inter-State competitions, and thus help Queensland to become the leading lacrosse State in the Commonwealth. He was delighted to know that a Lacrosse Council had been formed, and he hoped its first achievement would be to bring a Canadian or overseas team to Australia. A Canadian team had not visited this country since 1907. He congratulated "B" grade players on their splendid performance against New South Wales. The annual report was very encouraging, and it reflected credit on all officers and players in the association.

Hiron, who has been a member of the association for 40 years and chairman of committees for 27 years, was elected a life member. It was decided to strike a medal in commemoration of the event, and to present it to Mr. Hiron.
