In The Sporting Globe a few months ago I traced the history of Australian lacrosse and showed how remarkable had been the growth of the Canadian national game throughout the Commonwoalth in recent years,

Great has been the progress of lacrosse in the other States, but novhere has it made greater headway than in Melbourne, where from a few men playing "sides" each Saturday atternoon at Middle Park a well or-ganised association in Victoria has now within its ranks close on 70

Each Saturday 52 teams, compris-Each saturday 62 teams, compris-ling six sections, engaged in compellion matches. A mid-week compellion among school teams has become a wonderful recruiling ground for the district clubs, and with a country as-sociation at Ballarat in a prosperous condition it is little wonder, that lacross enthusiasts look forward with confidence to the future of this great

amateur sport.
The success of Victorian lacrosse has been due to the great work of many of its old players, for once a

man is attracted to lecrosso he immediately becomes fascinated with its charm, and does his best to get other sportsmen to take on the game. To explain what I mean, it is only necesof many of the leading clubs, such as Williamstown, Malvern, Caulfield, and Hawthorn, to mention only a few, which were started by g small band of enthusiasts, and now these clubs have several teams and very large memberships.

OLD PLAYERS DOYALTY

Williamstown have four teams, and so many players that it is always dif-ficult at the commencement of a season to find places for the numbers of local athietes who are anxious to join. Founded almost 30 years ago in a modest way, the seaside club have made wonderful progress, and so creat is, the loyalty to the club of their old players that many of the members of the first team are still

memors of the first team are still keen supporters.

(Captain Fearon has been president for nearly 28 years, and is still guid-ing the destinies of this prosperous seaside team. To Captain Fearon is due much of the credit for the growth of Williamstorm for at Williamstown, for he has been far more than the usual president who sees an occasional match and perhaps presides at the annual meeting. It is seldom that this popular president misses even's committee meeting, and he is never sparing in his efforts to increase the popularity of lacrosse, not only in his own city, but throughout

the State.
His shield, presented some years His shield, presented some years age, is now held permanently by the Melbourne-High School, and his own team, the Williamstown DI, are the first helders of the Fearon Cup, which he presented last season for perpetual competition among the Junior clubs of the ViAA.

Their record of 291 goais scored as against 41 by their opponents gives some idea of their wonderful performance.

HOTBED OF LACROSSE

Another great club that has been a big factor in the growth of Victorian lacrosso is Malvern, whose records for many years have been unsurpassed by other club in Melbourne, and might say Australia. Always a hothed of lacrosse, Maivorn have provided some wonderful sides. Many of the exponents of the game in their ranks have carned fame throughout Australia. L. L. Mount Now in London

Though 93 years old, Lambton Louis Mount, who was a well-known runner in Australia many years ago, is still hale and hearty in London. Mr. A. J. Sullivan, a keen foot-running enthusiast for many years, who was a personal friend of Mount's, sought his address from Mr. H. C. A. Harrison (the "father" of League football, and a former sprint champion runner) about two years ago.

Arthur Lynch, an old Smythesdale boy who has been located in England for many years, located Mount in London This is what he says about the old-time champion runner: "Mount is 93 years of age, is as straight as a barrel, mentally alert, and a jovial and white-headed old fellow. He was very pleased that I called on him and a property of the straight of the tellow. "A Sport for Thoroughbreds"

J. Beattie's Advice



HIS is a sport for thoroughbreds," said Sir John Madden, formerly Chief Justice of Victoria, in welcoming an interstate team of lacrosse players from Adelaide many years ago, and as one hears a recital of the requirements of a lacrosse

player, as expressed by Jack Beattie, of the Malvern team, one realises that it was a particularly apt description. When I asked him what was necessary in a lacrosse player, Jack Beattie, who is one of six brothers who have represented Victoria, said:—"Condition, stamina, judgment of pace, speed, strength, tactics, unselfishness, and any other attribute of an athlete of which you can think, and," he added with a smile which one could see reflected memories of many a hard game, "you must be able to control your temper."

emper."

The game, which is of Canadian origin. was introduced into Victoria in 1874 by Mr. L. L. Mount, a Canadian, who became famous as a runner and noted for his races with Mr. H. C. A. Harrison, the "Father of Australian Football." That athletics did them no harm is shown by the fact that, though aged 93 years, Mr. Mount is still living in London, and Mr. Harrison is living at Kew. One afternoon in Albert Park Mr. Mount with a "crosse" throwing a ball, when he attracted the attention of a young man named George Beech, Mr. Mount invited the young Australian to try to throw the ball with the crosse. The invitation was accepted and Mr. Beech, who is now a life member of the Victorian Lacrosse Association and as keen as ever on the game, was so successful that he became interested, and induced some of his friends to join. Mr. Mount was the instructor, and weekly matches between "The Reds" and "The Blues" were played, Eventually clubs were formed. Melbourne, South Melbourne, and Carlton being the first. Mr. Joel Fox, president of the Victorian Lacrosse Association, was one of the pioneers, and associated with him was his brother, E. Phillips Fox, the artist, and Mr. Philip Shappere, who also filled the presidential chair, and Mr. Amos Norcott; but to Mr. Beech belongs the honour of being the first Australian player. The game gradually became established, until in 1888 intercolonial matches with South Australia were inaugurated by a visit of the South Melbourne club, organised by the Gordon brothers, to Ade-

First Principles.

"The first thing a lad has to learn is how to hold and to use a stick," said Jack Beat, the, "and he must also learn to hold it with two hands. If a boy does not begin rightly he can never expect to become an expert player, Stick work is the first essential in a good player. In Australia, where every boy wants to play football as soon as he can toddle, he must learn if he takes on harrosse that there are some cardinal differences, though in each game the object is, to score goals. First, you cannot bump or handle an opponent; you may body-cheek' him, but you must not bump; second, you may hot you may body-cheek' him, but you must not bump; second, you may

be put out of the game for breaches of the rules. This prevents undue roughness, and it might well be introduced into football. Third, and most important of all, if a player is injured the opposing player has to leave the field with him—another rule which would improve football.

"The cultivation of stick work can be done only by practice. In our short winter evenings it is not possible to get much practice on grounds, but I would advise a young player to take a crosse and a ball and practise against a wall. In 10 minutes he will learn a lot by throwing the ball against the wall and catching it. He must hold the crosse firmly but lightly with the right hand near the string, and the left hand near the end of the stick, though in forward play you take a shorter grip so as to be able to shoot quickly. Having learned to throw the ball and catch it as it rebounds he should mark a spot on the wall, and try to hit it every time, for accuracy in throwing is highly important. This wall practice will teach the recruit to throw, and the pace at which the ball rebounds will cultivate anticipation, and he will thus learn to catch the ball. He should practise underhand throwing also, for this is invaluable in shooting for goal, and by this means he can throw much more quickly, Archie McIndoe, of the Melbourne club, is one of the best exponents of stick work I know. and young players should watch him. It is this ability which makes him invaluable as a centre, for he is so adept that he becomes not only a centre, but a forward and a defender as well.

"The importance of stick work was clearly demonstrated by the visit of the Canadians in 1907. In fact, the game may be divided into two periods-before and after that visit. Before the Canadians came we played with long, tightly strung crosses, with which it was possible to throw the ball 100 yards or more. The Canadians' sticks were short and baggy, and the net was loose. They passed a lot with overhand shots, but they introduced new and unexpected underhand passing. Their stick work was a revelation.
They could catch any ball within reach, and their passing was fast and accurate. Faulty stick work means weak passing and catching, and spells bad lacrosse.

Throwing the Ball.

"In throwing the ball there are two methods—overhand and underhand. In the first the stick should be field lightly but firmly with the right hand next the strings, the left hand at the end of the strick. The ball should be expelled from the crosse with a quick throw, in which accuracy is the great essential. A 'throw of 100 yards is no good unless the ball goes where you want it.

"In the underhand throw you get rid of the ball by a swift sweeping movement. I would urge all young players to cultivate the underhand throw. It is more effective, it is harder to stop, for it is much easier to catch a ball thrown up on the full than it is to take a ball on the first top or as it skims along the ground.

"It is essential to good lacrosse that uplayer should be able to catch well, and as in everything else proficiency can be assured only by practice. It is heartbreaking to pass to a man in a good position only to find that he cannot take the ball. In catching, all the weight of the body should be on the right foot, and a skilful turn to the left just as he feels the ball on the crosse should enable a man to catch properly. The suggestion to practise against a wall if followed will develop catching, for the ball rebounds at great speed and at most extraordinary angles. It is the unexpected which develops the ability."

"Lacrosse players of the present day are sadly deficient in what is known as the body check'-that is to say, stopping a man by letting him run into you when you are ready for him. In the old days body checking was a feature of the game. There is too much wild hitting now. Alan McCay, of the University, is the best exponent of the body check I have ever seen. Perhaps. the falling-off in this feature of the game is the lack of dodging nowadays. No forward is really good until he can dodge. The body check is accomplished by taking one step back with the left foot, and one to the right with the right foot. The result is that your opponent must come straight into you, with baleful result. There must be many forwards who remember with dismay the result of a body check from Alan McCay. There is the right way as well as the wrong way of giving the body check, It must be all body. Arms and stick must be kept clear. There is a great difference between the 'body check,' which is an art. and the 'cross check,' which is illegal,

Tactics

"Tactics play a great part in lacrosse; in fact, more than in any other game, I think. The game is played with 12 men a 2 side, and each of these, save the goalkeeper. is directly marked by an opponent. The Canadians taught us much; in fact. they revolutionised the game in Victoria. When their backs got the ball it was very hard to regain it. They all worked together, and, with short passes from one to another, they would carry it from the defence to the attack lines. Their homes, or forwards, would spread out from the goal like a fan, and then would make a whirlwind dash for goal. The man with the ball would throw it, like a shot from a gun, into the crosse of the player he thought would have the best chance of scoring. It was the surprise element that was so disconcerting; you never knew which man was to be served. This phase of attack has never been fully appreciated or adopted in Australia.

"One of the most effective forms of attack is that called 'the odd man' system,

I and this the Canadians worked to perfection. Briefly it was that as soon as a backman got possession of the ball the goalkeeper, who had no one minding him, and was, therefore, a spare man, should leave his goal, and thus become the odd man The tendency was not to let him loose. and sooner or later one man of the opposing side would leave the man he was minding, and go to check the odd man, with results that were disastrous. The system had been worked long before the Canadians came, but they developed it until it became a fine art. The danger in working it is when the stick work is faulty; then it becomes a menace. The system is like a chain: it is only as strong as its weakest link. It is not a scheme to be tried by novices.

"The Canadian defence was also remarkable. They stationed their defenders in a fan shape about 15 yards from goal, and prevented the homes from getting inside the barrier. If an attack shot overhand they had such clever stick work that the man minding him would catch the shot like a pass. The object was to keep the attacks manœuvring for an opening by passing in the hope that they might lose the ball. They were all practically goalkeepers. The Australian form of defence is for the back man to follow the forward so closely and check his stick so promptly that he cannot get the ball, but it is not as sound as the Canadian method. The Canadians were no better athletes, but they were far more skilful with the crosse.

Forward Play.

"The work of the forwards is to attack the goal, and here, too, tactics count for much. Forwards should not crowd the goal; they should open out like a fan so as to leave 'road clear' for a centre dashing in or to enable the odd man to be effective. A valuable form of attack is to have a man behind the goal, so that when he returns it he is facing his own men, who in turn are facing the goal mouth and thus can shoot without turning. Forwards should remember that games are lost by wasted shots and that it is no use shooting at the wrong time. They should also learn to shoot for goal underhand. By this means there is more chance of beat-

ing the goalkeeper.
"An interesting feature is the start of the game or the "face-off." Two opposing players, the centre men, standing outside a circle, place the ball between their crosses, and at the signal to play they draw the ball. Each man trust to get it to his own man. The keen centre man knows where his own man is, and he may try to draw the ball to him or let his opponent do the work. In the illustration the ball is seen just leaving the crosse.

Advice to Young Players.

"There are some golden rules in lacrosse as in all games, and I would enumerate these shortly, thus:—

1. Keep your eye on the ball. Know where your men and your opponents are, both in front and behind you. Know where the goal is, in other words, study the position. Know which opponent is dangerous and likely to score.

2. As a rule a successful team has only one captain.

3. Always have two hands on your crosse when catching, picking up, and throwing the ball.

4. Don't argue with the umpire.

5. Always think two or three moves ahead. Keep saying to yourself, 'If I get the ball what is the best thing to do with it?'; don't start to think after the ball is passed to you what is best to be done when you get it; act at once with speed and determination.

6. Do not run too much. Remember a ball can be thrown much faster than a

man can run, and throwing does not get you out of position. 7. Make your motto, 'Unity is strength.'

9. Keep your head, keep, your feet, and above all keep your temper."



Lacrose Association.


